## Solution Needed

## Coliseum May Be Too Small

Before the home basketball season fades away in the minds of students and Tech officials, it might be wise to discuss a problem that seems to be getting worse each year. The problem of seating for students in the Coliseum.

As most of us know, it becomes quite difficult to find a seat when a maior game is being played, such as the one against Texas University recently. At this game there simply weren't enough seats to go around-students were sitting just about anywhere possible.

It stands to reason that as basketball interest picks up at Tech and school spirit and loyalty continues to grow there simply won't be enough student seats in the Coliseum to go around. The students have shown that they stand behind Polk Robison and his teams whether they win the conference or finish low in the standings. They always have and we bet they always will.

On top of all this, Tech returns all five starters and subs next year and it stands to reason that the team will get as much if not more student support next year. Then there is the matter of increased enrollment to look at. The enrollment has been gaining right along and will probably continue to grow.

The students have a right to have a place to sit when they go to the games. This right comes out of money paid by the students for the Student Services Fee. It's not unfair at all to simply want what you have paid good money to get. Especially since the costs of gaining an education are sky-high. It leaves a pretty bad taste in the students' mouths when they can't find a seat-especially one they have paid for in advance.

Maybe the Coliseum is not large enough? But it seems rather unlikely that it will be enlarged-at least not in the near future. So the matter presents a big problem for all concerned.

We must maintain that the lack of seating space encourages seat saving - a practice that seemed to get worse this year. This situation tends to create bad feelings among the students and lower their morale. Seat saving is frowned upon by the athletic department but it happens just the same.

Now, what's the solution to the problem? Charge students for each game they attend? Make the student section reserved and furnish tickets for each seat? We can't offer a concrete answer to the matter. We feel that the proper authorities at Texas Tech can solve this problem to the betterment of all concerned. After all, they have more cold facts to go on than we do. We have confidence that they will act on this situation.

But, we hope they will do it soon. The time for action is now-not next January.

## Student Regulations

## New System In Effect

Dead week and final week of last semester have already faded into a dim blur-and so have all those new semester resolutions that undoubtedly we all made. But, Techsans, the spring se-
mester, this semester, is THE semester to stick mester, this semester, is THE semester to stick
to those study resolutions like glue. Here's why In the fall of 1959, Tech initiated a new system for determining a student's eligibility to remain in school, with grades bejng tabulated at the end of the spring semester only. Previously a student's scholastic eligibility was based on the Scholastic Probation System.

Under that system, a student could be placed on scholastic probation after any semester in which he failed to meet scholastic requirements. The deficiency could then be made up the following semester. While on probation, the student's activities were carefully limited by his academic
dean. The new system, called simply Scholastic Regulations in the General Information Bulletin, entails an almost complete about-face in procedure. Grades and the number of hours passed by the student are tabulated at the end of the spring semester. Fall grades and hours passed are not taken into account until then. This places the responsibility of making up a deficient fall semester entirely upon the student.
Hawever, if the scholastic requirements are not satisfied by the end of the spring semester, the student is placed on scholastic suspension.
These requirements are specifically stated in the general bulletin as follows:

1. A full-time student who has concluded one semester must have earned at least six semester hours of credit;
2. a full-time student, who has concluded two, three, four, or five semesters must have earned at least nine semester hours of credit during his full time stud
six or more semesters must have earned at least tweive semester hours of creat in his last semester; and
3. a part-time student must have earned credit for at least half of the semester hours for which he is registered.

The scholastic probation system set forth a grade-point requirement under which the student enrolled for nine or more semester hours was required to make at least three grade points during the semester. However, the scholastic regulations that govern Techsans now make no mention of any such requirement.

Perhaps the student that derives the greatest advantage from the present system in the freshman. Previously, he was allowed only one semester to adjust to the changes from high school to college-and he was still expected to
make his grades. Now, he is piven to become firmly established in the college environment before his eligibility is determined. However, the freshmen are not the only students to benefit from this new system. It is a step forward toward inducing more individual responsibility on the part of all students.

No longer does the dean of admissions issue the student a semester-by-semester report of his progress and make elementary threats to take away privileges and liberties if he doesn't
knuckle down and study the next semester. This is good. After all, who knows semester. This is good. After all, who knows the progress,
capacity, intellectual sincerity and past successes and failures of the student better than the student himself?
A college education is not a legal require-
ment. It is offered to those that want it, and hose who want it to those that want it, and to accept the responsibility of meeting the minimum scholastic requirements of their own volition.
