Vietnam was a gradual campaign of seek-and-destroy missions, meant to slowly force North Vietnam leadership out of power, Reckner said. An overwhelming show of force could bring Hussein under control without United States long-term involvement.

The current Middle East crisis is different from Vietnam in that men, women and minority groups all serve together, Reckner said. This raises certain moral and ethical questions that many Americans are not willing

# Richards sworn in as governor; promises 'New Texas'

AUSTIN (AP) - After praying for peace, Ann Richards was sworn in as governor Tuesday, leading a "People's March" to the Capitol and promising a "New Texas."

Richards, 57, is the first woman to become governor since Miriam "Ma" Ferguson took the oath on Jan. 17, 1933.

The Democrat took her oath of office shortly after noon before a crowd estimated by the Texas Department of Public Safety at 15,000 to 20,000.

Richards said her term would be one for the history books.

"Today, the historians will record that a new administration, different from any in the past, began," she told cheering supporters after succeeding retiring Republican Bill Clements.

"The people of Texas are back, and they're waiting and they're watching us," she said.

Frequently interrupted by cheers and applause, Richards sounded the New Texas theme she used to launch her campaign in June 1989.

"Today, we have a vision of a Texas where opportunity knows no race, no gender, no color - a glimpse of the possibilities that can happen in government if we simply open the doors and let the people in. Tomorrow, we have to build that Texas," she said.

Richards, who made reform of government ethics a cornerstone of her campaign against Republican Clayton Williams, also renewed her

pledge to clean up government. She said state officials must act in a manner "where every decision is measured against the high stan-

As he left the Capitol, Clements said, "Well, it's goodbye and thank you very much." The Republican served two four-year terms since 1979, making him the longestserving governor in Texas history.



Why are we going to war? The Bush Administration cannot give a clear and persuasive answer to that question. So now all of us must piece together the rationale from a series of ten disjointed "sound bites" offered as reasons. None really holds up on close inspection.







## Coppola emerges victorious with latest 'Godfather'

The most anticipated film of the year proves to live up to even the most rigorous hype and speculation.

Francis Ford Coppola's epic cinematic masterpiece continues to a slightly different tune but with the same enrapturing feel.



After the heart-breaking loss to the No. 12-ranked Arkansas Lady Razorbacks Saturday, the Texas Tech women's basketball team continues Southwest Conference play at 5 p.m. today when they travel to Autry Court in Houston to battle with the Rice Owls.

The 64-62 loss to Arkansas halted the Red Raiders' eight-game winning streak and also ended Tech's unbeaten record in SWC-play.

Coach Marsha Sharp said she hopes the Raiders can put the defeat behind them and get ready for the Rice game.

"We're going to have to look to those veteran kids again and they're going to have to come out and give us a little bit of leadership here," Sharp said at her weekly press conference Monday.

Although Tech holds a 13-3 series advantage over Rice, the Owls won two years ago in Houston.

The Raiders have not won a game at Autry Court since 1988 when Tech prevailed 73-59.

Rice presents a problem for the Raiders because the Owls look to all positions on the floor for points. Four of Rices' starters are averaging in double figures.

The biggest challenge should come from the forward position, where the Owls feature freshman Marsha Frese and junior Evanda

Frese averages 11.7 points and 5.2 rebounds per game while Barnes leads the team averaging 14.9 points and 9.7 rebounds per contest.

Tech will counter with the inside game of junior Teresa McMillan, junior Jennifer Buck and juniortransfer Tami Wilson.

McMillan edged out Krista Kirkland in leading the team with 13.5 points per game. Kirkland is close behind averaging 13.4 points.





## Rice welcomes Tech to 'The Jungle'



After suffering back-to-back home losses to Southwest Conference foes Arkansas and Baylor, the Texas Tech men's basketball team takes to the road as the Red Raiders put their two-game conference road winning streak on the line as they take on Rice at 7:30 tonight at Autry Court (a.k.a. "The Jungle") in Houston.

The Owls enter the contest with an overall record of 5-8, 0-3 in league play.

Tech coach Gerald Myers said Rice may be better prepared for this game since the Owls have already faced two of the conference's tougher opponents.

"Rice, Baylor, SMU, TCU and Texas Tech; when all those teams play each other they are going to play harder and probably put more



emphasis on the game than when they play Arkansas, Texas, and Houston because those are games they feel they can win, " Myers said. "Rice will come out and probably play harder, but we will give it our best shot."

Rice features 6-foot-9 center Brent Scott from Everett High School in Lansing, Mich., who is averagig 17.0 points and 11.9 rebounds per outing so far this season.

Last year, Scott was the SWC Freshman of the Year averaging



Also facing the Raiders is 6-foot-10 junior forward Kenneth Rourke, who averaged 10.5 points and 8.2 rebounds per game as a sophomore last year, and held the school record for rebounds in a season as a freshman with 202.

Rourke is second to Scott in scoring and rebounds with 11.5 points and 6.9 boards per outing.

Tech comes into the game 2-2 in conference play and 5-11 overall after a 113-86 blowout at the hands of the Razorbacks.

"We're going to have to have the same intensity level and same caliber of execution offensively. To be able to beat Rice, we're going to have to play that way, " Myers

That intensity, however, has been missing in the paint as the Raiders are averaging 33.6 rebounds per game, while their opponents are averaging 36.1. When Tech outreboundes its opponents, its record is 4-1. But when the Raiders' opponents control the boards, their record is 1-10.

"We will probably press them some and try to keep their post men from getting right there down under the basket," Myers said.

Myers also said he was pleased with the performance of Bryant Moore against Arkansas and Baylor. Moore had nine assists and two steals to top off his performance against the Razorbacks. Moore is also averaging 21 minutes and 5.8 assists per contest.
