Improvement tests and investiations will continue through be held.

Included in the group of bulls are 101 Herefords, four polled Herefords and 31 Angus. There are 26 jackpot bulls (prime beef animals) coming from 29 cooperators. These coopera ors are paying Tech to run the tests.
Dr. George F. Ellis is manager and animal husbandman of the Kilgore Center, which was dedicated in March.
