Soviets Say Flight Basis For Longer Trips

MOSCOW (P) — The Russians said Tuesday the 24hour, 17-minute orbital flight of three men in the space ship Voskhod—sunrise—laid "a firm foundation for lasting trips in cosmic space."

Speculation that the world's first flight of a multiseat space vehicle may have ended sooner than originally planned was officially ignored.

The Soviet government paper Isvestia said, however, the astronauts asked permission to remain in space another day and were refused.

Premier Khrushchev's Cabinet, the Presidium of Parliament and the Communist party's Central Committee joined in a statement of praise for the pioneering feat.

Craft Lands

The craft came down through dense clouds at 10:57 a.m. to what was called its preassigned spot on Soviet soil. Izvestia said it landed with the aid of parachutes. All aboard it were reported feeling well.

The space ship had completed 16 orbits when Col.

Vladimir Komarov, 37, a former fighter pilot and the flight commander, was ordered to switch on braking devices, Moscow said.

A dispatch by the Soviet news agency datelined Petropavlovsk said the capsule landed on a field of a state farm in the virgin land development area and the farm's workers were the first to greet them.

Soviet Leads

Touching by implication that the United States is running two years or so behind in the manned space race, the Kremlin statement said: "Every victory of the Soviet people in space shows convincingly that Soviet science is in the van of world scientific thought."

The United States hopes to launch a two-man capsule to begin its Gemini series early next year, then put up in 1967 or nearly 1968 a manned laboratory that apparently would more nearly compare with the Veskhod.

Rocket 'Powerful'

Development of more powerful and perfect rockets caused wonder as to whether it could long stay on course.

was called by the Russians a prime factor in the exploit that sent Komarov, scientists Konstantin Feokristov and Dr. Boris Yegorov around the earth 16 times in a capsule fitted to give them shirtsleeve working conditions.

The trip, in a cigar-shaped orbit ranging from 110 miles to 255 miles from the earth, totaled about 435,000 miles, the Russians said.

Program A Success

"The program of scientific research, designed for 24 hours of flight, was accomplished in full," an official announcement said.

The proclamation of a 24-hour design seemed to be a switch from references to plans for research on "a long flight" after the capsule was blasted from its launching pad Monday near Baykonur, in the Kazah Republic, 1,250 miles southeast of Moscow.

Various sources had expected the vehicle to stay up from two to five days, though the highly elliptical orbit

Suffers Cut In Bath Fall

KANSAS CITY (A) — Former President Harry S. Truman was rushed by ambulance to Research Hospital late Tuesday afternoon.

He was taken to the emergency room at 4:18 p.m.

A hospital spokesman, Bill Wittman, said the former president apparently suffered a fall "which resulted in a laceration to his head."

He said Truman was admitted after emergency treatment.

The attending physician was Dr. Wallace Graham who has been his doctor since Truman entered the White House.

Wittman said Truman was carried in on a stretcher. The former president was conscious, he said.

Truman was 80 years old last May 8.

Last May, the former president suffered a stomach upset that kept him away from his office for several days. He was forced to cancel a trip to Lexington, Va., for the dedication of the General Marshall Memorial Library.

Stop The Smear Business

REMEMBER THE ADVANTAGES a Goldwater-Johnson contest was going to have? For the first time in many years there would be a solid, fundamental discussion of the issues, between candidates who genuinely differed.

What happened?

The Democrats are calling Goldwater "demagogue" and "radical" and "extremist." Some even term him "fascist." Republicans refer to Johnson as "corrupt," "experient" and a liar. They refer to Humphrey as "radical," "far-left" and "soft on Communism."

It is useless to discuss which side, if either, is the more guilty. Both parties have abandoned their pledges to give the voters a responsible campaign.

There is still time to get back on the road to relevance. Bits and pieces have emerged enough to indicate that a solid discussion is possible. But Democrats have to get over the idea that Goldwater is below rational discussion. Sen. Mike Mansfield (D., Mont.), who has always been an extra-ordinarily fair man, commented just yesterday that he didn't think Goldwater "would be nearly as irresponsible as President as some people believe."

Republicans have some need to get over the messianism which makes them condescend to Democrats and treat them as heretics. Mutual vilification accomplishes nothing and recriminations are a waste of time.


So the Daily has a proposal. Let each of the candidates for public office in this election think of something good to say publicly about his opponent. Let each candidate find something he has in common with his opponent and exploit it into a dialog. Let them comfort the voters jointly whenever possible.

This election is neither the last chance to save America from the onslaught of creeping conspiracy, nor one in which we risk changing to a fascist or military government. Let us-please-stop the smears and vilification and get down to the very serious matter of governing these United States. —THE MINNESOTA DAILY

Students Oppose **Tuition Increase**

Dear Editor:

This letter is in response to an article which appeared in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal Oct. 13. The Texas Commission on Higher Education has officially recommended a \$50 increase in tuition for state-supported schools. I am against this increase.

Many students, such as myself, pay all or nearly all of their college expenses. I actually know of few students who don't work parttime somewhere. With the present system, the total cost of tuition and fees range from sixty-seven to one hundred dollars (this does not include books).

An additional fifty dollars could mean the difference between a college education for some or more or all. This raise in tuition is especially inopportune when adequate off-campus parking costs up to forty dollars per year.

It can be demonstrated quite convincingly that money is no absolute barrier for the bright student, but there are few who fall into this class. The trend seems to be away from self-help.
