The Rodeo Association won a moral victory, Tuesday, when it obtained from the Student Council a recommendation that the Rodeo team be allowed to participate in this year's Intercollegiate Rodeos.

The Association, although it fought hard and with what we believe were legitimate weapons, had very little hope of having its suspension raised whether or not it had gotten the recommendation from the Council.

It got the most it could reasonably hope for this year. This was probably taken into consideration by the investigating committee when it formed its recommendations. The old saying about descretion and valour almost surely influenced the members.

A chance for a partial victory is more desirable than no chance for a complete win.

The letter from Cotton Club owner Ralph Lowe was the big gun on the side of the Rodeors. It flatly contradicted the reason given by the admimistration for placing the Association on probation-that the dance held at the Cotton Club May 6, was sponsored by the Rodeo group.

However, these are just the first returns. The Student Council can only make recommendations.

It is now up to the Administration to decide if it wants to make the final vote coincide with the will of the students as expressed by the Council.
