The film is a Sivedish documentary assembled to permit the Nazis to tell, through their own eyes, speeches, and cameras, the history of their rise and fall.

Male students living in the residence halls make better grade than those living off-campus. This fact has been proved by statistics released by the dean of men's office Thursday. The figure were compiled on freshmen enrolle at Tech between 1954-61. The freshman clas was because it is the most stable group from which to figure statistics, according to the report statistics, according to the report
Of the 7,191 freshman men enrolled during the six-year period, 62 per cent of the off-campus residents failed to make a 2.0 grade average as compared to 53 per cent of the residence hall inhabitants. In the same group 47 per cent of those not making their grades the first semester dropped out of school. The on-campus students had a drop-out of only 22 per cent.
