

Diamondmen take double-header

Tech took both ends of a doubleheader here Tuesday from Eastern New Mexico 6-4 and 2-1.

The Raiders had to go into double extra innings to win the nightcap. A throwing error by Greyhound pitcher Chic Keifer allowed Rob Moore to score from second base with the winning run.

RAIDER pitcher Phil Stephenson and Keifer were locked in a head-on duel going into the seventh inning when the Greyhounds picked

up their only run of the game. Gary Hackney reached first on an error and scored on two consecutive singles by the 'Hounds.

The Raiders tied it in the bottom half of the inning when Don Champion reached base on an error. Dick Bartley ran for Champion and scored on a sacrifice by Eddie Stiles.

Sidearm junk baller Pat Abbott relieved Stephenson in the seventh and got credit for the win.

IN THE first game the Raiders had to hang on for

dear life as the 'Hounds staged a three run rally in the top of the seventh only to fall two runs shy.

The Raiders opened up fast and furious as John McIntyre walked in the first inning and stole second and scored on a single by Champion. In the second inning Norman Schuessler homered to put Tech ahead 2-0.

In the third Tech added four more runs as they had three consecutive singles and a double. Ralph Cox led off with a single followed by Eldon Frost, McIntyre and a double by Champion. Champion then scored on a single by Schuessler.

Tech prof appointed to NCTE committee

The National Council for Teachers of English has appointed Dr. Faye L. Bumpass to the National Committee on Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages.

Dr. Bumpass is professor of Spanish and director of workshops for teachers of English as a second language. She is well-known in the United States and abroad in this area of teaching, and has published 23 textbooks from kindergarten through junior high school grades.

The committee serves as a clearing house for inquiry, comment and exchange of ideas and experiences related to the problems of teaching English as a second or foreign language in the United States and abroad. The appointment of Dr. Bumpass is part of a program of expansion by the National Council to increase the effectiveness of teaching the English language and literature in the nation's schools and colleges.

at Roosevelt University, Chicago, in July and will serve on a panel of specialists to terminate the NDEA Institute at the University of Texas at El Paso in August.

Dr. Bumpass' most recent publications include a five-book series for teaching reading to non-native English speakers for upper elementary grades and junior level entitled, "Let's Read Stories," and a two-book basic text series entitled "We Speak English," published by McGraw-Hill and the American Book Company respectively.

Soil judges to compete in New York

Tech's soil judging team will compete this week-end in the National Soils Judging Contest at Cornell in Ithaca, New York.

Tech, winner of the regional contest last October at Texas A&M was eligible for the event in Ithaca. A total of 12 teams will compete in the judging of different soils. Tech's team won the national contest in 1964 and finished second in both 1965 and 1966.

For the past seven years the Tech judging team has finished either first or second in the regional competition.

Tech Agronomy professor B. I. Allen heads Tech's judging team. Team members are Bill Doak and Tommy Hallmark, both of Snyder, Bill Harris from Colorado City and Mike Risinger of Bulah.

The Greyhounds' record is now 15-11 while Tech is 10-14. Tech has come alive in the last half of the season as they have now won three games in a row and seven out of their last nine.

The Raiders next encounter Abilene Christian College in Abilene this weekend and then next Tuesday they travel to Portales for another two-game stand with Eastern New Mexico.

ANNUAL TECH DAY
Thirty-five Texas Tech student chapters from California to Washington D.C. will observe the 13th Annual Tech Day Saturday with outdoor socials and banquets.

Rep. Elmer Tarbox, Lubbock, and Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene sponsored a resolution in the Texas legislature designating May 6 as Tech Day throughout the state. The legislature passed the resolution early this month.

The purpose is to bring exes and other friends of Tech together for the common enjoyment of the tradition and heritage of the school.

Wayne James, executive director of Texas Tech Ex-Students Association, said Coach Burl Huffman will speak to some of the chapters on each of the next three weekends.

Wayne said last year the day was even observed in Vietnam.
