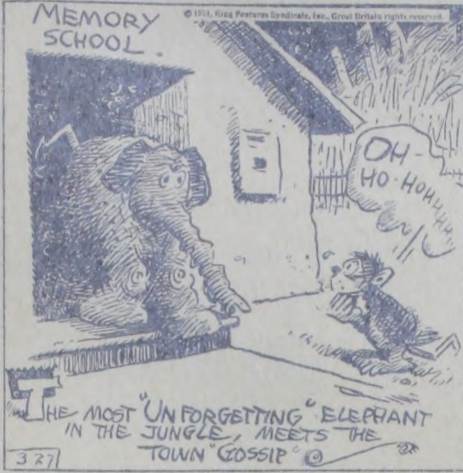

Dr. George R. WEILAND of Yale University delivered an address before the Faculty Club at 7:30 in the Chemistry Auditorium on "Flowers and Coals" last Tuesday night. Dr. Weiland was the guest of the Faculty Club at an informal dinner at the Hilton Hotel.

Dr. Weiland is a specialist on paleobotany and is making a tour of the South and of Texas studying and collecting specimens of fossil cycades for future study.

The Sago palm of present day greenhouses is one of the few survivors of the cycade era. Modern trees and shrubs are higher developments of more primitive forms of forest life. Dr. Weiland said that Texas furnished the best specimens of cycades known to scientists.
