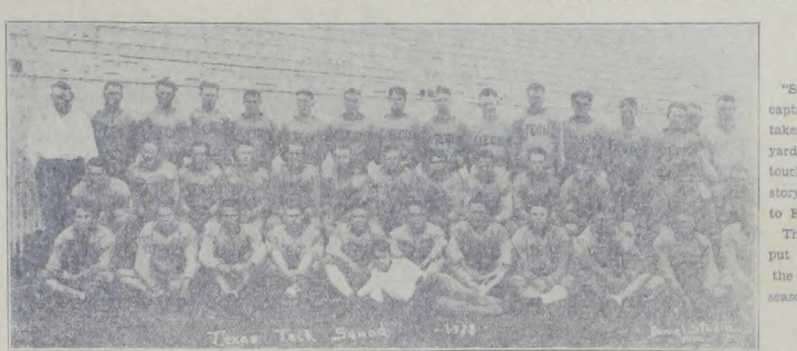

Matadors Defeat Shreiners 7-0; Score Made Near End Of The Game After Much Strong Competition

Defense of Both Teams Was Creditable; Tech Falls To Cross Line Several Times With Few Yards To Go. Receiving a punt on his own 28 yard line, Captain Percy Walker, carried the ball across the goal line after a brilliant dash of 72 yards. Coming in the last minute of the game, the play dispelled any fear of another scoreless tie between the Matadors and the Schreiner Mountaineers, which seemed evident throughout the entire game.

showed that he had lost none of his fighting ability. He made some of the hardest tackles that has been seen since last year's game with A. C. C. A large amount of credit for the huge gains around the ends must go to Doc Barfoot, end. It was Barfoot who cut down many would be tacklers and cleared the path for the backs. The only disappointing feature of the game, from a Tech standpoint, was the lack of a final drive within scoring distance. Time after time the Matadors were within the enemy's 10 yard line, and a score seemed certain. But at this point the Mountaineer line held stubbornly. With the Mountaineers fighting desperately to stave off defeat, the ball would go over the end several times. But when the back got their offensive plays polished down to a finer point, a larger score will be certain. Mueller, half, was a constant threat for the visitors. He with his mate, Chestham, made a number of 40 yard punts. Harris, center, also made a good man on the defense. The visitors backfield, Burr, fullback, Mueller and Hilliard, (halves), and Dabbs, quarter, was a wonderful scoring combination. Their speed is seldom seen on a college gridiron, but cooperation and interference was sadly lacking from their mates. Given good interference and the outcome might have been entirely different. The game play by play: First Quarter Tech wins the toss and chooses to defend the south goal. Chestham kicks off to Percy Walker. Walker receives the ball on his own 45 yard line and returns it 9 yards. Hodges goes through the line for a first down. P. Walker gets 2 around left end. Hodges makes 1 yard through center. Brothers makes it a first down around right end. Walker rips off 9 more around left end. Tech is penalized 15 yards for holding. A pass Percy Walker to Hodges is incomplete. Another pass, Percy Walker to Marr also is incomplete. Tech is penalized 5 yards for a second incomplete pass. Brothers punts 20 yards to Mueller, who is downed in his tracks. Hilliard makes 4 yards through tackle. On the next play Hilliard fumbles and the ball is recovered by Tech. Percy Walker downed for a 5 yard loss when a Mountaineer breaks through. Brothers carries the ball through right tackle for 7 yards. Marr adds 10 more around right end. Hodges hits center for 5. Percy Walker brushed the left tackle for 4 yards. Hodges makes another first down, placing the ball on Schreiner's 5-yard line. Percy Walker is thrown for a 3 yard loss. A lateral pass Brothers to Walker nets 1 yard. Hodges hits the line for 1 yard. Percy makes only 4 yards and the ball goes over to Schreiner on their own 2 yard line. Burr punts 20 yards to Brothers. Marr loses a yard in an attempt to circle right end. Mueller, back, interferes with a Tech pass receiver and the ball is given to Tech, where the ball was grounded. 18 yards down the field. Brothers hits

through the line. On the next play he punts 32 yards. Schreiner signals for a fair catch on their own 40 yard line. Chestham then kicks 40 yards to Marr, who returns it 10 yards. Brothers brushes left tackle for a 9 yard gain. Hodges makes it a first down with 3 more. With the ball on the 50 yard line, Marr makes a side-stepping run of 25 yards. Hodges hits the line for 2 more. Harris, Schreiner center, intercepts a Tech pass, and is downed in spectacular manner by Coppage. Burr makes 1 yard at center. DeWitt again breaks through and throws Mueller for a yard loss. Marr intercepts a pass from Chestham. With the ball on Tech's own 52 yard line, Brothers punts for 40 yards and it is killed by Barfoot on Schreiner's own 19 yard line. Dabbs gets 4 through tackle. Coppage throws Burr for a 2 yard loss. Mueller punts 40 yards to Levi Walker, who returns 15. Levi Walker, who punts 13. Levi Walker on a long end run makes 4 yards. Marr makes one.

Second Quarter With the ball on Schreiner's 19 yard line. Percy Walker attempts to circle left end, but gains nothing. Levi Walker hits right tackle for one yard. Percy Walker's pass to Barfoot is incomplete over the goal line and it is Schreiner's ball on their own 20 yard line. Mueller bucks center for 3 yards. Percy Walker throws Burr for a 3 yard loss. Burr punts to Percy Walker who fumbles it. The ball is finally recovered by Hodges. On the next play Percy again fumbles the ball but recovers for a gain of 3 yards. Levi Walker gains nothing through the line. Percy completes a short pass to Levi Walker. With 3 to go, Hodges plows the line for 3 yards, for a first down. Tech fumbles but Percy Walker recovers for a gain of 3 yards. Percy Walker is thrown for a 2 yard loss, but on the next play circles left end for 7 yards. Levi Walker gains nothing in a line play. Another attempt and the ball goes over. Corley, Tech center, throws Dabbs for a 2 yard loss. Hilliard goes through center for 3 yards. Burr punts 30 yards out of bounds. Percy Walker brushes left tackle for 3 yards, Woodriddle hits center for 4 more. Percy Walker goes through the same place for an additional - and makes it the first down. Walker makes 5 around left end. Percy Walker hits the line for no gain. But on the next play, a short end run, adds 5 yards for a first down. Percy runs across the gridiron out of bounds for a gain of 2 yards. Chestham throws Percy before he gets started, fumbles the ball but Burr recovers for a 2 yard loss. Burr sets off a fine punt of 50 yards to Archibald who is tackled in his tracks. It is Tech's ball on her own 17 yard line. Shytle makes 1 yard. Levi Walker punts 40 yards to Mueller who returns it 10 yards. Mueller hits the line for 1 yard. Bohannon makes 2 through center. On the next play Woodriddle intercepts a pass and runs 50 yards before he is downed by Schreiner's safety man. The gun sounds in the midst of his run. It was one of the prettiest runs of the afternoon.

Third Quarter Chestham kicks off to Brothers, who returns it back 12 yards. Brothers hits the line for no gain. After a fine punt to Mueller, who returns it, Knowles downed him in one of the best tackles of the evening. Schreiner's ball on their own 10 yard line. Burr fumbles but recovers after a gain of 1 yard. Tech is penalized 15 yards, when Barfoot is alleged to have rounded the punter. Dabbs gets away for 25 yards around left end. Dabbs passes 6 more to Mueller. DeWitt breaks through the line and downs Mueller. A Schreiner pass is incomplete. It is grounded by Levi Walker. Chestham punts 25 yards out of danger. It is Tech's ball on their own 25 yard line. Brothers' punt is returned 15 yards by Mueller. Dabbs is thrown for a 10 yard loss. Levi Walker intercepts a pass on his own 37 yard line. He makes 2 yards

Fourth Quarter A pass to Hodges nets 24 yards. It is Tech's ball on Schreiner's 20 yard line. Levi Walker makes 5 around left end. Walker makes 2 through the line. Percy Walker pass to Lassiter nets 8 yards. A first down is missed by Tech by about 3 inches. The ball goes over. Burr punts to Lassiter, 30 yards, who returns it 5. Harris downs Percy Walker after he steps 7 yards. No gain by Levi Walker. Hodges hits the line for 1 yard. Hodges hits it again but fails to gain. The ball goes over. On two plays Mueller makes 5 through the line. Schreiner is penalized 5 yards. Bohannon hits the line for 4 yards. Mueller punts 40 yards to Lassiter, who returns the pigskin back 15, to his own 44 yard line. Percy passes 12 yards to Levi Walker. Hodges goes over right guard for 1 yard. Levi Walker punts out of bounds. Percy Walker passes to Percy Walker but no gain is made. Levi Walker punts out of bounds on Schreiner's 18 yard line. Dabbs falls to gain at right tackle. Dabbs reels off 4 yards off of tackle. Mueller punts 36 yards to Lassiter, who returns it to his own 49 yard line. Waller makes 6 over tackle. Hodges gains 2 yards in two success. Five plays. Payne gets the Schreiner punt receiver on Schreiner 10 yard line. Mueller punts out of bounds on his own 32 yard line. Waller rips through the line for 6 yards. He tries it again but fails to gain. 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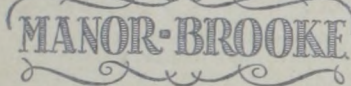

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FRATERNITIES FACING PROBE

FACULTY COMMITTEE TO RULE ON FUTURE AT UNIVERSITY

AUSTIN, Oct. 2.—Fraternities as an institution at the University of Texas were on trial for their lives today, 36 hours after the death of a student in the course of a fraternity initiation.

The university board of regents last night instructed President H. Y. Benedict to appoint a faculty committee to investigate all fraternities and sororities at the university with a view of determining whether they should be abolished, or more strictly regulated. The committee also is to be asked to investigate the death of Nolte McElroy Sunday night. This action had been requested by Delta Kappa Epsilon, the fraternity which was initiating McElroy at the time of his death.

County authorities seemed to feel that the case is closed as far as they are concerned. The matter was turned over to the grand jury for investigation today but District Attorney Moore indicated no indictments were being considered.

McElroy died in a hospital a short time after he had collapsed while wringing through electrically charged bed springs as a part of his initiation. The bed springs were charged with current from the light socket, which was cut down by means of a rheostat. McElroy's funeral will be held at Buda, near here, tomorrow.

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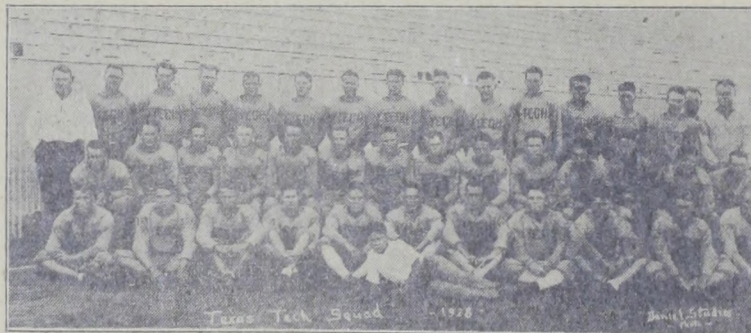
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
