### Treasure in the Sea

An Italian company has been formed to recover builton sunk in Yipo bay 200 years ago. It has found one of the old galleons at the very outset of its search, an anchor, a chain and some cannon having been brought up as evidence. The salvors have hopes of raising the vessel bodily and removing the contents at leisure. Vigo. a town in northwest Spain, has figured at least four times in the annals of English war. ## Trees of Vast Age

The life of man seems indeed but a transient hour, hardly long enough "to look about us and to die," when we compare it with the existence of a tree. In comparison to some of the sequoias Methuselah ded in infancy. A United States senator has lately made public certain information received by him about the amount of history stored away in the great trees of California. One of moderate size, ffteen feet in diameter five feet from the ground, reveals the following experiences: In 271 B. C. it began its existence. In 245 A. D., when it was 516 years of age, a forest fire burned on its trunk a sear three feet in width. After 1,196 years of plaid life in another fire, in 1441 A. D., the tree, aged 1,712, received another injury. Another scar followed in 1589 and was not covered with new tissue for fifty-six years. The worst attack of all was in 1797, when the tree, then 2,968 years of age, was attacked by a fire which left a scar eighteen feet wide, reduced by 1890, in 103 years, to four-teen feet. Poultry Culture in Denmark.
Poultry culture has assumed large proportions in Denmark during recent personal proportions in Denmark during recent years. In 1871 only 50,000 dozen of eggs were exported, but the next year it jumped up to 555,000 dozen, and in 1873 it made another great gain, 2,310,000 dozen being exported that year. In 1895 the Danish Co-operative Egg Export association was organized, and the next year the regs exported 1873 it made another great gain, 2,310,000 dozen being exported that year, In 1895 the Danish Co-operative Egg Export association was organized, and the next year the eggs exported amounted to 20,378,000 dozen. In 1992, the last year for which we have statistics, there were exported 53,987,000 dozen. The producers of these eggs are mostly small farmers with only two or three acres of land.

The breeds most popular in Denmar: are said to be the Brown Leginors, Spanish Minorcas and the Andalusians. Plymouth Rocks and Wylandottes have been introduced there, and are growing in favor. Langshaus and Orpingtons are also beginning to draw attention. Brahmas and Coichins are not popular, being considered too coarse and too offen "broody."

Mechanical incubators and brooders are being used, but the most popular brooder is said to be the turkey. Fewpeople, however, make a specialty of poultry farming, and there are few large poultry establishments in the kingdom. Egg production is carried on as a side issue.


