Bush announces Iraqi army defeated

WASHINGTON - President Bush announced Wednesday night that "Kuwait is liberated. Irag's army is defeated." He said that at midnight "all United States and coalition forces will suspend offensive combat operations."

In an Oval Office address, Bush said the allied forces would implement a permanent cease fire when Iraq releases all coalition prisoners of war, hostages of third-country nations and the remains of all who have fallen.

He also said Baghdad must comply with all United Nations resolutions. Iraqi officials said earlier in the day that they are ready to comply with some but not all of the

He also said the suspension of combat operations was dependent upon Iraqi forces not firing upon coalition troops and no more Scud missile attacks.

After 100 hours of ground war, defeated. Our military objectives above the capital of a free and sovereign nation and the American flag flies above the embassy" in Kuwait City.

"This war is now behind us," Bush said. "Ahead of us is the task of achieving a potentialy historic peace" in the Middle East.

Bush made his dramatic announcement on the 42nd day of the conflict with Iraq.

The cessation of offensive action came after a tank battle in southern Iraq ended any serious threat from Iraq's ballyhooed Republican

"It is up to Iraq whether the suspension on the part of the coalition becomes a permanent cease fire," Bush said, adding later: "If Iraq violates these terms, coalition forces will be free to resume military operations.'

He began his televised address simply. "Kuwait is liberated," Bush said. "Iraq's army is

Bush said, "The Kuwaiti flag flies are met." He said it was not time for gloating or euphoria, but for pride in the troops of the coalition.

The president spoke as commander in chief of 537,000 American forces in the gulf, and the head of an unprecedented international coalition marshalled to counter Saddam Hussein's invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2.

Seven months ago, he said, the nation drew a line in the sand and said Iraq's aggression would not

"America and the world have kept their word," he said.

Bush said he'd asked Secretary of State James A. Baker III to work with the United Nations Security Council on "the necessary arranagements for this war to be ended" formally.

"At every opportunity, I have said to the peopel of Iraq that our quarrel was not with them but instead with their leadership," Bush said. "This remains the case.

Security council rejects Iraqi peace offer

UNITED NATIONS - The Security Council on Wednesday rejected Iraq's latest peace proposal and warned Baghdad that it must agree to all 12 U.N. resolutions before a cease-fire can be declared.

Earlier, Iraq's ambassador had said his government accepted council resolutions guaranteeing Kuwait's sovereignty and would accept liability for war damages.

In a private session, the council instructed its president, Ambassador S.S. Mumbengegwi of Zimbabwe, to tell the Iraqi ambassador that Baghdad must honor all the resolutions passed since Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

Iraqi Ambassador Abdul Amir al-Anbari then went to the council chambers to meet with Mumbengegwi. Leaving the meeting a short time later, Al-Anbari would say only that he had received the council's ultimatum.

Iraq's letter Wednesday to the Security Council, signed by Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz, cited its acceptance of resolutions 662, which declares the annexation of Kuwait null and void, and 674, which holds Iraq liable for abuses of the rights of Kuwaitis and invites nations to collect information on atrocities

and war damages. Iraq has already declared it is obeying Resolution 660, calling for Iraq's complete and unconditional withdrawal from Kuwait.

Soviet Ambassador Yuli Vorontsov, whose nation proposed several failed peace efforts before the ground war began, said further allied fighting was not necessary since Iraq's army is out of Kuwait and nearly totally destroyed.

"But we haven't received yet firm confirmation from the government of Iraq that they've agreed to all 12 resolutions of the Security Council. It is very important to get that word," he said.

"We strongly recommend to the

government of Iraq to make that statement as soon as possible," he said.

British Ambassador Sir David Hannay said Iraq's acceptance of the three resolutions was insufficient.

"I suppose you could say, 'Three down, and nine to play,' at the moment. We appear to have Iraqi acceptance of two more resolutions, but there are nine to go," he said.

Hannay said the council president would also be seeking clarification of how soon prisoners of war would be released, and confirmation that Kuwaitis abducted by Iraqi troops would be released.

U.S. Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering added: "The council isn't here bargaining with Iraq. It's made no deals, the council's been very clear. Tell us when you are ready to comply with the 12 resolutions, and we'll take our next steps from there."

Senate approves ethics proposal

AUSTIN - The Texas Senate approved two ethics proposals Wednesday to put public officials and lobbyists on their best behavior.

A proposed constitutional amendment providing for a bipartisan state ethics commission, with broad powers, was adopted 26-3.

The measure is subject to voter approval at a Nov. 5 statewide election, if it passes the House. A bill, which only needs legislative

approval, was sent to the House on a 28-0 vote. Both measures were sponsored by Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville.

The bill would create the ethics commission to enforce rules, limit lobbyists' expenditures on legislators, ban local governments from hiring independent lobbyists to sway the

"We are trying to appeal to the nonscience majors," said Patricia Metz, professor of chemistry. "The course has a broad-based appeal, but a student does not have to be a science major to enroll. A student can take the course whether they are seniors majoring in chemistry or have absolute-

ly no knowledge of chemistry at all." Dasgupta said that he hopes all majors will take the course.

"The information that will be provided in this course will be needed later in life," he said. "We want them to be informed about how chemistry is involved in everyday activities. We view this as an informative course rather than a course that tests what you have already learned.

"Chemistry 1303 will provide a previous education in chemistry or educated and informed citizen."

Texan injured in Scud attack

PHARR, Texas - An Army noncommissioned officer from Texas is recovering from injuries he suffered in the Iraqi Scud missile attack that killed 28 American

Sgt. Ruben Carranza Jr. sustained burns in the attack on an American barrack Monday and was in fair condition at a Dhahran military hospital, his father, Ruben Carranza Sr., said Tuesday night. The explosion injured 100 other

soldiers, said military officials. The younger Carranza, a 21-yearold Army sergeant from Pharr, was at the outskirts of Dhahran, 200 miles south of Kuwait, when the attack came hours before Iraq announced that it was pulling out of

the occupied emirate. "We are thankful to God, that he is all right, that was a terrible thing that happened," said Carranza's father.







The term alternative applies to music and lifestyles, but the diversity of the recently opened Kitchen Club adds to its usage.

The Kitchen Club, 2411 Main, is open 11 a.m. to 2 a.m. Monday through Saturday and 5 p.m. to 2 a.m. Sunday.

Anthony Poe, club manager, said the Kitchen Club's unique style and musical surroundings break its limitations from an ordinary restaurant/lounge to an alternative cafe.

"We know this is Lubbock, but we want to be urban contemporary," Poe said. "We want to bring across the progressive element (of the music). I know that word scares people, but we want to be cool not scary."

At the Kitchen Club the music is the difference. The club regularly tunes its radio to KTXT-FM, and at night, the upstairs lounge transforms itself into a disc similarities between the cafe and jockey's playground.

"The food is basic - hamburgers, fries, etc., but nothing is more than three dollars. Plus, we serve until 1 a.m. which makes us a late night spot to go grab a snack."

Boxing Hall to induct 26 new members

CANASTOTA, N.Y. (AP) — Former heavyweight champions Sonny Liston and Floyd Patterson head a list of 26 boxers and officials who will be inducted into the International Boxing Hall of Fame in June, museum officials announced Tuesday.

Others to be inducted include Tony Zale, Rocky Graziano and Marcel Cerdan, who dominated the middleweight division during the 1940s, according to Edward Brophy, the hall's executive director.

Joining those past champions will be middleweights Gene Fullmer (1957, 1959-1962) and Dick Tiger (1963, 1965-1966), who also reigned as the light heavyweight champion from 1966-1968; lightweights Beau Jack and Carlos Ortiz (1962-1965 and 1965-1968), and featherweights Ruben Olivares (1974-1975) and Salvador Sanchez (1980).

"There's no question these fighters belong here," Brophy, who helped found the museum in 1988, said. "Between the seven living inductees alone, they fought in a total of 76 world title fights. That proves their legendary status."

"I was thrilled two years ago that they finally opened a real hall of fame for boxers," said Patterson, who was 21 when he KO'd Archie Moore in November 1956 to become the youngest heavyweight champion to that time.

"I'm even more thrilled that they're giving me my own place there," said Patterson, whose adopted son, Tracy, is the current World Boxing Council junior featherweight champion.

"And don't forget, I was the first man to ever regain the championship," said Patterson, who was knocked out by Ingemar Johansson in 1959 and regained the title the following year by knocking out Johansson in five rounds.

Tech netters to battle Abilene Christian

The Texas Tech men's tennis team will compete in its final dual match before entering Southwest Conference play when it takes on Abilene Christian at 1 p.m. today in the Tech Athletic Training Center.

The Red Raiders split matches with New Mexio and Oklahoma last weekend, as Tech suffered its first loss of the season against the Lobos, dropping a 7-2 decision, but bounced back to defeatd the Sooners 6-3.

The Raiders (8-1) are led by junior Fabio Walker, who has compiled a 15-2 record this spring and is currently ranked 15th in the Volvo Tennis Southwest Region rankings.

Walker moved into Tech's No.1 postion after Matt Jackson left the team for medical reasons. Walker is also playing with a new doubles partner in senior Richard Dopson.

The duo is 2-0 while playing together as they took both matches they competed in Albuquerque, N.M.

Dopson is the No. 2 single player and is 9-5 on the year.

Sophomore Shay Coker, a transfer from Rutgers may see his first action of the season this weekend in the No. 6 singles position.

The Raiders begin SWC play Sunday as they take on Arkansas in the ATC.

Howard was booked into city jail and his detention justified.

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
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

As a big sports enthusiast, I have come to appreciate all sports, all aspects of sports and enjoy attending a Tech game any chance I get.


But until Raider sports teams get the much-needed support they deserve, there will contiunue to be more empty seats at a game than full ones.
