Firefighting battle to begin in Kuwait

HOUSTON - Texas oil-well firefighters say they expect to begin battling burning Kuwaiti oil wells within 10 days, but their strategy may be different than originally planned.

Representatives of three firefighting companies returned Monday from a tour of 540 burning wells in Kuwait, saying a water shortage has made traditional firefighting impossible in the war-ravaged country.

"There are some of these fires that we need to put out fast," said T.B. O'Brien, president of a Midland consulting company that is organizing the firefighting effort in Kuwait. "It looks like we're not going to be able to get the water we need."

James Tuppen, an oil firefighter at Houston-based Boots & Coots, said the destruction of Kuwait's water lines by Iraqi troops has made traditional oilwell firefighting impossible.

The catastrophe is costing the tiny Persian Gulf country \$2.7 billion a month in lost revenues and officials said it could take a long as six months to rebuild damaged water lines.

Firefighters usually use massive amounts of water to fireproof their clothing and to cool the burning wells.

Tech buildings safe for shelter

The Texas Tech campus is safe in case of severe weather, which is common during the spring months, said Kishor Mehta, director of the Wind Engineering Research Center at Tech.

Mehta said all of the permanent buildings at Tech, such as residence halls and classrooms, are safe for occupants to seek shelter in during severe weather so people should not be frightened.

"Tornadoes do not occur without a severe thunderstorm," Mehta said. "There is no need to be afraid of them. The chances of a tornado hitting a particular spot is very small."

Mehta said people can take several safety measures during a severe thunderstorm.

"In case of a tornado warning," he said, "the best thing to do is seek shelter in any interior. Don't worry about windows or items outside of the house.

"If a person is outdoors, they need to seek shelter in a building," he said. "Automobiles are not a good place to find shelter. On campus no one should be too far away to



find shelter in a building."

If a person is outdoors and cannot find shelter, he or she should look for shelter in a depression or culvert to avoid flying debris, the cause for most damage and injuries. A person shouldn't take shelter in drainage ditches in case of sudden flooding.

Mehta said that the first floor in most buildings is just as safe as a

"The buildings at Tech are built

with steel and concrete, so even tornadoes cannot completely collapse a bulding," he said. "But make sure to always stay away from glass windows. It is often tempting to look outside and watch a storm, but always be extra careful if you are near a window."

Some other safety tips include staying tuned to television and radio storm warnings that signal severe weather and avoiding opening windows during a storm.



Visually-impaired Tech students have a reasonably simple task in getting around the campus, according to James Beal, rehabilitation counselor for the Texas Commission for the Blind.

"Students can get around campus because they know the shape of the buildings," he said. "But people with visual impairments cannot rely on the visual. A specialist helps familiarize most visually-impaired students with familiarizing themselves with the

"They help them get familiar with the bus routes, grocery stores and other parts of the town so that while they are at Tech, they can take care of what they need to with independence," Beal said.

Beal said that no special classes are needed to help a visually-impaired student get familiar with the campus and that he thinks it is fairly simple for a visually-impaired student to get around Tech.

"Tech has an easy transportation system to follow," he said. "It is one of the easier campuses to get around in. I think that due to the faculty and teacher training programs for the blind, Tech meets the needs of visually-impaired students.

"Tech offers something positive for visually-impaired students," he said. "I believe that is why there is a large number of visually-impaired students on campus."

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Center established for minority organizations

The Texas Tech Multicultural Services Center opened two weeks ago to help meet a need expressed by student organizations, said Phillip Birdine, assistant dean of students.

"The creation of this center was because of a combination of reasons," Birdine said. "We have seen the need for a place like this rising the last few years. It was also recommended by the state coordinating board as a way to promote retention."

The primary function of the center is to distribute information

about minority organizations on campus and as a contact for students interested in minority issues, Birdine said.

The center is staffed by student volunteers, mainly members of the Black Student Association and the Hispanic Student Society.

"We've got students working at the center who like to work hard and do positive things to promote their culture," Birdine said.

Birdine said he hopes a permanent budget can be made available to the center so that either the students can take paid positions or so that a full-time staff can be

The center is primarily funded by

the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs, but it is separate from other offices in West Hall, Birdine said. It does, however, have strong ties to the Dean of Students Office, he said.

"Eventually, the center will be able to stand completely on its own. The only thing stopping that from happening is budget concerns," he


Birdine said that since 1987, he has seen the number of minority organizations grow from 12 to 20, and he thinks that the center will grow quickly, also.

Sun worshippers break for the light

Blistering burns, golden tans and peeling skin are all factors that could be found next week and in weeks to come, as spring-breakers search for the perfect tan.

When students flock to the beaches for relaxation, sleep and the occasional drink, few will accomplish the golden tan advertised on television.

For the rest of the baking souls, only blisters and red peeling skin can be found. Instead of a beautiful tan, this sunbather has stomachaches, headaches, and is thouroughly dehydrated.

"People will suffer from light headedness, dizziness, rapid pulse, headaches and high temperature," said Dr. Alan Boyd.

Once the burns have occurred and it is too late to go inside and save sensitive skin from the sun, all a person can do is find a soothing remedy. Tylenol, Advil or aspirin may offer some relief by reducing the inflamation. In addition, one should drink ample fluids such as juices with vitamins.

To soothe the burned skin a person should apply oils and lotions to

"People should add a light coating of baby oil," Boyd said. "Moisturize your skin as much as possible."

Eckerd's pharmicist, B.J. Moore said lotions with Aloe Vera offer the most relief to the skin. These lotions have a sort of healing property and if applied quickly to the skin, they will help prevent peeling skin. Also, sprays and lotions with benzocaine help to deaden sunburn pain.

While tanning keep in mind the usual points of playing on the beach: do not mix sun and alcohol. keep the skin full of moisture and for those on medication, realize that you may be more sensitive to the sun than others.

In selecting a tanning oil, sun block or sunscreen, a person must decide how long he or she plans to be in the sun. A person must also decide whether the purpose of applying lotions on the skin is to enhance tanning or to block the sun.

For those who are aware of impending sunburn but still prefer to add slight color to the skin, use a sunscreen with a protective strength of 15 or higher.

"Those (lotions) with sunscreen are the safer ones," Moore said.

"Many of the screens and blocks have ingredients which block both UVA (Ultra Violet A) and UVB (Ultra Violet B) rays."

The blocks and screens are the best for blocking the sun's rays, but must be reapplied after the skin becomes wet, Moore said.

For those who are more interested in a tan only, an inexpensive oil can be used to add the moisture lost in the sun. Boyd indicated that an expensive oil is really not necessary to enhance tanning quality, and baby oil will serve the same purpose as any tanning oil.

Some sun worshippers may choose to use accelerators to achieve a glorious tan. These relatively new products consist of dyes which stimulate tanning and color the skin.

The important thing for sunbathers to remember, however, is to continue applying oils, lotions, sun blocks, and sunscreens while in the sun for long periods of time and after coming out of the water.

"Remember to use sunscreen or sun blocks, and always use a lot of common sense in sunbathing,' Boyd said.

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

Tech gunning for UNLV in second-straight NCAA appearance

The 1990-91 basketball regularseason was a year in which the Texas Tech women's basketball team surprised many people in the country with a stunning victory over Lousiana Tech and an upset win over the Texas Lady Longhorns in the Southwest Conference Postseason Tournament.

The Red Raiders will try to continue their string of surprises when they take on the No. 17-ranked Lady Rebels of Nevada-Las Vegas in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at 9:30 p.m. (CST) tonight at the Thomas and Mack Center in Las Vegas.

Tech enters the tournament with an overall record of 23-7 after finishing second in the SWC Post-Season tourney, as the NCAA and the bid marks the second consecutive appearance for the Raiders in the 48-team tournament.

Tech has made three trips to the NCAAs and has come up winless on each trip. Last year, the Raiders lost to Northern Illinois 84-63 in the first round of the Midwest Regional.

Coming off an excellent performance in the SWC Post-season Classic is junior forward Teresa McMillan, who received SWC alltournament team honors.

During the tournament, McMillan averaged 12.0 points and 8.3 boards during the three games, with a high of 15 points against Arkansas in the championship

During the regular season,

McMillan averaged 13.6 points per game and led the team in rebounds with 7.2 per outing.

Helping McMillan on the inside is junior post Jennifer Buck, who averaged 12.3 points and 6.0 rebounds in the three post-season games.

Buck scored 19 points in the upset-victory over the Lady Longhorns in the second-round of the tourney.

During the regular season, Buck was the leading scorer for the Raiders with 13.7 points per game, while pulling down 4.9 rebounds per

The outside threat for the Raiders all season has been sophomore guard Krista Kirkland, who was 4-of-11 from three-point land during the tournament.

Kirkland averaged 13.0 points per game with 18 points against Southern Methodist in the first

During the regular season, Kirkland was one of the leaders in three-point field goal percentage in the SWC, shooting 39.6 percent behind the three-point stripe.

Junior-transfer Tami Wilson, who was named Newcomer of the Year in the SWC, averaged 14.7 points per game during the tournament and blocked six shots.

Wilson scored a team-high 20 points against the Mustangs, while blocking four shots in the championship game against Arkansas.

The senior leaders for Tech this season have been guards Alexis Ware and Tammy Walker.

On the season, Ware has averaged 5.4 points per game and has dished out 4.2 assists per contest. During the tournament she averaged 5.3 points in the three games and had 12 assists.

Florida took the team title with a team total of 862. The Gators' Pat Bates had rounds of 68-71-70 to take the individual title with a 209.

Women netters host Shockers, Cougars

Tech's No. 1 singles player, Fabio Walker, has not lost a complete match in the spring season. Walker dropped a 2-1 retired match to nationally-ranked Cha Hoon Im against the Razorbacks.

The No. 1 ranked doubles team of Walker and No. 2 singles player Richard Dobson is undefeated, compiling a perfect 3-0 record.

Walton nabs third in NCAA Indoor meet

Texas Tech long jumper Tony Walton became the first Red Raider ever to achieve four-time All-American status in any sport last Friday at the NCAA Indoor Track Championships at Indianapolis.

Walton was in fifth place until his last try when he jumped 26-feet even. His final jump moved him up to a third place finish.

Walton qualified for the NCAA's by winning the Southwest Conference Indoor Championships long jump in Fort Worth Jan. 15 and 16.

At the Athletic Congress National Indoor Championships at Madison Square

Garden in New York earlier this year, Walton placed sixth.


All-U Basketball Tomorrow
