Sublime Yuletide Program Planned December 15

Football Season Ends With 18-7 Win Over Canyon

Impressive Defeat Handed Canyon While Matadors Demonstrate Form; Stars End Career With Good Game

They did it! Those dashing, flaming jersied Matadors fought the Thundering Herd of Canyon to a standstill last Thursday afternoon in the most impressive manner of the season. The Matadors not only rolled up the largest score of the season but scored the highest number of points that a Buff or Matador team has ever been able to score on the other. The lads from Tech outfought, outdrove, outpassed, outpunted, and outclassed the Teachers in every department of the game. For the first time in the season the Matadors were able to pass consistently. Interference, which has been conspicuous because of its absence, was very much in evidence in the Turkey Day game.

The 18-7 score that will go down in the annals of the school does not give a true estimate of the relative fight and strength of the two teams. Tech lost at least two or three touchdowns by the breaks of the game. Early in the first quarter, the Matadors had the ball on the Canyon 11 yard line after a steady march down the field. A bad pass back to Percy Walker caused him to fumble. Before he could recover he was tackled for a 11 yard loss on the Buff 22 yard line. Later on, a field goal was missed by a scant margin. On four other occasions the Matadors were able to place the ball within the Buffalo 15 yard line, only to find the going too difficult.

Captain Percy Walker closed the season as captain in a manner that was a credit to even himself. Matador fans are disappointed if Walker does not do the superman in almost every game. It was Walker that scored all three of the touchdowns. It was Walker who outplayed the Buffs. It was Walker who skittered the ends, plowed the line and passed to Marr that put the ball in scoring position. It was Walker who was able to carry the ball over when other backs were not equal to the occasion.

Four Ws Play Well. But credit goes to other members of the backfield. The four Ws, Percy Walker, Levi Walker, Woodridge and Woodridge ripped the line, skirted the ends, passed all over the Buffs, and gained almost at will. Hodges and Woodridge easily played the best game of their careers in an offensive way. Both not only plowed the line in true fullback fashion but they got away for sensational gains around the ends and caught long passes that carved the way for touchdowns.

Score By Passing. Although the Matadors gained almost 4 times as much yardage from scrimmage as they did on the most of the scoring came as a result of passes. In the second quarter Marr caught a long beautiful pass from the hands of Percy Walker that placed the ball in a position for Walker to score in one of the most sensational drives of the season. Every man on the team hit Walker but he shook them off and waded across to the line. In the next quarter Walker again carried the ball over on a play that was accompanied by wonderful interference.

The College Band

Without a doubt, one of the most important student organizations in the college band is the band itself. The benefits of a band are too numerous and too self-evident to be enumerated here. Tech is the proud possessor of as good a band as one will find on any campus, and if a few changes could be brought about, it would be even better.

It would be a very desirable thing, if the college could finance all trips on which the band would like to go; but since our college is in the very middle of a gigantic expansion program, such a policy was found to be impossible.

We refer directly to the football trips. If the college is unable to finance these trips, are we going to be content to let our band stay at home until the college is able to send them? We say no. It seems that the band as an organization has this idea—if the college wants a band at a certain place, let them send it. This idea may be correct, and the band may be worthy of such financial support, but the point is that if such support is not possible to obtain, then this is the wrong idea. The fault seems to lie in two definite places—in the band itself, and in the student body. The band is at fault in that too large a number is eligible for the trips. We fully understand that our band is composed of 80 good musicians; but in a band, as in everything else, there is bound to be some evidence of superiority. Furthermore, we have a director who certainly has the ability to find the best players. Our proposal is, to select a band of about 35 members—the pick of the players—to send on the football trips.

Let us proceed to examine the second fault—that of the student body. It goes without saying that the student body does not give its whole-hearted support to the band. The band is a campus activity just as much as the football team or any other team. It can give the college more publicity than any other one agency. Therefore, I say that the band should be supported. This can be brought about by a little concentrated effort.

Let us take an example: let us suppose that a concert were given and, by means of a concentrated drive, 1000 tickets were sold in the student body and in the town together. If these tickets were sold at 50c each, enough money would be provided to allow over \$500 per man for a 35 piece band to make a trip. It is evident that a crowd of one-thirtieth this number would

In midfield and returned it to the 20 yard line. From there he carried it almost single handed on downs to the Canyon 20 foot line. From that point Captain Walker bucked it over.

The lone Buffalo score came immediately after the Matadors had scored their first touchdown. Keith kicked off to the Matadors. Walker received the kickoff and returned it to his own 33 yard line. On the first play Hazelwood broke through and blocked "Handsome Ransome's" punt. A nearby Buff scooped up the rolling ball and carried it over. Keith kicked goal.

Line Makes Last Game Count.

In the line Durham played a fine game, filling Corey's place in a very creditable manner. Although he was a little wild on the offensive he more than made up for it on the defense, blocking and tackling seemed to be his dish. The old war horse Ox Reed played a fine game for the Scarlet and Black in a manner that would end the career of anyone. Nobody carried him out of position. By his side was the reliable Sid Knowles, playing his best. It was a grudge game for Knowles, as he had been hurt in Canyon. And judging from the holes that he opened up for Walker, Hodges, and Woodriddle to come through, Canyon would have just as soon he was out of the game. His defensive game must not be forgotten either. Westfeldt, playing his last game also, played the best game of the season.

Ends Sneezy Plays.

Credit must go to three ends for sneezing so many Canyon plays before they were well underway. These men are Payne, Barfoot, and Vincent. It was nothing uncommon for these men to break through and down a man four, five and six yards behind the line of scrimmage.

For Canyon the names of Wilson, Keith, Gerald, Logan, Hazelwood, and Ward stand out together for Golden. Keith was the only man who could carry the ball with any degree of consistency at all. Gerald was the only man who was able to complete a pass. Hazelwood played the best game in the line and it was Ward who bore the burden of kicking with Keith.

The game was featured by poor and infrequent punting. The Matadors only punted five times. Canyon punted eight times. The punts for both teams were far below what the average man will do in an intercollegiate game. Tech kept possession of the ball during most of the game. The local lads were unable to score all the time so instead of punting they usually let the ball go over on downs as experience had shown them that they would soon recover the ball at a distance of not over 15 or 20 yards back.

The last period was ended with Tech in possession of the ball still marching. After the final touchdown, the coaches rushed in a number of substitutes. After Keith had kicked off to the Matadors Archibald on the first play hit the line for 3 yards. Smythe brushed left tackle for 3 more. The gun sounded ending both the game and the season.

THE GAME PLAY BY PLAY.

First Quarter.

Canyon won the toss and chose to defend the north goal. Captain Walker elected to kickoff. DeWitt

Gerald then attempted to pass himself but it was incomplete. It is Canyon's ball on Tech's 32 yard line. Wilson went through right tackle for 2 yards. Canyon is penalized 15 yards. The Buff line was cleared with holding. Red Keith rushed left tackle for 3 yards. Ward forced a 15 yard pass to Newman. It is fourth down and 3 yards to go on Tech's 40 yard line. Ward punted to Tech on her own 21 yard line. Percy Walker failed to gain on a left end run. Huckaby made the tackle.

Walker punted 49 yards to the Canyon 40 yard line. Levi Walker breaks up Gerald's attempted pass. Keith made 1 yard over right tackle. Ward lost 4 yards, when he was tackled behind the line of scrimmage. Ward punts to the Matador 37 yard line. Percy Walker returns the ball 30 yards to the Buff 42 yard line. Hodges is forced out of bounds before he crosses the line of scrimmage. Levi Walker hits right tackle for 5 yards but the play is called back. Percy tried right tackle himself and the "Play netted him 10 yards and a first down on the Buff 30 yard line. Percy Walker busted center for another yard. Hodges recaptured 20 more on a left tackle brush. Hodges fumbles and Levi Walker recovers on the line. Hodges's pass is incomplete. The ball goes over to Canyon on her 20 yard line. Ward lost 1 yard on a long left end run.

Tech is penalized 5 yards for being offside. Ward plows through center for 3 yards. Ward got off the best Buff punt of the afternoon. It rode the wind for 43 yards. It is Tech's ball on her own 33 yard line. Percy falls to gain around left end.

Percy Walker punts 41 yards against a strong wind to Keith, on the Canyon 29 yard line. Ward immediately punted 23 yards out of bounds on the Tech 45 yard line. Percy Walker brushed tackle in one yard. Percy Walker busted center the oval to the Canyon 24 yard line, a distance of 21 yards. The Matador captain tried it again, but made only a measly 9 yards. Hodges hit the line for another first down. Hodges in a snake play added 2 yards to his total, placing the ball on the Buff 21 yard line. Score: Tech 0; Canyon 0.

Second Quarter.

Percy Walker went around right end 21 yards in a magnificent drive. It was one of the sensations of the game. It seemed as if every Buff on the field hit him, but they bounced off as if they were rubber balls hitting a concrete wall. Walker was never even checked. It was a mad drive and he was never to be stopped. DeWitt failed to kick goal. It was blocked but it was low to go over the bars anyway.

Keith kicks off to Percy Walker on his own 5 yard line. He returned to the Matador 26 yard line. When Walker attempted to punt, Hazelwood, Buff tackle, rushed him and blocked the punt, his running mate Ward scooped it up and ran over the goal line to knot the score. Keith kicked goal.

Not satisfied he made 5 more this time at the same place. Levi tried the spin but lost a yard. A pass Levi Walker to Vincent is incomplete. It is Canyon's ball on her own 30 yard line. Wilson rushed around right end and makes 4 yards before being tackled by Vincent. The forward rush by Christian and his pass was incomplete. Ward punted 18 yards to Percy Walker, who returned 8 to his opponent's 42 yard line. Levi Walker made 9 yards off tackle. Hodges plows the middle of the line for 8 yards, and a first down. On a premature pass back from center fumbles but recovers for a 2 yard loss. Levi Walker loses 2 more yards placing the ball on the Teachers 40 yard line. Percy Walker uncorked a beautiful pass to Marr for 29 yards. It is Tech's ball on the Buffalos' 11 yard line. Percy Walker hit the middle of the line without success. Brother Levi tried right guard and also failed to gain. Brown, playing right end for the Teachers, rushed Percy Walker and throws him for an 11 yard loss. It is fourth down and the ball on the Buff 22 yard line. 21 yards to go. Marr fails to kick a field goal. The ball goes over to the Canyon team on their 20 yard line.

Keith slips over right tackle, in a very crude manner for 7 yards. Newman tried to imitate him and was rewarded with 5 yards around right end. Keith hit the line for a yard, as the sun sounds. Score: Tech 6; Canyon 7.

Third Quarter.

After first kick out of bounds, Keith kicks off to Woodriddle who returns the ball to the 23 yard line. It was a pretty 25 yard return. Walker made 1 yard through right tackle. Levi Walker got loose around left end and had stepped 21 yards before the Buff safety man got him. Walker loses a yard after a bad pass. Tech is penalized 15 yards. The ball is placed on the 20 yard line. Levi Walker tears through right guard for 5 yards. Walker fails to gain when his inflexible leg behind. A 10 yard pass to Woodriddle and a 25 yard run by him places the ball on the Buffals' 19 yard line. Canyon is penalized 5 yards, placing the ball on their 9 yard line. Woodriddle seems right guard for a yard. The line shifted to the left and Percy jerked about 15 inches making it a first down. This placed the ball on the Buff 4 yard line. Walker stepped through the line and passed a fine game for the Matador. It is Tech's ball on the Canyon 2 and a 2 yard line. Percy bounced right guard but failed to make any headway. Time out for Tech while they plan a means of scoring. The ball was sent to the left which ended all Tech hopes of scoring that day. As they end while these topics are mentioned, the entire Tech backfield lined over the goal line via right end. Christian is checked at right tackle. Levi Walker breaks up Christian's pass. Keith slipped through right tackle for 16 yards. It seemed he was some but was downed on the Tech 19 yard line. Wilson fell but rose on and made 1 yard at right tackle. The Buffs are hammering away at this particular spot. Keith tried left end and was handed a 4 yard gain. Newman had a pass in his hands from Christian but downed it. Christian punts out of bounds. It is Tech's ball on her own 32 yard line. Walker fumbles but recovers for no gain. Levi Walker got away on another 21 yard end run. He was forced out of bounds on the Canyon 45 yard line. He went 4 more on the next play. Woodriddle plows right guard for 6 yards and another first down. It is Tech's ball on the Canyon 37 yard line. Percy Walker went over right tackle for 3 yards. Walker added 3 more at center. Levi busted center and rested the ball on the Buff 30 yard line. A pass Percy Walker to Woodriddle goes the incomplete route. The ball goes over to Canyon.

Barfoot throws Ward for a 15 yard loss. Ward was thrown for another loss when Durham did the trick. Ward punted 18 yards to Tech and it was returned to the 50 yard line as the quarter ends. Score: Tech 12; Canyon 7.

Fourth Quarter.

Percy Walker plows the line for 7 yards. Woodriddle rams it again for 3 and a first down. The ball is now on the Canyon 40 yard line. Percy Walker rams center and it yields 3 yards. Walker passes to Woodriddle for 11 yards and another first down. Golden and Ward rush Levi Walker for a 7 yard loss. Percy plows center again for 4 yards more. Southwest Athletic Conference Rules

AF DE XXVIII.

TRANSFER RULE. Section 1. If a student has competed in intercollegiate athletics, or as a member of a freshman or ineligible team in an institution granting a standard degree, he shall not be allowed to take further part in intercollegiate athletics if he transfers to any institution which is a member of the Southwest Athletic Conference.

Section 2. A student transferring from one institution of college rank to another or from one of college rank to one of non-college rank and back to one of college rank shall not be eligible to compete in intercollegiate athletics unless he has been for one year a student in the institution to which he transfers.

Section 3. A student transferred from the academy of a college, who has participated in intercollegiate athletics while a member of such academy, shall be charged with the time of such participation. But the transfer rule shall not apply in his case.

ARTICLE XXIX.
BASEBALL RULE. Section 1. No student shall be permitted to participate in any form of intercollegiate athletics who has played baseball on any team under the National Association, or in any other organization recognized by the National Association, or who has received money for signing a baseball contract for services to be rendered, or who reports to a baseball club and receives salary or traveling

expenses, whether he plays or not.
Section 2. A student who participates as a member of a summer baseball team must submit at the opening of the following college year to his faculty chairman of athletics and to the President of the conference a certified statement that he has not received pecuniary compensation therefor.
Section 3. No student shall be eligible to participate in intercollegiate athletics if he has played on a summer baseball team which played more than three games a week while he was a member thereof.
Section 4. To the list of professional teams thus prescribed shall be added all the teams in any state which the conference institutions of that state declare professional and from which they debar their own players. In the event the conference institutions cannot agree on prescribed teams, the Committee on Appeals shall have the power to decide the issue, and the action of the committee shall be final.
