



Rivaling the best Earl Stanley Gardner mysteries is the one concerning the identity of the party — or parties — installing the "hitchin' post" at the entrance of the small lot (ex-street) in front of the Journalism

This boon to the equestrian is a low metal construction (or rather, obstruction) capable of severely damaging the lower portions of a car (wheels and such), and has done so on occasion.

Complicating the situation is the fact that no one seems to know who is responsible for installing the menace, and, thus, who would be responsible for tak-ing it out. This mystery should be cleared up and this metal obstruction taken out.

It definitely hinders Tech public relations and publicity, as the Public Information Office is located in the Journalism Building, and reporters of area newspapers use the lot while picking up Tech news

Tech relations with representatives of the press become somewhat strained when those representatives' cars have to be towed from the campus by a wrecker following a bout with the "hitchin' post."

Unfamiliar with the International post. Unfamiliar with Tech's latest landmark, these reporters drive down the middle of the lot, rather than using the small openings (one car wide) on either side of the obstruction. The results of such a move was amply illustrated by a picture on page one of the Feb. 23 TOREADOR.

Also, after learning about the dangers of the "hitchin" post," area newsmen can be denied use of the lot by two cars strategically parked in the en-trances of the lot. Besides, the two narrow entrances take up two parking spaces.

This "hitchin' post" is definitely a menace to the cars of persons wanting to use the lot, and is the source of strained relations with newsmen who give Tech needed publicity. It is certainly time for a Tech of-ficial to assume the authority — which has been shunned by several — needed to remove the eyesore.



Personally, I can't see where Wilkinson is going to play all of his fine material. I imagine, however, that he has a good idea where to put them.


