

# A Way to Faith

"It's not as fashionable as it was twenty years ago to wave religion aside with a few secondhand wisecracks." This statement was made by Chad Walsh, poet-in-residence at Beloit College, in an article titled "Religion" which appeared in the August issue of *Mademoiselle*. Mr. Walsh points out that the alert minority of stu-dents come to be acching a religion with definite beliefs—

Because of this insistence on fighting it through intel-lectually, he maintains, a college cannot by-pass religion or offer only one course in Bible. Tech realizes the importance of religion on the cam-pus. All-church nights are planned at the beginning of each semester to acquaint the students with the college groups that meet once a week. Several hundred students attend Morning Watch services each morning, numerous courses in Religion are offered, and the Student Religious Council sponsors Religion Emphasis Week each year. "On campus after campus, R.E.W. is no longer a spiritual once-a-year shot in the arm, but a culmination of a full program of religious activities that carries on all the

# Standlee Conducts Feed Experiment

Feed Experiment William J. (Bill Standlee, grad-uate animal husbandry major from Lubbock, is conducting an experimental cattle-feeding pro-gram on a \$1,200 fellowship for graduate work. The experiment, a continuation of one started last year, consists of feeding varied cattle rations to 60 Hereford steer calves, each ration containing a large amount of cottonseed hulls. This is the second year of a three-year research program under a grant from the Texas Cotton-seed Crushers Association. The fellowship received by Standlee has been awarded annually at Tech since 1937.


