Take a couple of recent jobs I did as examples. One was to plan and orersee the relocation of telephone facilities near a new drawbridge. The job incluiled designs for attaching tele phone cable to the finished bridge and for providing service to the bridgetender's office and the locks.

The other job was completely dif-
ferent. I was asked to make an ex perimental installation of some newly developed line concentrator equip ment. After selecting the test location. 1 engineered facilities for the remote concentrator unit, and trunk plant to the central office.

The matter sororities seem to give no consideration to is whether the gir has any ability to serve the student body of Texas Tech. In not thinking of this, the guilty sororities are placing their organization above an institution of which they are only a part.

Incompetence because of the above reasons has been of great concern to the leaders of the Council. Often, they ex-

When they attend Council meetings, as they seldom do, they fail to take an active part in the process of the business at hand, and never have any constructive ideas for the benefit of the campus.

This is a point to be taken seriously. Each representative on the Council represents approximately 350 students from their respective Schools, and by not actively participating, they are neglecting the right of the student to be represented.

- This brings the responsibility to another group - it is you, the voters. From now until the time of the election it will be your duty to observe the candidates and their actions, and then make your decision on who you think can represent you best, not who can look the prettiest perched on a Council table.

In conclusion, I will revert back to the basic responsibility - that of the sorority which urges their girls to run for various offices. By choosing incompetent persons, you ruin the whole purpose of your existence - that of the betterment of Texas Tech.
