#### Abstract

ate-supported schools is being hotly criticized many Tech students. There is widespread feelng that the state is trying to harass us, collective0 and individually, and a common cry is "Why me? Im paying through the nose already." Unfortunately, higher education is expensive and undoubtedly will become moreso. However of Texas to persecute college students. It is the resuit of well-decined national trends. It is that been apparent for a good many years. Three reasons are basic to rising costs. First, mere are more students to educate at all levels位 college. In 1939, 14 per cent of all young people between 18 and 21 were in college. Today more than one-third of this age group seeks higher education. Tax-supported schools are absorbing most of this enrollment increase Buildings and equipment are another cost fac or. Increased enrollments and contemporary advances in knowledge give rise to a demand for physical plant expansion and new equipment. Teachers salaries are a third source of increasexpense. More students and greater knowledge


attract qualified teachers, colleges must in-

crease salaries at present, most college instruc tors earn less than high school teachers.
In the light of these facts, tuition ean be er pected to go up. Other, more significant, expenses uch as dormitory charges, are also on the rise However, we don't have to say, "Well, we were born and that's what brought most of this on, so we'll just have to accept it." Steps can be taken o keep college expenses from mushrooming unnecessarily.
Suggestions for keeping down costs include voiding luxury facilities and cutting low-enroilmant courses out of the curriculum. Better use of acilities, sharing between schools, joint purchasing, minimizing personnel and use of students as teacher aids have also been proposed. A threeerm college year with the summer session adding full semester is one suggested possibility for位, maximum benellt from available facilties Some of these proposals are neither feasible nor lesirable for all state-supported schools in Texas and there are other possibilities for cutting costs We should discover and implement the method dit work for us. An organized joint research dminisy college students, faculty members and le way ble way to dete

Also, a sound financial program for the state a a whole woud lead to improved financial conditions for education. Support of officials favozing economic reform and programs designed to effect it an immeriate way to help ost adjustment
