### Executive officers of Tech's student body and cheerleaders will be elected April 19. The Student Council representative elections are slated April 24.

A general filing meeting for candidates for executive officers, cheerleaders, and representatives will be from 6-8 p.m. Tuesday in the Coronado Room at Tech Union.

HERE CANDIDATES will file for the office, pay a filing fee of 50 cents and receive petitions, eligibility forms and election

Candidates must file for the office during this time or send a representative to do it for him, according to Karen Anderson, Student Council secretary. No candidate may file later than 8 p.m. Tuesday.

PETITIONS ARE due April 1 at noon. Candidates for representatives must have 100 student signatures and cheerleaders and executive officers 500.

A meeting of candidates or their representatives will be at 6 p.m. April 4 in the Coronado Room. "Candidates must attend," said Miss Anderson.

CANDIDATES FOR executive officers and cheerleaders will have an election rally April 18 in Municipal Auditorium.

Candidates for president or vice president of the Student Assn. must be seniors. Business manager and secretary candidates may be either juniors or seniors. Representatives will run from their respective school. The vacancies are: arts and sciences, 15; agriculture, 3; home economics, 2; engineering, 7; and business, 8.

Verbal campaigning may begin April 1 at noon. Posters, stunts and informal campaigning is restricted to April 16-19.

## Tuition Hike Opposed

Petitions are being circulated at Tech, protesting the proposed state college tuition hike being debated by the Texas legislators.

Travis Peterson. Sudan junior, is circulating a typical petition. It states: "Whereas we feel that the proposed tuition hike may prevent many capable persons from completing their college education: and whereas it is apparent that the proposed tuition hike will not directly aid Texas Tech . . . it is urged that the Tech Student Council take every intelligent means possible of persuading the state legislature that the proposed tuition hike is not in the best interests of the state of Texas."

Peterson said, Tuesday 92 Techsans had signed his petition.

# IFC Okays New Tech Fraternity

A new social fraternity for Tech has been approved by the Interfraternity Council and will be approved by the administration if there is sufficient interest, it was officially announced Tuesday.

PETE FEATHER, IFC president, said eligible men interested in joining the founding organization should sign up in the Dean of Men's office by March 27.

"They (IFC members) feel that there is a sufficient number of students to warrant this action, and it will definitely strengthen the fraternity system," Feather commented.

THE TECH administration proposed the plan, and with IFC's approval, has invited male students to indicate interest in the organization of a new social fraternity.

Thomas Stover, assistant dean of student life, said, "I cannot overemphasize the fact that such a plan takes a considerable amount of time for new men. We are looking for qualified men to really work." He added that the interest and need of the students will decide the outcome.

JAMES G. ALLEN, dean of student life, said one of the primary aims of the school's administration is to serve students. Dean Allen said, "The fraternity system is compatable with good education, growth, and development."

Interviews will be made to find students

who have the time, grades, and character for the fraternity. The interviews will determine if there is a need or not for a new fraternity, according to college officials.

INTERESTED MEN should have a 2.0 overall grade average with a 2.0 for the fall semester. All grades will be computed on the 4.0 system. Applicants must be taking at least 12 hours of residence work this semester. They must also have been enrolled at Tech in the fall,

Tech's fraternity system began with the establishment of eight national fraternities. Three more have been added. The fraternities on campus are Delta Tau Delta, Sigma Chi, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Gamma Delta, Kappa Alpha, Pi Kappa Alpha, Alpha Tau Omega, Sigma Nu, Phi Kappa Psi and Kappa Sigma.

THE ESTABLISHMENT of a new fraternity will be aided by the combined efforts of all fraternities, IFC and the administration.

The final decision will be made by the administration.

First the men interested in forming a new social fraternity will be organized into a club. The IFC members will teach the new members the duties, responsibilities and organization of a fraternity.

TECH FRATERNITIES now include 749 actives and pledges. Approximately 7,000 male students are enrolled at Tech.

Registration will begin today and will con-

tinue through next Wednesday.

AUSTIN (AP)-Texas senators agreed Monday to add San Angelo State College and Pan American College to the current list of 20 state-supported senior colleges.

In almost the same breath, the Senate refused to consider expanding the list further by tacking on Webb State College in Laredo and Permian State College in Odessa.

The House spent a second day arguing over proposed curbs to city annexation powers.

### Bill Goes To House

Both houses returned for afternoon debate sessions.

The Senate passed on voice vote and without further discussion, the San Angelo College Bill that caused a six-and-a-half-hour filibuster Monday. The measure goes to the House.

Sens. W. T. Moore of Bryan, Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and Charles Herring of Austin took turns in the talkathon against upgrading San Angelo Junior College to senior status with full state support.

As soon as the "ayes" gave San Angelo State College the green light, Sen. Jim Bates, Edinburg, asked for debate on Pan American College, which is already a senior college but only the first two years are state supported.

The Senate temporarily approved Bates' bill 18-12 but failed by a 21-9 count to give him the needed four-fifths majority for final action.

### Debate Attempts Fail

Attempts by Sen. Braham Kazen, Laredo, to debate the Webb State College bill failed 17-14, with two-thirds needed.

A request by Sen. Frank Owen, El Paso, to discuss the Permian State College bill failed 16-15.

Senators also refused to debate a measure that would put strin-

gent controls on any additional college upgradings.

"The legislature obviously is no longer capable of coping with this situation and this would get us off the hook," Sen. Grady Hazlewood, Amarillo, said.

His proposed constitutional amendment would require approval of two-thirds of each house and approval of the State Board of Education before creation of any more four-year state-supported colleges. Hazlewood's motion failed by 18-11 vote with a two-thirds majority needed.
