# Legislators Survey Tech

TODAY TEXAS TECH has the honor of hosting a large delegation of legislators who are here to learn more about this young university.

Most of the representatives and senators have never visited this sprawling 1,839 acre campus reputed to be the second largest in America.

The legislators today will have an excellent opportunity to see Texas Tech as a business campus community and as a multi-purpose state university.

Tech has all phases of a complete community. We have 19 dormitories composing an "apartment" complex, snack bars and cafeterias, a bakery, television and radio stations, daily newspaper, farms, a police force, a system of government for citizens of the campus community, recreational facilities, a communications system including postal service, a library, museum, city utilities and a hospital.

And most important we have the people who compose a community. There are 7,200 students in dormitories on campus. During the daytime we have 16,000 persons working on campus.

We have six schools of study-Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering, Agriculture, Home Economics and Graduate.

More than 6,000 students are enrolled in Arts and Sciences.

We have students from 34 foreign countries, 46 states and 234 counties in Texas.

We welcome the legislators to tour our campus and talk to our students and faculty members. If this is done, then the pride we have in Tech will be evident as you observe our pioneering spirit.

Yes, we feel like pioneers. We are building a great university to serve the million or more persons living here in West Texas as well as the citizens of other parts of the state and nation.
