### Six Envoys From Tech Go To OU

Five students and a faculty member will leave for Norman, Okla., today to participate in the Model United Nations at the University of Oklahoma.

The Tech delegation will represent the United Kingdom at the Oklahoma sessions, Thursday through Saturday.

Representing Tech are Dr. Jack Collins, history professor; Tommy Watt, junior government major; Chris Hickey, junior history major; Zafer Cetinkaya, home ec education senior; Hac Brummett, senior history major; and Keith Strain, junior history major.

Dr. Collins will serve as advisor to the Tech MUN and Miss Cetinkaya will be secretary-general. At Tech Watt is chairman of the Middle East bloc, Hickey is head of the delegation from Spain, Brummett is heading the United Kingdom delegation and Strain is heading the Israeli delegation.

Players also voted halfback Donny Anderson of Stinnett their most outstanding back and tackle Ronnie Reeger of Merkel the Raiders' top lineman.




