
Probably one of the most amazing innovations to hit upon the baseball scene is the Astrodome, the home field for the Houston Astros.


Not only is this the first \$31.6 million dollar indoor launching pad, but it caused the first major occasion of a glare problem since Dizzy Dean went indoors.

It was most reassuring to note in Saturday's paper that the problem of the glare from the 4,956 plastic skylights in the dome has been solved by the architects and engineers who produced the dome. Their solution was to paint the plastic sections with a thin coat of off-white paint. Now the problem is to find a ladder that will reach to the top of the dome.

Of course the rumored solution to this problem is an even easier one. They're getting a paint brush with a 575-foot handle.
