Vote Amendment Three-For Tech! On the Nov. 6 state and national election ballot, righ along with Ike and Adlai, will be a proposal that directly affects the building and expansion program of Texas Tech for the next 20 years.

This proposal, which is going under the name of "amendment three," is primarily a broadening of per manent university fund investments to allow more income for building in the state college system.

With more funds available, the allocation of money will be reshuffled to benefit all state supported college without any increase in taxes.

Texas Tech stands to gain more than 2 million dollar from the change. At present, Tech shares in the five cen ad valorem state tax program with thirteen other schools but with the proposed change, only eleven other schools will be included in the same program with Tech. Alloca tion of funds will be based on enrollment of the schools.
Techsans who are qualified to vote should support the amendment directly, while those under 21 , or those who didn't pay poll tax, can use influence to push the proposed amendment into a reality.

Why not mention the amendment and its advantage to your friends who are eligible to vote? And in that next letter home, suggest that mom and dad support the pro posal.

The amendment won't completely solve Tech's build ing problems by any means, but it will be progress in the right direction in preventing Tech's becoming a "standing room only" institution in future years. -Ross Short
