Many of them would not effect the average student per-sonally but it is his responsibility as a citizen to signify intelligent approval or disapproval of the measures. The amendments are:

better retirement for public employees.
5. Authorizing the issuance of an additional \$100.000,000 in bonds for financing the Veterans Land Board to include two private citizens and the Veterans Land Board to include two private citizens and the Land Commissioner.
6. Changing the oath, of office for appointive state officials.
7. Allowing committeent for more than 90 days of mentally ull persons without jury trial to prove insanity.
8. Providing that a judge may depy bail to a person who has been convicted of two preveious telonies and providing protection against misuse of this power.
