Hats off to the Tech Board of Directors for reversing their stand on withdrawing Tech's application for tele-vision, channel 5.

Late in January the Board had ordered withdrawal of the application of the college for the channel, leaving it open for competition among several commercial broad-casters. This action however, was rescinded Monday, and Tech once again is in the fight to obtain channel 5 for edu-

Tech once again is in the fight to obtain channel 5 for edu-cational purposes. It is altogether fitting that a rapidly growing institu-tion such as Tech should be the possessor of a TV channel. Now second largest state-supported college in the Lone Star State, Tech has a perfect right to expect approval of its ap-plication for the channel. Any school serving an area as huge as our West Texas empire should be entitled to television facilities. Lubbock already has two commercial TV channels, and we feel that any institution which has contributed to the growth of Lubbock as Tech has deserves the support of the commun-ity in its fight to be granted the channel. It's up to the Federal Communications Commission now. Let's hope the Commission will adhere to its usual custom of exercising sound judgment so that Tech will be among the growing number of colleges and universities making use of both audio and video power to extend the arm of knowledge into heretofore unexplored areas. arm of knowledge into heretofore unexplored areas.
