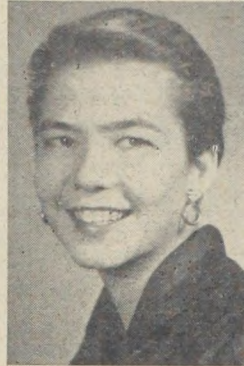

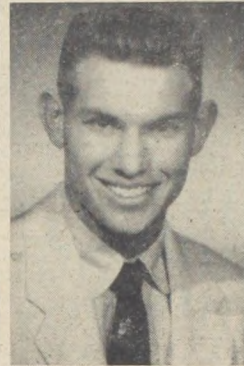

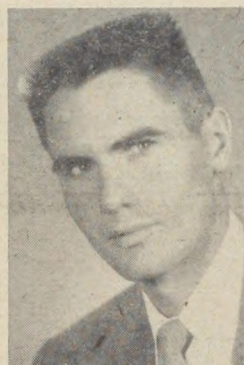

## CLASS FAVORITES NAMED

### Three Engineers Named To Council; A & S Reps Face Runoff Wednesday

Glynn McGee, senior from Loving, and Shirley DuPriest, senior from Waco, were elected Mr. and Miss Texas Tech in student elections held yesterday.

McGee had a total of 919 votes, against 659 for his opponent, Wallace Wilson. Miss DuPriest's votes totaled 739, against 552 for Edwina Schovajsa and 313 for Charlene Williamson.

Bill Jones and Jane Taylor were elected senior favorites; Wick Alexander and Janna Murray junior favorites; Donnell Echols and Pat

Rainer sophomore favorites; and Dub Heffington and Mary Sue Wilson freshman favorites.

Three of the candidates of the school of engineering for student council representatives were elected to fill three vacancies for that position. They were Bob Dyer, Neil McMullen, and Walter Schuler.

Dick Sewell and Richard Riojas will compete in the runoff election to be held Wednesday to name an arts and sciences representative to the student council. They were the top two men among several in the race yesterday.

Other candidates in the election for favorite senior boy, in descending order of number of votes received were: Jim Cloyd, Buddy Hill, Chuck Strehli, and Bill Harmon. Girl favorites candidates were Mariana Wilson, Averill Brinkman, Mary Ellen Carr, Donnell Phillips Teaf, Mary Jane Hartley, and Genevieve McGuire.

Unsuccessful candidates in the election for favorite junior boy were Bob Brown, Eddie Henson, Walter Schuler, and Duane Miller. Girl candidates included Donna Abraham, Dottie Sue Horchem, Mary Massey, Pat Curry, Mary

# Raiders Open Road Trip; Play N. M. Aggies Tonight

Texas Tech will put its 500 record, which was finally reached last week after an uphill battle all season, squarely on the line tonight in Las Cruces, N.M., where they play the rugged New Mexico A&M Aggies.

The Raiders, in making their final road trip of the year, are meeting the two teams which have given them the most trouble away from home in recent years. Although the Raiders copped the Border crown last year, the Big

## Raiders Also Make Points In Classes

Leading pointmaker in the classroom among the Texas Tech Red Raiders is Snyder's Ned Underwood, who had two A's, three B's and a C plus last semester. Sudan's Charlie Lynch was right with him with one A, four B's and a C.

Among the Picador basketballers engineering major Bert Williams of Farwell had three A's (including a A plus) and three B's (including a B plus). Bill Pfluger of Eden earned three A's, two B's and a C; Pat Noakes of Fort Worth Poly made one A, four B's and a C, while Robert Echols of Amarillo Palo Duro had three A's and three C's.

None of Tech's varsity basketball scholarship holders had any F's, and there were only two F's among all on the Freshman roster.

The Aggies have taken three of the last five games played at Las Cruces. Tech bowed to A&M last year, 68-65, although winning in Lubbock by 21 points. The Raiders won the 1955 game (there) 83-54.

A couple of free throw artists will clash in tonight's game. New Mexico A&M's Bob Jarrett has hit 81 of 94 tries, and is among the nation's leaders with an 86.2 percentage. Tech's Gerald Myers, until falling behind the minimum requirement of the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau, which compiles NCAA stats, was also among the leaders in the category.

Underwood also has the single game high on the court, his 29 points against Hardin-Simmons at Abilene giving him that honor. Most successful against the Raiders has been Memphis State's Win Wilfong, with 33.

The Raider sophomore now has 54 of 64 tries, an 84.4 figure.

Two other sophomores, who have been coming through regularly for Coach Polk-Robison lately are Charlie Lynch and Chuck Key. This pair will probably see considerable action tonight against the New Mexico Aggies.

Starters tonight will include Leon "Podd" Hill, sophomore center leading Tech in scoring, Ned Underwood, Harry Sealing, Logan Cummings, and Bobby Wilson or Sterling Gibson.

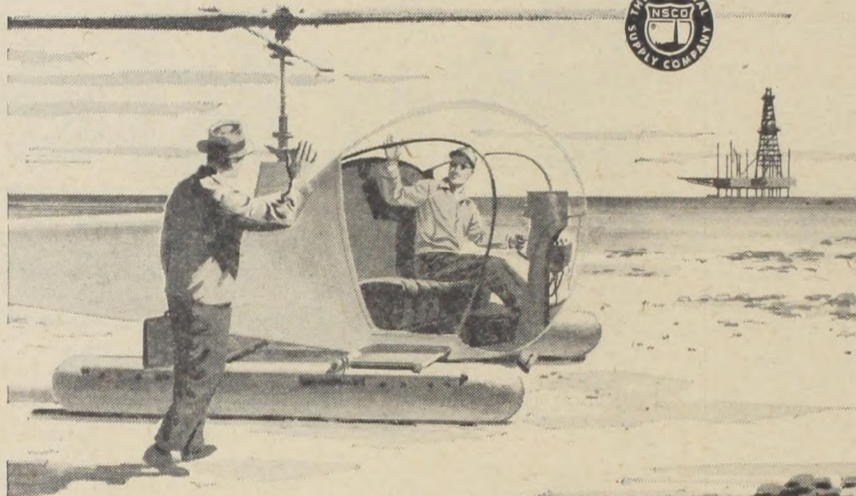
the Border championship the past two years, are not planning to participate in actual collegiate competition this spring, saving their two years of eligibility for Southwest Conference competition.
