## Raiders Seek 18h Homecoming Win

Texas Tech's Red Raiders will
be seeking their 18 th homecoming Texas Tech's Red Raiders will win Saturday against the Oklahoma Aggies in the 26th annua Hom Homecoming began at Tech as
a losing effort in 1930 when the a losing effor in
Raiders lost to Simmons of Abi-
lene (today known as Hardin lene (today known as Hardin
Simmons) $20-6$. In 1931 Tech won its home coming game by downing the Uni-
versity of New Mexico, $32-6$. The following year the Techsans blasted Baylor, 14-2, and settled the
score woth Hardin Simmons in ' 33 Tech won its fourth game in a ro DePaul.
Arizona nudged past Tech in first loss for the Raiders in five years of Border Conference play and the only time in histor
Tech has lost to Arizona.
Tech won the next three year defeating the Centenary thenteber two team in the nation, in stunner the next year; and a
Washington college, Gonzaga in Washington college, Gonzaga in
'38. Marquette ruined the Raider homecoming in 1939 with a-22-19 win. But victory again found its way to Tech in 1940, as the Big
Red squeezed Wake Forest, The next two years were vic torious ones with wins over Creighton University of Nebraska in 1941 and a $13-6$ upset over
TCU in '42. Then things changed. In 1943 slammed the Raiders 34-14, An extra point cost Tech the 1944 homecoming, as they lost to SMU 7-6. TCU found the range in '45 Waco's Baylor B
Lubbock the following invaded were sent home with a $13-6$ loss. Homecoming in 1947 found the Red Raiders playing their first
game in the new Clifford B. and game in the new Cliford B. and
Audrey Jones Stadium. The stad ium opening was a successful one as the Raiders edged the Har din Simmons Cowboys $14-6$.
Southwest Conference te a m pounded the Techsans both in 1948 and 1949. Rice supplied the power to win in '48, 14-7, and Baylor crushed Tech 28-7 the next year
