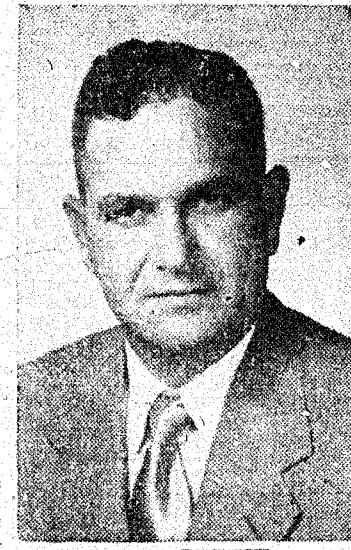

## Spotted Rains And Hail Fall In This Area

Some good rains fell in the Cleveland, Trickham, Shield area Friday evening and on Sunday morning, but other areas were not as fortunate. These areas all received upwards of 3 inches and in some places more than 4 inches fell. Some hail accompanied the good rains, but apparently not much damage resulted from the hail.

Rockwood and Whon received very little moisture, but the N. J. Buttry place this side of Rockwood received 3.7 inches accompanied by destructive hail.

The official gauge at the County barn showed a total of 3/4-inch for Santa Anna for both rain periods. The moisture north of town was very light.

## Livestock Survey To Be Conducted In Area Next Week

Acting Postmaster John C. Gregg reminds rural patrons of the Santa Anna Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Gregg explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the Survey are: M. L. Guthrie, Jr., Routes 1 and 2; Ann Allen, Rockwood Star Route; and D. H. Moore, Trickham and Whon Star Routes.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Gregg concludes.

Through much effort and hard work we came back as Seniors. Most of us really dreaded this year, especially without our old friends, Eddie Jones, James Gilbreath,

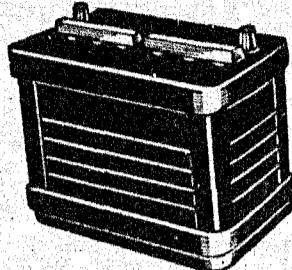

Just over half of Texas out-of-state automobile visitors (53 per cent) reported vacations as their primary purpose for coming to Texas in 1966. The second largest category included those coming to Texas to visit members of their family and their friends (27 per cent). Some 15 per cent said they were in Texas for business reasons, including conventions, or a combination of business and

**Community Property**  
The folks at Internal Revenue work hard at giving taxpayers all the information they need to file their tax returns. In Texas and the seven other community property states, the tax education job becomes a little tougher. The tax instructions sent to taxpayers throughout the country are correct only for common law states. The

community property law definitely affects the amount of tax you owe in Texas. Be sure to check on community property instructions on dividend exclusions, capital loss, and retirement income credit before you cost yourself tax dollars.

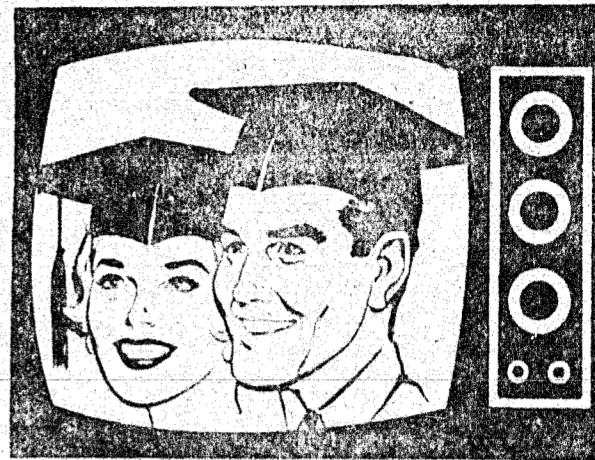

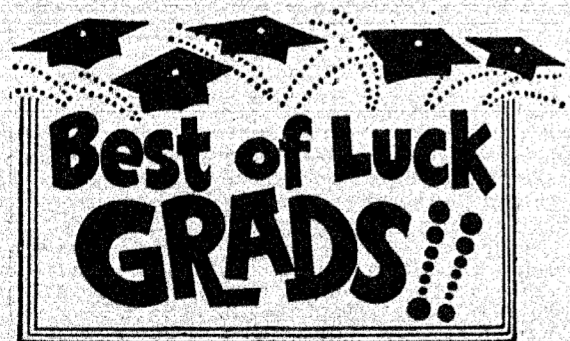

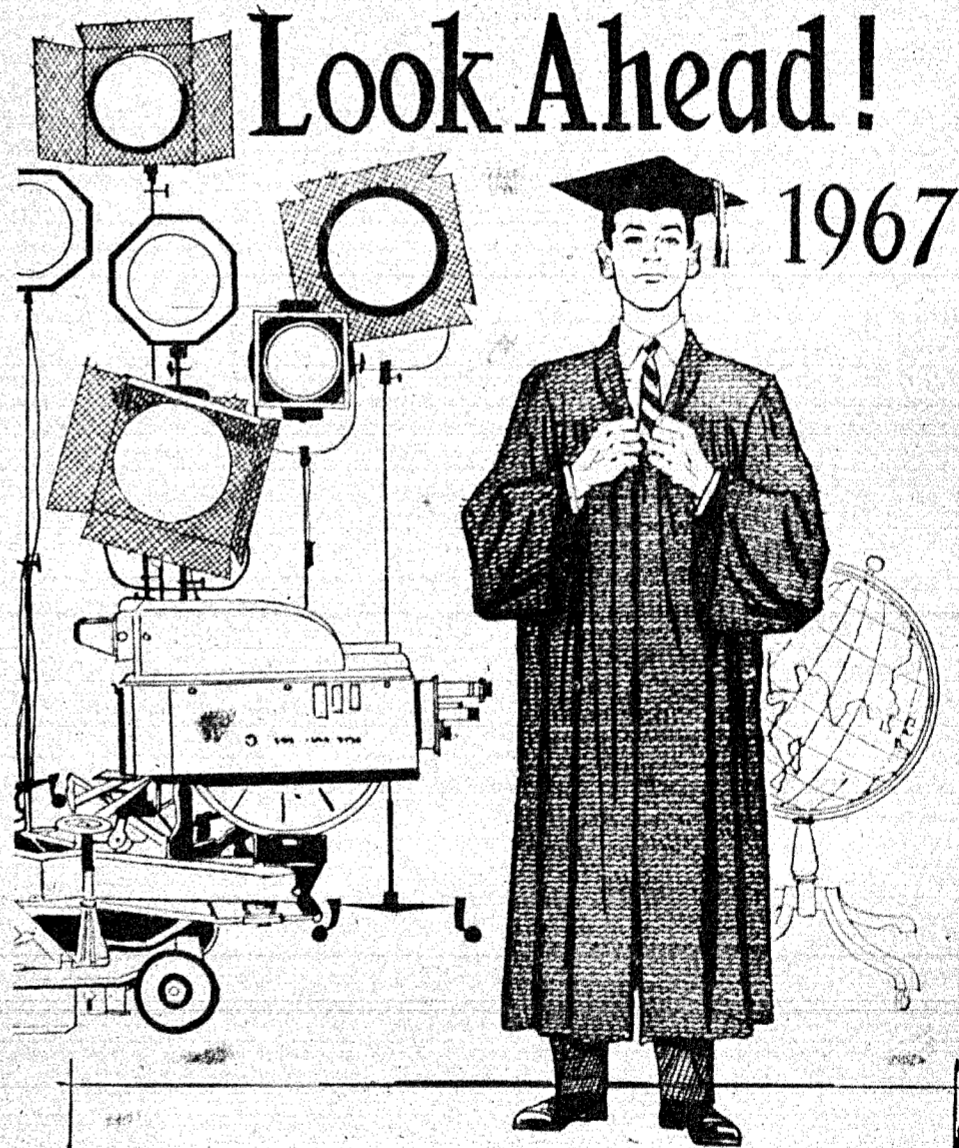
