1984 Feed Grain Program Provisions Announced

On September 30, the provisions and regulations for the 1984 Feed Grain Program was announced, emphasizing a 10 percent acreage reduction for "acreage conservation reserve purposes." The program sign-up period will run from January 16, 1984 until February 24, 1984 - the same time span as for the 1984 wheat program.

With regard to the price

support loan and purchase rates, per bushel, they are set at: corn, \$2.55; sorghum, \$2.42; barley, \$2.08; oats, \$1.31 and rye, \$2.17.

According to Danny Noble, Bailey County ASCS Executive Director, the new program has a number of provisions in it determining eligibility for price supports. To be eligible for price support benefits, a producer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats, and barley acreage planted for harvest to not more than 90 percent of the farm's feed grain base. They must also agree to devote to an acreage conservation reserve an acreage of eligible cropland equal to 11.11 percent of the 1984 planted acreage. So, as under the 1983 program, two bases will be established - one for corn and sorghum and the other for barley and oats.

The 1984 acreage base will be the average of the acreage planted and considered planted to feed

'Victory' March Scheduled Monday

Elaine Damron, Chairman of the Bailey County Unit of the Arthritis Foundation, has announced that the Arthritis Victory March

The arthritis Foundation uses these funds to help the millions arthritis sufferers and their doctors, through programs of research, patient services, public health information and education, and professional education and training, according to Mrs. Damron.

Mule Mania was riding high Friday night as the Muleshoe Mules met Abernathy on their home ground and pulled off a big 35-6 win over the 'Lopes. All was not roses however because 56 seconds into the first quarter, after the Mules took the opening kickoff, a Hamilton pass was intercepted by Abernathy's Ross Bradley who zipped off a 37 yard touchdown for the 'Lopes. The PAT was blocked by the Mules, but Abernathy was on the board with six points.

With 8:37 left in the first quarter, Hamilton handed off to Mark Moton who then scampered all the way down the field for a 68 yard TD, putting the Mules up on the board. Vinson's PAT was good and the Mules led 7-6. After that, the ball was traded back and forth a couple of times with the Mules having possession most of the first quarter. The forward wall of the Mules did some good blocking and yardage was picked up by Hamilton, Hysinger, Moton, McCarthy. Shaw caught one pass in this series for a 20 yard gainer.

The Mules again took the ball at 10:40 seconds into the second quarter with Moton and Hysinger picking up some good yardage on the drive. The call was first and goal when Hysinger took the pigskin over for the second Mule TD. Vinson's PAT stood good and the Mules pulled ahead further 14-6.

In the next series for the Antelopes, after a short drive and the Mule's first penalty of the night, Darin

Shaw caught a Smith punt on the Mules' own 44 yard line, setting them up in good position. This series, however led to nowhere for the Mules as they were unable to get the necessary yardage and Hamilton put a bare foot into it for a 34 yard punt. Abernathy took the ball on their 20 yard line, but failed to do much with it, with Orozco and Coleman and the rest of the Mule defense on the prowl. The series came to an end when quarterback Brian Smith was stripped of the ball on the 34 yard line by Thurman Coleman.

With 1:12 left in the half, the Mules came back with fire in their eyes and on the first play, Hamilton hit Darin Shaw for a 62 yard pass play and Shaw took it over, putting the Mules up to 21, Abernathy 6. (Vinson's PAT was again, good.)

The first half of the game was controlled by the Mules and the old saying was reversed: "When the tough get going, the going gets tough." The Mule defensive unit was super, despite the early interception that led to the lone TD for the 'Lopes. Lope quarterback, Brian

Yield, Quality Best In Several Years

Corn harvesting in Bailey County is almost complete and several area elevator operators are reporting 8,000 to 12,000 pound yields per acre from the 16,374 acres grown in the county this year.

Some of the elevators have begun to receive some milo and soybeans, while some sunflowers are likely to be processed at local gins.

Overall, crop yields have been average or above for corn and quality is reported to be the best in some time to average.

Wayne Crittenden at Texas Sesame indicated to the Journal that they were about 90 percent through with their corn and the yields were from 12,000 to 5,000 dry weight. Crittenden stated: "I've been here (at Sesame) for six years, and the quality this year is the best I've ever seen." Farmers who trade at that facility reported being able to keep the corn watered better and the fields better worked resulted in the better yields. Texas Sesame will also be receiving some milo, but figure that about 25 percent of the milo will

be hurt because of the 'early freeze.

Elevator operator, Jerry Barber at Sherley-Anderson in Lazbuddie told the Journal that the corn harvest in that area was at least 95 percent completed. Yields there are averaging about 10,000 pounds per acre with some running from 8,000 to 11,000 pounds dry weight. "Most of the farmers are pretty well pleased," Barber said. He added that the yields were better than usual and the quality was very good, but not too far above normal. No milo has been received at the Lazbuddie facility at this time, but Barber expects to begin milo in the next week or so. "There is not a lot of milo in this area, except for seed milo," he stated. A few sunflowers have been received by the Sherley Anderson elevator, but there have been on yields reported as yet. Barber expects to be completely through the corn and milo within two weeks time.

Robert Johnson, Manager of the Farmer's Co-op Elevator of Muleshoe reports that corn harvest for them is from 90-95 percent complete. Johnson also reported some exceptional yields, with a lot averaging 10,000 pounds per acre dry weight. However, some hauled-on corn only yielded about 4500 pounds per acre. Johnson said that the quality of the corn this year was as good as ever.

In the Cross Bred Steer division, light weight, Colin Tanksley placed first and Russell Brown placed 7th.

In the light middle weights, Julie Claunch placed first, Jeanine Robertson placed seventh, Todd Bessire placed second, Sharla Morrison placed third, Jodie Wheeler placed fourth and Julie Claunch placed sixth. 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



plight of other missing children in the United States. During the past two years, they have helped to achieve tremendous gains on behalf of these youngsters and their parents.

Reve Walsh founded the Adam Walsh Outreach Center for Missing Children in Broward County, Florida, which is now called the Adam Walsh Child Resource Center. The organization is non-profit, and works in the interests of missing, abused and neglected children, and is carrying out programs to help teach children "safety" and how to protect themselves.

Because of the efforts of the Walsh's, the Missing Children Act was passed in October of 1982 in Washington. The law created a national clearing house of information in child disappearance cases by establishing separate files in the FBI's crime information computer on missing children and unidentified bodies.

"While the movie covers a delicate subject, said the Horne's, they consider it to be an extremely important movie which every family with children should see. They said because of the nature of the film, they had no qualms in letting John Boston play in the movie.

The Arthritis Foundation is a voluntary health agency seeking the answer to arthritis. It has 76 chapters across the country. Local chapters across the country are where the arthritic or the person who thinks he might have arthritis—can turn for information and assistance. These chapters support a wide variety of community services, including clinics, aimed at improving available care, from diagnosis to back-to-work programs.

The Bailey County Unit of the West Texas Chapter has been certified for the past eleven years and has conducted nine house to house campaigns. Off setting and cross compliances will not apply to the 1984 program and neither will there be any advance deficiency payments, according to the program provisions.

Other provisions maintain that there will be no immediate entry in the farmer-owned reserve for the 1984 crops of feed grains.

Contracts signed by program participants will be considered as binding, and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program requirements.

Noble also is reminding producers that in order to prove a yield in future years, producers need to turn in proof of production when harvest is completed on wheat, corn and grain sorghum. "The required form can be completed by the bookkeeper at the elevator where the farmer's grain is taken," Noble said, and pointed out that



"Farmers had less land to care for and did a better job on the acreages in cultivation," he said. The Co-op is beginning to get some milo in, and expects to be in full swing on that crop by sometime next week. What has come in from the early planted milo has averaged about 55 pounds per bushel. No light-weight milo has been

handled yet.

The Co-op manager stated that though no soybeans have yet been received, they will be a factor in their business. "Some of the soybeans were not affected by the freeze, depending upon the maturity of the plants," Johnson pointed out. He also mentioned that some farmers had re-watered following the freeze and the result had been "that the beans are maturing well, now."

Victor Worley at Sunmark Grain in Goodland (formerly Worley's) reports that while they handle no corn at that facility, they are beginning to get into the milo harvest in the southern part of the County. "We expect about two to three weeks will clear out the harvest in this area," Worley said. Yields on milo have been from 1,000 to 1,500 pounds per acre, with some even reaching to 2,000. Those yields are considered normal for a normal year in that dryland area. "The quality of the grain has been good," Worley said, "with good number two milo weighing 56-57 pounds per bushel dry weight." Some farmers in that area may have been helped by the freeze, Worley said. He added that the late milo did not seem to be too adversely affected either.

Cliff Griffiths of Griffiths Elevator reported being about two-thirds complete in the harvest of corn. He expects that another two weeks will wrap up the corn harvest for that facility. Yields reported by area farmers to Griffiths have ranged around the 9,000 pound per acre mark. Some farmers, while expressing disappointment at the yields, have been pleased with the quality of the corn, which Griffiths

reported as being above average. Griffiths also will handle soybeans, but the harvest has not yet brought any soybeans into that facility. The elevator operator expects from 25 to 50 percent of the soybeans to be affected by the freeze a few weeks ago.

"Eighty percent complete," is how Orin McBroom of Lazbuddie Grain described the corn harvest in the area from which he draws his customers. McBroom pointed out that the yields had been good - from 10 to 11,000 pounds per acre dry weight. "This is about average for us out here, since we cut a lot of good corn," he said. He added that the lowest yield yet recorded was about 9,600 pound per acre. "The quality of our corn is better than it has been in the past few years, also," McBroom said. Lazbuddie Elevator has not yet begun to receive a lot of milo and not any soybeans as yet. According to McBroom it will be another 30 days before soybeans will really begin to come in. "Some of the beans were hurt, but it depended on the stage of growth they were in," he stated. Farmers in that area have been generally pleased with their corn yields.

At King Grain in Muleshoe, Joe Bob Stevenson reported that facility as being 95 percent through with their harvest for yellow feed corn. "Yields have been between 8 and 9,000 pounds per acre, dry weight," he said, which is described as being about normal. Stevenson also reported a better quality to the corn this year. The King facility also handles milo, but so far (Thursday) had only received one load. No yields or quality was available on this. Stevenson stated that King's expected to get in some light weight milo from the late planted crops in the county this

year.

Jeff Smith, Texas Divisional Manger of Valley Grain Company told the Journal that yields at that facility had been much better than some farmers had expected on a general average. About 9,000 pounds dry weight yields have been reported there on white corn. Smith also said that the "quality has been good, but the bushel weight has fluctuated some depending on the variety of corn planted." Overall, however, the yields have been good. Valley Grain, which handles corn exclusively, is about 90 percent through the harvest and expect to finish up within a couple of weeks.

All in all, from the reports gathered, the corn crop in the county is basically winding down, with generally better yields and quality than most farmers have had in some years. Most farmers and elevator operators surveyed indicated the PIK program, with the layout of acreage, as a factor in the crops. Bailey County normally plants about 30,000 acres in corn in a normal year; however, PIK programs cut back that acreage to slightly over 16,000 this year. Not enough grain sorghum has been harvested to date to be able to compare it with other years, but if the weather holds good for the next two to three weeks, that crop should be out of the fields also.

Homecoming Events Produce Winners At MHS

Students Can Learn From Own Mistakes

Students taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) this year on October 18 will be able to "learn from their own mistakes" by using information in their score report provided by the College Board, according to Linda Marr, director of guidance at Muleshoe High School.

After taking the PSAT/NMSQT, all students receive a Report of Student Answers which includes the correct answers and their own responses and scores," said the local guidance official. "They also receive their own test booklets so that they can review the actual questions, see which ones they got wrong, and try to figure out the correct answer and why they may have missed it."

This process can help students learn from their own mistakes by encouraging them to understand the reasoning involved in finding the right answer, an ability which will be useful for future school work. Looking at the kinds of mistakes made on the test can help students identify areas in which they may be weak and need more work.

Before taking the PSAT/NMSQT, students receive a student bulletin containing a complete practice test with an answer key and scoring instructions. After the test, they receive a booklet, About Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores, that helps them to interpret their test results and to plan for college.

Other services that enable counselors and other school personnel to better understand and interpret the test results to students and parents include school summaries of students' answers, profiles of the academic characteristics and career interests of students taking the test, and a special publication for use with students as part of a general guidance program.

The PSAT/NMSQT is co-sponsored by the College Board and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Since 1959, more than 26 million students have taken the test, which measures verbal and mathematical abilities.

By taking the test, students discover how they rank among juniors (or sophomores or seniors) taking the test across the country. It also provides a preview of the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), taken by many college-bound students.

The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students wishing to participate in competitions of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
