## 1967-68 School Session Begins Aug. 28, 8:30 a.m.

School will begin for the 1967-68 session at 8:30 a.m. on August 28, with a full day of classes. Buses will operate on the same schedule as was used during 66-67 except that changes will be made to care for new students who have changed locations. No general assembly will be held on Monday morning; students will move at 7:30 to their home rooms in grades 1-8. High school students will be called into assembly in the high school for a short period. Most high school students have already registered.

The local school district has already received approval on its Title I, ESEA project for 67-68. The Santa Anna Project was number seven in the State of Texas to be approved. The grant is in the amount of \$174,220.00 to be used in remedial instruction in a Language Arts Program.

All students will receive during the first week of school

a form for student insurance. The school makes available a student insurance plan with the Standard Life and Accident Insurance Co. through Heritage Insurance Managers of San Antonio. This program is optional with all students except for athletes. Boys in athletics will not have extended athletic insurance purchased for them by the school unless they individually purchase the student insurance. The entire insurance program is simply made available; the school is not in the insurance business and receives no profit from this insurance program.

All buildings have been given extensive maintenance during the summer. One major project included the complete rebuilding of more than one hundred large venetian blinds. All floors have been given special attention with some experimentation with improved maintenance materials. An addition is being made to the athletic field bleachers at the press box to solve a crowded situation there. When the press box was built originally, it was adequate for the public address system and camera crews. Since the scoreboard is now operated from the press box, and the radio station crew is usually present, some changes have been made at very little cost to the school. Camera crews will operate on top of the press box except during rain and other persons such as scouts and newspaper people will operate in the new additions being made.

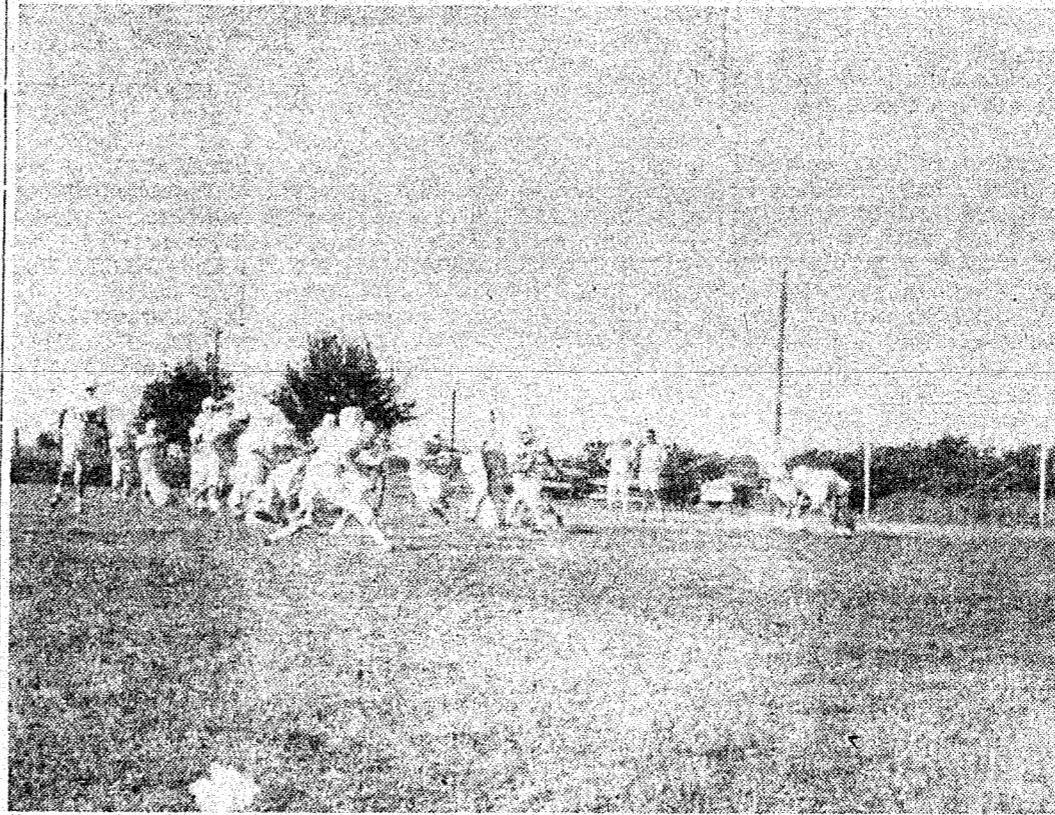
Reserved seat sales for five Mountain home games will be on sale on August 21. Football fans may reserve the same seats held last year by calling the school office. Reserve seats for the season will be \$1.25; tickets to the game must be purchased at the gate at each game individually since the reserved seat ticket is for that purpose only and does not admit the holder to the game. The

reserved seat section can be expanded if necessary.

The Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees is composed of James R. Eubank, Sr., President, Robert T. Smith, Vice-President, Mrs. Barbara Bruce Kingsbery, Secretary, and Richard Horner, Joe Wise, Jesse Williams and William R. Brown. Mr. Brown was appointed to serve on the Board when Mrs. Alyn Gill moved from the district in June. The Board met in a special budget study meeting on August 22 and the public hearing regarding the budget will be combined with the regular Board meeting. The Official Budget - 1967 - 1968, after final approval, will be published and is available at the school Business Office for examination by any interested person. The 1967-68 Budget shows some reduction in expenditures in an effort to have a balance to apply toward a large deficit which has accrued over a period of years when revenue was insufficient to meet the operational and maintenance costs.

A late change in bus drivers will place Mrs. Sybil Dean driving Route 34, Plainview and Shields, and a new bus driver, Mrs. Delma Blair, driving the Rockwood area bus. James Keeney, driver on Route 34 for a number of years, submitted his resignation. Mrs. Dean plans to move to Santa Anna; therefore, she would necessarily drive a bus originating in Santa Anna and operating on a loop route.

The Santa Anna Public Schools are comprised of 16 regular faculty members, 2 Title I, ESEA teachers, 2 Title I, ESEA Teacher Aides, a school nurse, 6 bus drivers, 4 cafeteria workers and 2 custodians. The Administrative staff includes, Cullen N. Perry, Superintendent, Roy B. Mathews, Secondary Principal and teacher, James A. Harris, Elementary Principal and teacher, and Mrs. Sandra Cammack, Bookkeeper and Secretary.

### Inductees Still Eligible For Marine Corps.

ABILENE, TEXAS, Aug. 22 — Men who have already taken their pre-induction examinations for their local draft boards and many who have received orders to report for induction are still eligible for the Marine Corps' "Two-Year" enlistment program.

Sgt. Paul King, Marine Recruiter for this area, explained that men enlisting in the Marines for two years are eligible for the "Buddy Plan" and "120 - Day Delay" enlistment programs.

Persons joining under the "Buddy Plan" are assured of spending at least the early part of their enlistment together. The "120-Day Delay" program allows a man to enlist and then delay his departure for active duty for as much as 120-days.

Sgt. King emphasized that men who join the Marines for two years will have complete utilization of the GI Bill which includes assistance for college education and vocational training.

## Seat Belts Are Required Now In Texas

Austin — Inspection of seat belt accessories, steering mechanisms and wheels and rims are added to the items to be inspected on all Texas vehicles, along with an increased minimum fee of \$1.75 for inspection.

The new items were added to the inspection law by the last legislature and the Department of Public Safety has instructed all vehicle inspection stations in regard to the type of inspection to be made on each item.

The amendment becomes effective August 28, thus accounting for the early inspection date. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts are required on every motor vehicle in which seat belt anchorages are a part of the manufacturer's original equipment. For most American-made vehicles, the anchorages are standard beginning with 1962 models. The vehicles may be rejected during inspection of the seat belts are not installed, the belts are unsafe or unserviceable from wear or damage, the attachment fittings are damaged or loose or the buckles are loose or inoperative.

Steering will be checked on all vehicles, including those with power steering.

Wheels and rims are to be inspected without being removed from the vehicle.

House Bill 355, introduced by Rep. Ralph Wayne, makes it a misdemeanor to ride a motorcycle without protective headgear as of Dec. 31. A person found without approved safety helmet is subject to fine of \$10 to \$50.

A second law, which probably would have even greater effect, is H. B. 354, which requires all persons operating motorcycles after August 28 have a specific license. Persons wishing a motorcycle license must take a written test and a road test.

Those who already have a drivers license still will be able to ride motorcycles until their license expires. After that, if they want to ride a cycle they will have to get a motorcycle license.

And, just the same as for a regular driver license, a person must be 18 to get a motorcycle driver license or, with driver training, over 16.

## Two Local Boys Attend Training

Bill Tucker, sponsored by the Coleman County Farm Bureau and Billy McCrary, sponsored by the City, attended the Annual Texas Fireman's Training School held at A&M University. Both men are members of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department.

They were among 2,200 firemen attending, representing 565 cities and 29 states in the United States and several foreign countries. Included were men who work in fire prevention and control or municipalities, industries and armed services.

Texas towns sending firemen to the school receive a key rate credit for their in-

surance rates according to the number of firemen participating. Cities sponsoring one qualified fireman who completes work satisfactorily receive three per cent credit. Those sponsoring a fireman and fire marshal, or assistant fire marshal, get four per cent. And cities with two or more firemen and the fire marshal gain a five per cent credit.

Henry D. Smith, Chief of the Firemen's Training School, emphasized the greatest benefit gained from the school is the reduction in fire losses through more efficient methods of fire fighting learned during the training.

**AUSTIN, Tex.** — State and hospital officials are confident the far-reaching new medicare program will begin functioning as scheduled on September 1.

Program will bring medical and hospital benefits to 350,000 needy Texans. It is authorized by the same federal law which provides medicare to old folks.

Texas Department of Public Welfare, which will administer medicare, estimates benefits during the first year of operation will total \$125,000,000. Federal funds will match a \$26,700,000 state outlay on a four-to-one basis.

Points to remember:  
Eligible for benefits are Texans on public welfare as-

istance rolls - old age assistance and to blind, families with dependent children and the totally and permanently disabled, or those eligible for such assistance who are patients at state mental and tuberculosis hospitals. Coverage is automatic for the latter, with no application as such is required.

Services include in-patient hospital care, diagnostic work such as laboratory tests and x-ray tests, doctor bills and nursing home charges.

Bills will be paid through a "fiscal intermediary" Welfare Department will contact with Blue Cross - Blue Shield to handle doctors' bills on strict basis of prevailing charges. Hospitals will be paid actual costs as shown by audit. Blue Cross - Blue Shield will be reimbursed by the state and will receive an additional service fee.

Eligible welfare enrollees will receive identification cards from the Department

of Public Welfare. Cards can be presented to insure care as limited by details of the federal act (Title 19).

**APPOINTMENTS** — Major legislative committee and state agency appointments have been announced.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named the Senate General Investigating Committee with Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo as chairman. Other members are Sens. Dan Ratliff of Stamford, V. E. Redd Berry of San Antonio, Bruce A. Reagan of Corpus Christi and J. P. Word of Meridian. Smith also placed Sens. Charles Herring of Austin and Henry C. Grover of Houston on Committee on Preservation of the Governor's Mansion.

House Speaker Ben Barnes named to Natural Fiber Study Committee Charlie Scripps of Dallas, Charbe Schreiner of Kerrville, Roy Farkner of Lubbock, and Reps. Hilary Doran of Del Rio and Delwin Jones of Lubbock. Barnes put Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine on the House Interim Committee to study the Housing and Physical Care of Criminally Insane Persons.

Anthony R. Carledge is new chief enforcement officer of Texas Liquor Control Board, succeeding his former boss E. A. Gordon, who retired.

Texas Fine Arts Commission elected Ted H. Strauss of Dallas as its new chairman.

W. O. Karpendo, former Federal Administration district airport engineer, will become chief engineer of Texas' Aeronautics Commission on September 21.

L. H. Prodel of Austin is the first director of the state-operated information, education and referral service for mentally retarded.

**UNDESIRABLE FISH GET STUDY** — Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will hold a hearing Thursday (August 17) to map rules and regulations for importation, sale or release of undesirable tropical fish eggs.

Staff members will present a list of undesirable tropical fish, including 11 species and several members of the snake-headed fish genera. Included among "undesirables" are the Aruana, three species of Piranha, the electric eel, and electric catfish. Gar - pike Paven or Peacock bass, two species of South American catfish and the fresh water sting-ray Snake-headed fish have teeth a big mouth and appetite to match and have been known to attack humans.

**DRAFT QUOTA SET** — Texas' 155 draft boards have received a quota of 1,180 men for September, reports Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director.

Quota compares with 1,421 for August, 974 for July, 975 for June, 885 for May and 675 for April.

Draft boards will forward approximately 4,000 men in September, all for the Army.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS** — Flamingo Isles Municipal Utility District can engage in navigation and reclamation projects along the Texas coast if approved by Texas Water Rights Commission, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In another opinion, Martin concluded that "dedica-

tion" of a two-acre Dallas cemetery tract, its sale to a bank as trustee of a perpetual care endowment fund and subsequent lease to a licensed funeral establishment is legal.

**PAID TOO MUCH?** — Sabine River Authority employees working on Toledo Bend Project are paid too much money, according to Texas and Louisiana state auditors. More than \$46,900,000 has been spent by the two states on the giant multiple purpose dam and reservoir at Toledo Bend. Salaries since 1962 have totalled \$823,017, audit report noted.

**GOOSE ISLAND UNDERWAY** — Contract to dredge and mark a 5,500-foot boat access channel at Goose Island State Recreation Park 10 miles northeast of Rockport has been awarded by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Final plans now are being drawn for a 1,620-foot lighted fishing pier on Goose Island's eastern tip. Channel will extend eastward from the boat ramp near the headquarters building in the park and connect with St. Charles Bay Channel.

Completed channel will be five feet deep, 29 feet wide and will permit users of the boat ramp at Goose Island State Park access to St. Charles Bay Channel and other fishing waters in St. Charles and Aransas Bays.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Acting Gov. Preston Smith has set a November 11 special election in Harris County to fill the vacancy of Rep. Lee Dugan Jr. of Houston who resigned to accept a judgeship appointment.

New Texas Occupational Safety Board will interview applicants for the \$17,500 per year chief safety engineer's post on September 7.

### 32nd. Anniversary Of Social Security

Thirty-two years is a period of time that doesn't get nearly as much attention as the 10's, 25's, 100's, etc., but for almost every person in Coleman county, the 32nd anniversary of the signing into law of the original Social Security Act does have much significance.

Thus mused R. R. Tuley,

Jr., District Manager of the Abilene Social Security Administration district office as August 14th, came and went a few days ago.

"Growth from a retirement plan slated to start paying from \$10 to \$42 per month in January 1942 to today's comprehensive system of protection against the hazards of lost income due to old-age death, or disability, and against the costs of health

care in old-age, marks 32 years of history important to almost every family in Coleman county," Tuley added.

Retirement income (now \$35 - \$140) for the individual employee in commerce and industry when he got old has grown into these and other benefits:

Income (\$22-\$115) in old age for wives, dependent husbands, widows, dependent widowers, dependent parents (age 62 for all except 60 for the widow).

Income (up to \$105) for unmarried children (and often to their mothers also) of deceased, disabled, or aged parents - to age 18, or age 22 if full-time students, or to any age if disabled, before age 18.

Help with hospital and medical bills for those past age 65.

Tuley suggest that this 32nd anniversary month for Social Security is an appropriate time for young and old alike to find out more about what their individual stakes are in this program.

Persons desiring social security information should contact the representative who will be at the Dept. of Public Welfare in Coleman at 10 a. m. on Mondays and Tuesdays.

### Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q - I disagree with what your agent proposes as a result of my audit. Is there any way I can have someone else review the case without a court case out of it? The amount involved is only several hundred dollars.**

**A - You should inform the examining agent that you do not agree with his proposed adjustments and desire a district conference. A conferee will consider your side of the story as well as the examining agent's and attempt to reach an agreement on the basis of the facts and law involved.**

**No formal or written protest need be made to obtain such a conference where the amount of the tax liability in question is up to \$2,500. The previous limit was \$1,000.**

**Q - I plan to sell some property I inherited from my grandmother. How do I tell whether I have any profit to report?**

**A - The basis to use is the fair market value at the time you inherited it. If you obtain more than this value when you sell, then you will have to report the difference as income. Don't forget, however, that you may deduct expenses you have in connection with the sale to determine whether you have a gain or loss. The treatment of gains and losses from the sale or exchange of both business and nonbusiness property is covered in IRS Document No. 5048. For a free copy send a post card to your district director.**

**Q - My teenager has earned almost \$600 this summer. If he goes over that figure will we lose exemption for him?**

**A - No you won't if he is under 19 or is a full-time student. The other dependency tests must still be met, however.**

**Your son will have to file a tax return if his income does reach \$600 or if taxes have been withheld from his wages and he wants to obtain a refund.**

**Q - Is there any difference between a pension from the government and one from a private company when it comes to taxes?**

**A - If the government pension is from Social Security it will not be taxable. Civil Service pensions and those from private companies will be taxable depending on how long it takes to recover the amount of your contributions to them.**

**This subject is covered in IRS document No. 5018, Retirement Income and Credit. Send a post card to your district director to obtain a free copy.**

**Q - I got a letter asking for my Social Security Number. Where should I send it?**

**A - Send the information to the office requesting it. Most of these inquiries originate from the service center and the information should be sent there.**

**Check to see if a pre-addressed envelope came with the request. One is normally enclosed.**

**Q - I was reimbursed for travel and hotel expenses by a company which wanted to hire me. I didn't take the job, however. Will I have to declare this expense money as income?**

**A - The reimbursement will not have to be declared as income unless it exceeds your actual expenses. In that case, the excess should be reported as income when you file your 1967 return. If your expenses exceed the reimbursement they are not deductible.**

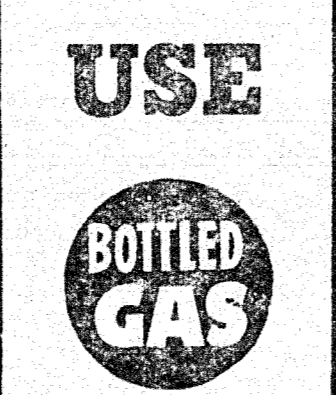

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

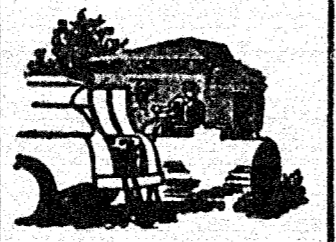
ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

## Annie Milstead Recalls Memories

(Editor's note: Mrs. Annie R. Milstead, 3510 Hastings St., Houston, Tex., sent the news an interesting clipping of highlights of her life. Mrs. Milstead is the former Annie Boggus, sister of Jimmy Boggus of Santa Anna. She is a 1917 graduate of Santa Anna High School.)

"We didn't have but one son when the war began (W W II), but we had 1,000 when it was over," Mrs. Milstead recalls saying to her husband.

She was in charge of the guest house at Camp Wallace during the war. She has stitched every thread of memory from the camp into a bedspread of souvenirs.

Her husband, who died of cancer seven years ago, was overseer of trucks at the camp. Her husband told her one morning the general wanted to see her. The general knew of her work as housekeeper in hotels in Texas and California and "drafted" her for housekeeper at the camp guest house. She didn't leave the camp for a single day for eight months.

Mrs. Milstead has made a priceless souvenir from these friendships - a bedspread of handkerchiefs, the boys sent her, from all over the world. She estimates it took her a year, working only at night, to make the spread, she saved the silk ones for pillows.

Some of her duties included being in charge of the boys in the guard house, making them clean windows and scrub floors. The boys were glad to work for her because she gave them breaks for soft drinks. She also remembers at one time catching a spy at the camp.

Mrs. Milstead was up late every night, some nights she never went to bed, especially nights before the boys were to be shipped out.

Fondest memories are of being called "Mom and Pop" by the boys. One boy said where ever they went in the world he'd always remember them and "We'll see Mom standing there."

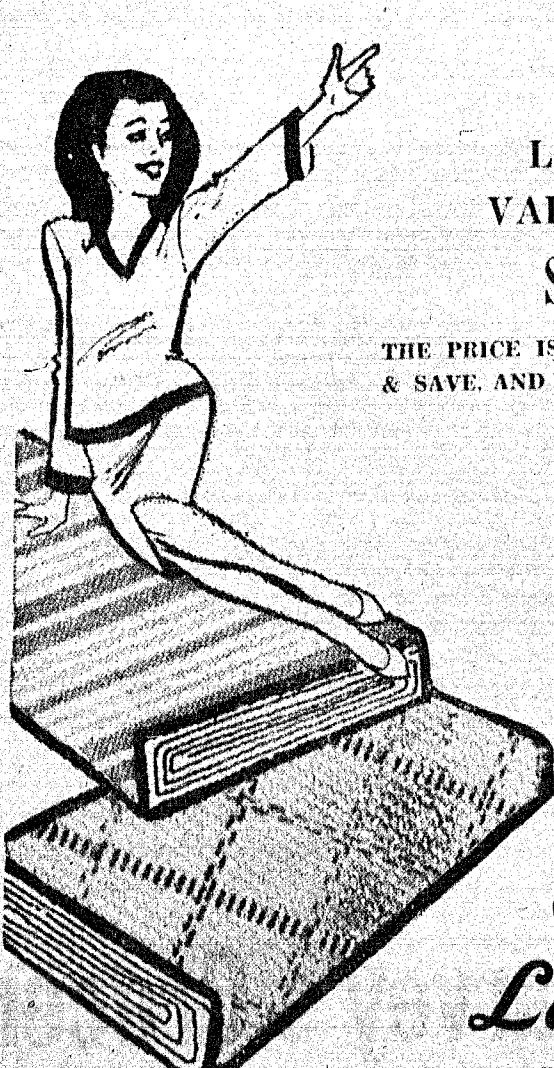

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November

11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

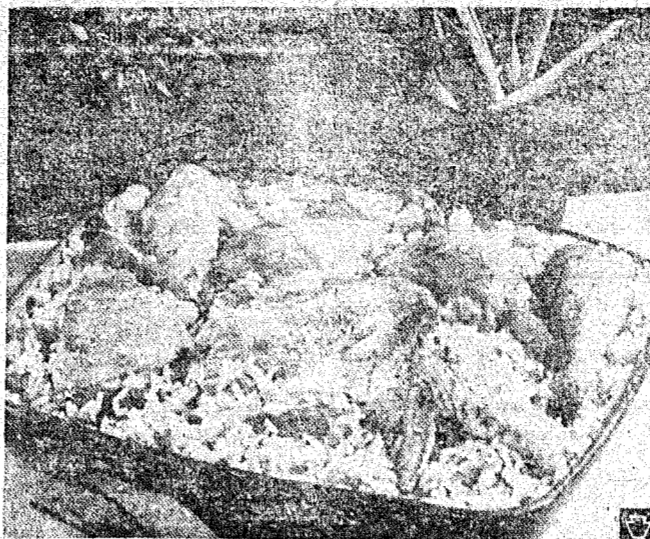

Chicken And Rice Mexicana

Fresh tomatoes, green pepper, onion and chili powder give Chicken and Rice Mexicana its south-of-the-border flavor.

This is the kind of main dish to cook in and serve from your prettiest casserole. Brown the chicken in the casserole or cook it and the vegetables in a separate skillet before transferring them to the casserole. Then put with the remaining ingredients in the baking dish, cover tightly (using foil if the casserole doesn't have a cover), pop into a moderate oven and forget it for half an hour.

Even though you might be tempted to peek into the casserole during cooking, it is strongly recommended that you do not. "Don't peek" is a standard admonition in all rice cookery instructions, and the reason is simple. Rice cooks to its best when steamed — not boiled — and when the cover of the saucepan or casserole is lifted, steam escapes and the rice has less chance of turning into tender and separate grains.

To add to the Mexican theme, serve with a guacamole salad, salt sticks and for dessert, wedges of fresh melon — cantaloup, honeydew and watermelon.

CHICKEN AND RICE MEXICANA

- 1 2 1/2-pound frying chicken, salted and peppered to taste
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3/4 cup minced green onions
- 1/2 cup minced green pepper
- 1/4 cup minced parsley
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 2 tomatoes, cut in eighths
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- Pepper to taste
- 1 teaspoon chili powder

Brown chicken pieces in butter melted in skillet; remove chicken to sheet pan. Add onions, green pepper and parsley. Cook until onion is tender. Add rice, broth, tomatoes and seasoning. Stir well and heat to boiling. Place chicken pieces on top. Cover with a tightly fitting lid. Reduce heat, and simmer for 30 minutes, or until liquid is absorbed; or bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

# AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Five years ago only 25 colleges and universities offered courses in some or all phases of Oceanography. Today there are about 100 private universities offered courses in some or all phases of Oceanography. Today there are about 100 private universities and Government laboratories concerned with the mysteries of the Ocean.

Young men and women looking for a future can find in the Sea a kind of frontier that has largely disappeared from the land.

Some phases of research now going on have the appearance of really being silly, but we already know enough about the Oceans & Seas, which cover approximately three-fourths of the Earth's face, to be aware of tremendous potentials.

The president's commission on food supplies for the future points to disastrous circumstances for feeding the future billions of people who are shortly to inhabit the Earth. Population is expanding many times faster than our ability to produce food, even if the problem of distribution were overcome.

Mapping the bottom of the oceans, the seasonal current patterns at various levels, overcoming the main obstacles of a hostile element, will not be substantially completed during the lifetime of anyone now living, but what is learned by the scientists now busy in their explorations, may provide all the things that the land may not have in the years to come.

The scientists suggest that land now covered by the deep waters will furnish minerals, adequate food, petroleum, medicine, and everything necessary to life in the future.

While we spend billions to put human beings on the Moon, and search for the same possibility on Mars, great advances have already been made to live and exist under the Seas.

Japan has already established "farms" and "ranches" in waters off its shores. They have built fences, in which they raise and breed sea life for food.

For centuries, ocean fishing has been almost blind—little more than groping. Compared to future fish harvesting,

present methods would be like depending on rabbit hunting in the woods to raising beef cattle as a source of meat.

Science already knows a great deal about the habits of food fish and about the minerals and oxygen content and temperatures of the water where fish are to be found. From this knowledge will spring new ways to farm sea life and even fatten it on managed "acreage" and to predict the numbers and movements of great sea schools.

It is known that fish can be "heard" with electrical fields, sounds and lights. From these things come a vision of the scientific harvesting of salt water food hundreds of times greater than at present.

On the spot where fish are harvested, processing plants will be erected to produce the finished products. Packaged foods will be available to the floating towns and cities which may be built around the factory, and for market on land. Imagine apartment shops with shopping centers, having protected sea gardens between them with airport shops and the things we now have on the land.

In the future we will depend on the ocean for minerals, chemicals and oil. The land is being depleted of natural resources while we permit the rivers to pour out wealth into the Oceans every day.

The possibilities of harnessing tidal waves and currents to produce electric energy is a reality insofar as the scientists are concerned. It is a matter of finding ways to reduce the cost of production.

The race for underwater minerals is under way on the Continental Shelves all over the world. Giant corporations are making huge investments.

From the military standpoint, we must know the surface of the bottom of the Seas and take from nature

what we know to be beneficial to mankind. A great source of protein needed by hungry millions can be harvested and converted to fish meal, with any added flavor desired.

With these developments will come the need for international law for the Oceans' bottom, more complicated than the laws of the Sea applying to the surface.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
