Dove Season Opens The 1st. Of September

Shooting hours for mourning doves in the north zone begin at 1 p.m. Daylight Saving Time or 12 noon Central Standard Time on September 1st. Officially, the state will be on Daylight Saving Time until 2 p.m., October 29th.

The fully feathered wing provision on mourning doves has been relaxed for the season. Hunters no longer have to retain one fully-feathered wing on doves except during the concurrent white-winged and mourning dove season in 21 counties along the Rio Grande. All migratory birds imported from Mexico have one fully-feathered wing attached.

Juanell Stiles Completes Study

Juanell Mercer Stiles of Santa Anna, Texas is one of 14 students who completed a one year internship, August 29 at the University of Oklahoma Medical Center in preparation for a career as a registered medical technologist.

After her graduation from Santa Anna High School, she entered Tarleton State for three and a half years, plus one summer session, where she is also a candidate for a Bachelor of Science Degree within the next few days. From Tarleton she transferred to the University of Oklahoma Medical Center.

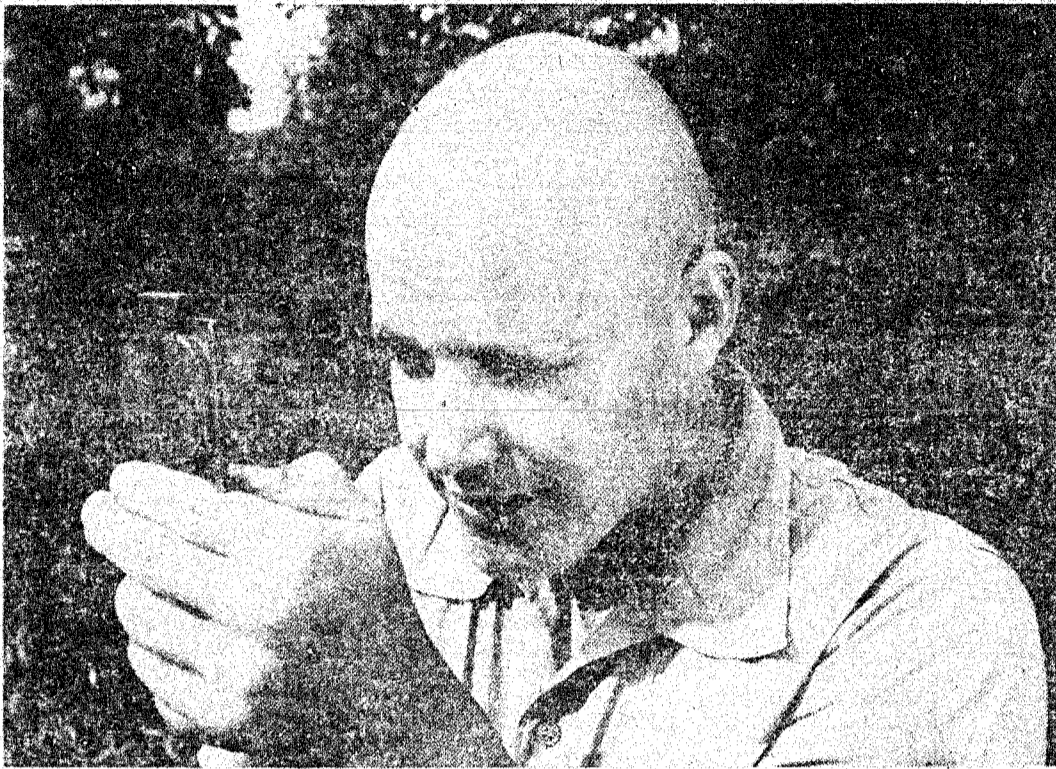
Mrs. Stiles is now eligible to take the national certification examination conducted by the board of Registry of Medical Technologist of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

The internship program conducted by the School of Medical Technology includes both lecture courses and practical experience in the laboratories of the University of Oklahoma Hospitals.

Students learn laboratory tests and techniques to aid in the diagnosis, treatment and study of disease. Three years of college credit, including 16 hours each of biology and chemistry, are required for admission to the school.

The PLC summer training program provides the opportunity for college males to be commissioned in the Marines upon graduation from college in much the same way other branches of the service train would-be officers through their Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC). Federal and State Assistance Now Available for Rural Farms - Towns

The Coleman County Technical Action Panel is interested in assisting you by extending assistance and benefits of Federal and State Agencies to rural farms and towns. The Farmers Home Administration, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service, and the County Extension Service are available to help Coleman Countyans with their farming operations, housing needs, home food production, and non-agricultural enterprises. Both financial and technical assistance are available upon request. A brief description of the services available from each agency is found below.

FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION
Among the various types of available FHA assistance are two loans especially designed to assist families with limited income. The 504 housing loan is used by home owners in rural areas to make repairs to their dwelling that are necessary for health, safety, and sanitation. The Economic Opportunity loan is used to finance either agricultural or non-agricultural enterprises that are needed to increase the families income and level of living.

AGRICULTURAL STABILIZATION AND CONSERVATION SERVICE
Federal cost - sharing through the Agricultural Conservation Program for carrying out approved soil and water conservation practices is available at increased rates to low income farmers. The rate of cost - sharing may be 80 percent of the average cost of performing the practice when it is determined that the farmer or rancher is largely dependent of the farm for his livelihood and the estimated gross annual income does not exceed \$3,000.00. These payments are made through County ASCS Offices upon application by producers before work is started.

SOIL CONSERVATION SERVICE
Technical help in the development of a conservation plan is available from the Soil Conservation Service through the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District. The conservation plan, based on land capabilities, is the landowners blueprint to the protection and improvement of his farm. Site selection, design, layout, and the supervision of construction of conservation practices as well as irrigation assistance is available without charge to the landowner. Assistance is available to non-profit organizations that

are non - agricultural for soil and water based problems.

COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE
The Coleman County Extension Service serves the people of the county by providing bulletins and leaflets to the general public. Educational meetings, workshops and shortcourses are offered in various subjects as well as working with individuals on their agricultural problems. Recommended practices for the various enterprises have been distributed and are available for the major enterprises in the county. There is also help available on home economics problems and family living.

All of the above agencies have offices in Coleman, and if any or all of them can be of assistance in any way, they may be contacted at the following addresses: Farmers Home Administration, Coleman County State Bank Building. Well Is Completed Near Santa Anna

A. M. Teague of Brownwood (formerly Neil K. Shaw of Brownwood) completed a Coleman County Regular Field well eight miles south-east of Santa Anna.

It is No. 1 C. E. Kingsbery, Pleasant Young Survey 494. Daily potential was 14 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 32 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 1,335-38 feet, treated with 200 gallons of mudcat acid. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 1,502 feet, total depth.

Another regular field well was completed in the same survey. It is Poco Inc. of Wichita Falls No. 6 Curtis Collins.

No. 6 Collins had a daily potential of 18 barrels of 32 gravity oil. It is producing from perforations at 1,305.23 feet. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 1,369 feet, one foot off bottom.

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

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT**

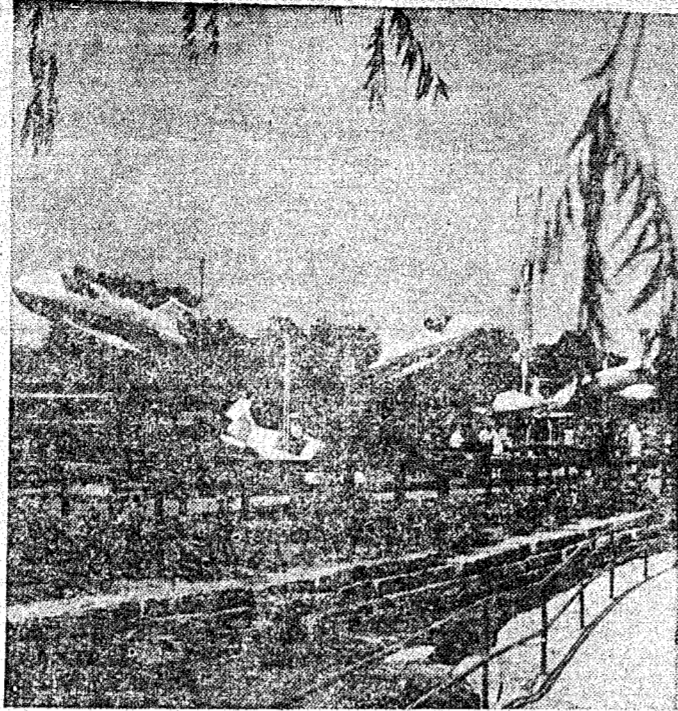
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November



New ride called the Jet Set has just been completed at Six Flags Over Texas. The sophisticated electro-hydraulic steering system enables guests to "fly" these scaled-down models almost exactly like regular aircraft by climbing, banking right or left and diving, responding to the commands of the "pilot" working the control stick.

An additional mid-season \$250,000 expansion program at Six Flags Over Texas has just been completed with the opening of two new rides.

The rides, dubbed "The Jet Set" and "Spindletop," are located in an area across the narrow-gauge railroad tracks, paralleling the Modern U. S. A. section of the Park, towards Boomtown.

Reinhold Spindler, an engineer from Switzerland, supervised the installation of "The Jet Set." This ride, designed by Intamin Company of Bern, Switzerland, consists of 12 scaled-down airplanes, approximately 10 feet long with a 9-foot wingspread, which operate almost exactly like regular aircraft. Visitors "fly" the craft by an electro-hydraulic system, and the planes, which are attached to steel girders, climb, bank right or left, and dive, responding to the commands of the "pilot" working the control stick.

Intamin Company spent two years on the ride in research and development, and the installation at Six Flags is the first one in the United States.

Adjacent to Boomtown is the new "Spindletop" derrick and revolving drum ride, which operates on a centrifugal force principle. Twenty-five to thirty guests at a time are stationed in a circle standing on the floor inside a huge barrel. The barrel begins to spin slowly and gains speed until about 28 revolutions per minute are attained. Centrifugal force causes the riders to adhere to the walls inside the drum. The floor is then lowered, leaving the riders suspended about 3 feet above the floor. The action is reversed as the ride comes to a close.

Together the new rides can accommodate approximately 2,000 visitors per hour.

The rides are set in about two acres of newly landscaped grounds with beautiful trees, flowers and shrubs as well as 2 lakes and 3 waterfalls.

Attendance this season continues to exceed projections. As of Sunday, August 13, a total of 1,422,205 visitors have attended the Park, a gain of about 58,000 compared to last year's attendance on the same date.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold

any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing non-elective state officers and employees to serve in other non-elective offices or positions under this state or the United States until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature, if the offices or positions are of benefit to Texas or are required by state or federal law, and there is no conflict of interest with the original office or position; prohibiting elected officers under this state or the United States from holding any other office or position under this state; and adding members of the Air National Guard, Air National Guard Reserve, Air Force Reserve, and retired members of the Air Force to the list of persons exempted."

THE FAMILY LAWYER

REPOSSESSION

"I have come to repossess your sewing machine," the burly visitor announced. You are behind in your payments."

Undaunted, the housewife sat down firmly on top of the sewing machine. Equally undaunted, the man tilted it sideways, threw her to the floor, and stalked off with the machine.

The indignant woman lost no time in suing the sewing machine company for damages. And the court ruled in her favor. The judge said that, even though the company had a legal right to the machine, it had no right to take possession by the use of force.

In the typical conditional sale, legal title remains in the seller until all the payments are completed. If the customer should default, the seller is entitled to repossess the merchandise.

But the law puts limits on the manner in which repossession may be accomplished. Violent means are not allowed. Even if a clause in the contract specifically authorizes a strong-arm retaking, the law will generally disapprove of it anyhow—as a matter of sound public policy.

Furthermore, the reposessor must not force his way onto the premises. Take this case:

A team of repossessors, going to recover a piano, found no one at the debtor's home. They promptly gained access by breaking through a locked door, and decamped with the piano.

But, because of this forcible trespass, the company was held liable to the debtor for damages.

On the other hand, the law has no objection to repossession when fairly carried out. Thus:

A reposessor seeking a certain automobile found it parked on a public street. So he proceeded to tow it away. Here, too, the debtor later sued for damages.

But the court in this case upheld the repossession. For the retaking had been achieved by peaceful means, involving neither personal violence nor trespass.

In short, the reposessor had merely used a simple and inexpensive method of restoring the car to the party

who was rightfully entitled to it.

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

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—Too often the Congress rushes in with "crash" programs in an attempt to solve problems after they have reached the crisis stage.

America has been undergoing changes more severe than occurred when it entered into the industrial age. The leap forward in scientific development and social evolution since the end of World War II have had staggering effect. With all the factors involved, one result, if not a cause itself, has been the influx of people from rural areas into urban settlement. A brief 25 years ago Texas, for instance, was approximately 75 per cent rural and small towns. Today, the reverse is true. The same is true generally all over the United States. It is pretty obvious this accounts for some of the social, political and economic upheaval which has resulted.

People are not likely to be happy in the big cities standing on one another's shoulders. The problems of crime, traffic, wretched housing, health and education are not likely to be solved under such conditions. Billions of Federal dollars are being spent on a sort of scotch-tape, bailing wire and twine string approach, but it has already proved the patch can not stand the strain.

Riding along a city street, looking at the teeming thousands living on their front steps, in the alleys and on sidewalks, one wonders why these people would not seek some wide open spaces, but it is what they know and the way they want to live.

There are others, however, who, for economic reasons, are being driven from the farms and rural areas to the

larger centers of population, seeking opportunity to make a living.

Probably no incentive is large enough to bring some of them back to the farms and the country, but there is a need for jobs in many of our small towns and those from farms who need to supplement the family income.

Legislation has been introduced to offer certain incentives for small town industries. The measure provides a tax incentive for plants to locate in rural small towns. It is proposed to increase to 14 per cent the normal 7 per cent investment credit on machinery, and give a 7 per cent investment credit on the cost of constructing quarters for housing business. It provides for a stepped up depreciation of two-thirds of the normal life of machinery, equipment and buildings. It proposes to allow 125 per cent deduction for wages paid to newly hired low income workers for a period of three years. It also permits what is known as a carry-back for three years and a carry-over for ten years for all credits and deductions.

To guard against unfair treatment of communities in other parts of the country, the incentives are applied to a new operation so as not to induce a business already in operation to leave one community to go to another. The idea also proposes safeguards against coming into an area in competition with local business, but, rather, to engage in an enterprise not competitive and one which would furnish jobs for people not employed. The proposal also carries a provision for training for new jobs.

These proposals are not viewed as simply benefitting a rural population. Rather, they should be viewed as a major effort to revitalize the rural communities, with the residual benefit to our national economy. One of the most beneficial features of such an effort is the fact that only people with roots in a community will have a pride and a dedication toward making that community what it should be. The rural people, in their dependence, have been one of the greatest factors in making our nation great. People's interest in their local institutions—their churches, their schools, their concern for the welfare of their neighbor, recreation and cultural improvement—is the foundation of good government and good living.

BARBEQUE SAUCE
(for 2 or 3 fryers)
1 large onion chopped
3 buttons garlic chopped fine
one half cup catsup
2 and one half cups tomato juice
1 tablespoon butter
one half cup Worchester Sau-

ce
1 tablespoon sugar
one fourth cup vinegar
pepper
mustard

Boil sauce 5 minutes. Pour over chicken in shallow baking dish. Cook about 2 hours in 325 degree oven, uncovered. Chicken may be cut in quarters or frying size pieces. Sauce should cook down and chicken brown slightly.

BAKED RICE
1 cup rice uncooked
one half cup milk
one half cup salad oil
one fourth tsp. salt
one half cup grated cheese
1 small green pepper chopped fine

Cook rice according to directions, mix all ingredients well - Bake in a buttered dish at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

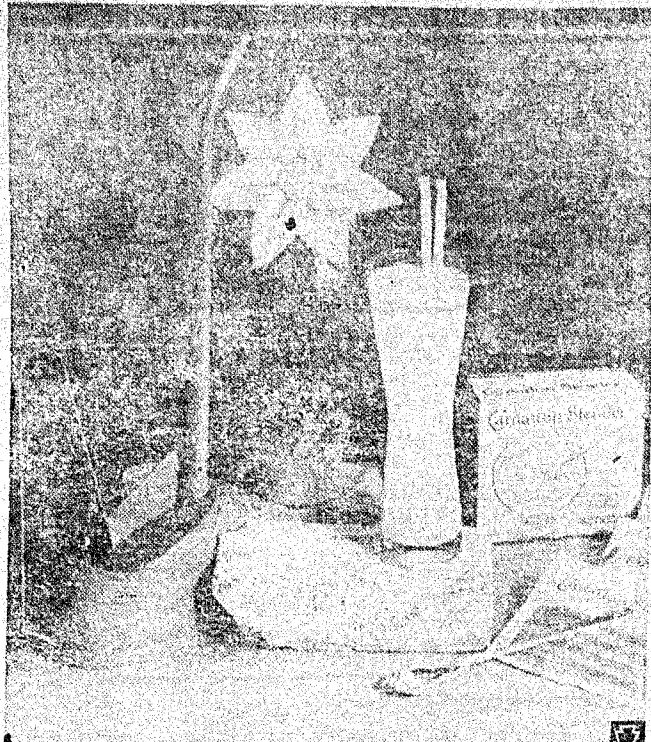

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Austin, Texas—Texas Department of Public Safety has issued a grim warning that 45 people will die in state traffic accidents during the Labor Day weekend.

DPS will make an all-out effort to curb wrecks and to stop reckless and illegal driving on the highways, says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., veteran director of the law enforcement agency.

Approximately 150 uniformed officers from other services will supplement the regular highway patrol force for the long holiday period—

Friday, September 1 through Monday, September 4.

In addition, a coordinated effort involving several state agencies and private organizations will be directed toward holding down the fatality and injury list.

Texas Safety Association will conduct a public information program stressing the need for courtesy and caution on the road and urging drivers to remain alert.

TSA Vice-President W. F. Leonard will coordinate efforts of 12,000 Junior Chamber of Commerce members

operating 200 rest stops which will serve free coffee to tired drivers.

DPS plans to carry on its educational program via the newspapers, radio and television and will distribute maps showing highway construction sites.

A fleet of 35 to 40 cars to assist stranded motorists over the state will be operated by Texas Council of Safety Supervisors and Texas Motor Transportation Association. Purpose of the 'holiday road patrol' is to relieve highway patrolmen for enforcement work.

There is always the possibility that the estimate of 45 deaths for this period can be proved too high, but only if all drivers put forth every effort toward avoiding traffic accidents," Col. Garrison son.

Meanwhile, DPS has announced radar sets will be placed in every patrol district over the state to aid in enforcing the highway speed laws. Sets capable of accurate readings on vehicles at distances up to 1,500 feet will be carried in patrol cars.

Speeding figured in 41 per cent of last year's fatal accidents and 29 per cent of non-fatal accidents.

SMITH IS RUNNING
Lt. Gov. Preston Smith broke open the 1968 political season by telling reporters he will run for governor next year regardless of whether Gov. John Connally plans to try for a fourth term.

"I want to make it clear once and for all that I am running," Smith said. "I have absolutely no idea what Governor Connally will do, and it doesn't make one iota of difference."

However, the Lt. Governor insisted that he would not make a formal announcement if his candidacy, complete with definition of issues, until Connally returns around Labor Day from his African Safari.

House Speaker Ben Barnes has indicated he will run for lieutenant governor if Connally seeks a fourth term.

Former Attorney General Waggoner Carr also expressed some interest in the lieutenant governor's race. But he emphasized that he had not made a definite decision.

Another prospective candidate for lieutenant governor is State Sen. Murray Watson of Waco.

ELECTION LAW CHANGES TOLD
Secretary of State John Hill has provided Texas election officials details of all changes in state election laws enacted by the 60th Legislature.

Major changes include:
* Voters may mark ballots with "x" or check marks rather than scratching names of candidates they oppose.

* Counties may use electronic voting machines on approval of the secretary of state.
* Those who have not yet met state voting residence requirements may vote for the president and vice-president.

* Those who have moved from county to county within six months before an election can vote for state-wide officials.

* Some city election dates will be changed from the first Tuesday in April to the first Saturday in April.

* Election officials will get a pay raise from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour.

* Voters in bond elections will be required to sign affidavits they own property and to identify the property.

* Write-in votes will be outlawed in primaries except for party offices, like county chairman.

* Only opposed candidates will have to file campaign expense statements.

* Voters must register between October 1 and January

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Do you pay interest on refunds that are delayed in getting out?

A—Yes, the government pays interest on refunds that are not issued within 45 days of the due date or the date filed whichever is later. The interest is at a 6 per cent annual rate, the same rate taxpayers are charged on unpaid tax balances.

Q—How does the average taxpayer make out when he takes a dispute he has over an audit of his return to a district conference?

A—In about 65 per cent of district conferences cases, the taxpayer is able to settle the dispute satisfactorily.

Q—Where should I send my quarterly estimated tax payment, to the district or service center?

A—Estimated tax payments should be sent to the Southwest Service Center at Austin, Texas. The next payment is due September 15.

Q—Is there any tax advantage in having stock list-

ed both the husband's and the wife's name?

A—No. There is no tax advantage in having stock listed in both the husband's and the wife's name in Texas. Dividends are considered community property, no matter who owns the stock. Due to the community property law each spouse can exclude up to \$100 in dividends from income regardless of whose name is on the stock.

Q—My income is under \$5,000 but my return was audited this year. Why do you bother with such small taxpayers?

A—In the administration of the tax laws, the Revenue seeks to assure each taxpayer that he pays neither more nor less than is required of him. Regardless of the amount of income, some returns are selected for audit as a pattern to measure this standard of compliance. The fact that a possible adjustment to a return is small is never a reason in itself for not examining the return. No taxpayer should feel that his return is exempt from examination.

Q—Can I take any deduction for the exhibit I'm putting in for my store at the county fair?

A—Yes, expenses connected with your fair exhibit may be deducted as a business expense.

Q—Are expenses for sending a child to Boy Scout camp deductible?

A—No, these are personal expenses and not deductible.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also author-

ize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment allowing counties to put all county taxes into one general fund."

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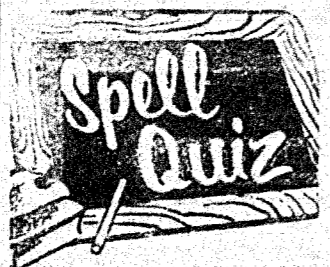
