## Bert Massey Is Candidate

Bert V. Massey of Brownwood announced today that he is a candidate for the State House of Representatives from sixty-fourth district of Texas. The sixty-fourth district includes Comanche, Brown, Coleman, and Runnels Counties. This House seat will be vacated by House Speaker Ben Barnes who has announced his candidacy for Lt. Governor. Massey, 24, is a life-long resident of Brownwood, and is the son of the late Bert V. Massey, Sr. and Audree H. Massey. He holds a B. A. degree from the University of Texas at Austin and is currently a senior student at the University of Texas Law School.

While at the University he served as a member of the University Chancellor's Advisory Cabinet, Executive Assistant to the President of the Students' Association, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors of the University Co-op, and as Chairman of the Law School delegation to the House of Delegates. As an officer of the Texas Intercollegiate Student Association, Massey was a delegate to the First Student Conference on Mexican and American Affairs held in Mexico City.

During the two past sessions of the Texas Legislature, Massey has taken an active interest in State Government. He was appointed to the staff of the Chief Committee Clerk and worked with key members of the House Committees on Agriculture, Highways and Roads, and Education.

An active member of the First Baptist Church in Brownwood, Massey has been active in speech work, served as State Master Councilor of the Order of DeMolay in Texas, and was the first Texan to serve as Chairman of the International State Master Councilor's Conference.

Concerning his candidacy, Massey said, "Texas is a rapidly growing state, and the prospects are that the sixty-fourth district will continue to realize great growth and prosperity in the forthcoming years. I have long been interested in good government and public service, and I see this office as an opportunity to serve my area and my state. By taking an active interest in public affairs, I have attempted to train myself in the workings of State Government, and I am dedicated to providing an energetic and forceful voice in the State House of Representatives for my constituency."

## Local Nurses At Conference

Mrs. H. A. Burden, Mrs. Lois Haines, Mrs. Charles Henner and Mrs. Pat Hesch, registered nurses of Santa Anna, attended the 1967 Regional Clinic Conference of the American Nurses' Association, held in Kansas City, Mo., November 13-15. They are employees of the Santa Anna Medical Clinic. The ANA is the professional association for registered nurses.

The three-day conference, titled "Expanding Dimensions in Nursing Practice," was designed to help nurses focus on the important trends in health care that affect the kind or quality of nursing a patient can receive.

Nursing experts from across the nation discussed the role of automation in patient care; federal funding of the health care program; how the programs are planned and the money spent; and how to put into practical use the great amount of expanding knowledge in nursing. In addition more than 30 papers were given covering 5 areas of nursing practice, community health, geriatrics, maternal and child health, medical, surgical, psychiatric and mental.

The conference was part of the continuing education program of the American Nurses Association for its members.

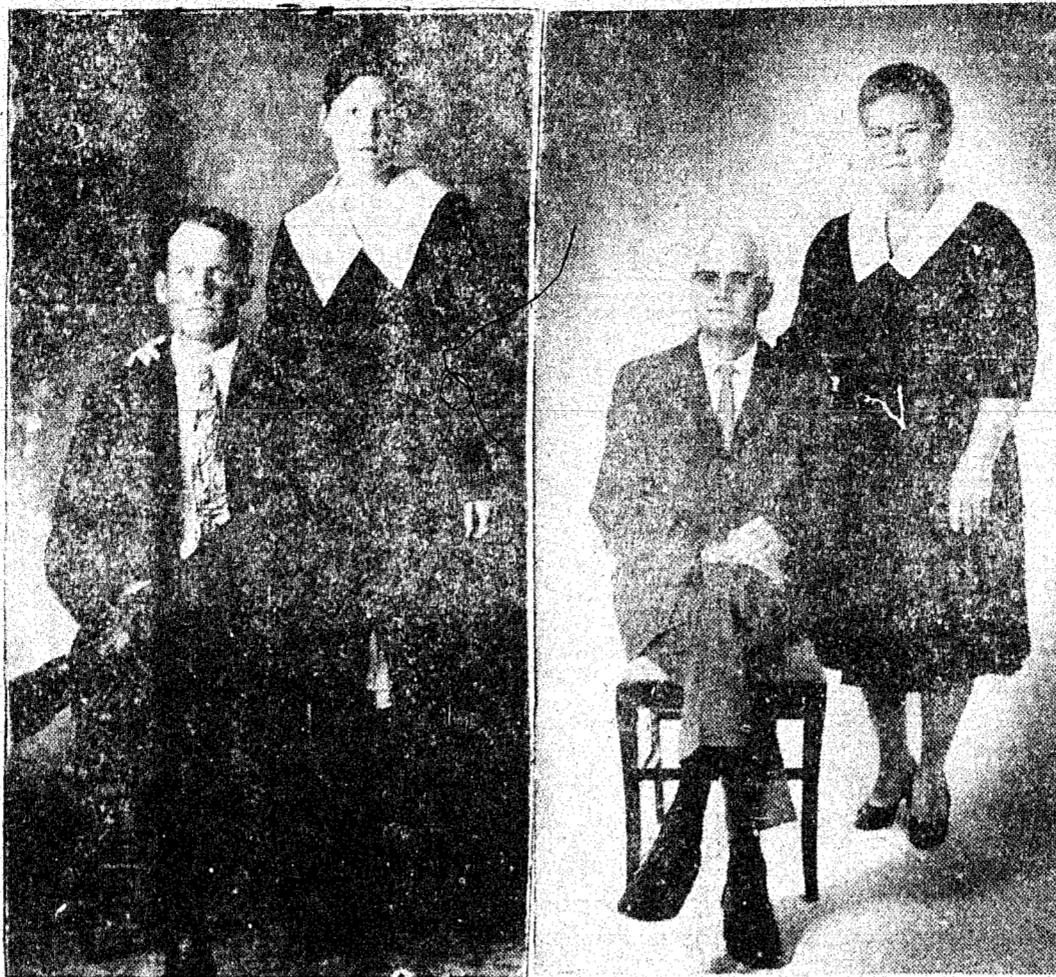
He described Rotterdam and The Hague which is the governmental capital of the Netherlands, as cold and rainy, a place of little cars, big trucks and millions of bicycles and all of them in a hurry. He describes the people as very industrious. Always working to wrest the land from the sea. No land is wasted or allowed to lay out. They grow food stuff even on the sides of the levees and dikes. There are big fields of all kinds of vegetables and sugar beets. Pork is very good and hogs are tremendous in size. Beef is poor, has seen nothing but Hülsteins. Dairy products are outstanding for natural flavor. Bread and all bakery stuff is very good. A man comes to your house with bread that is fresh, unwrapped and not sliced, but delicious, or you can buy in the bakery.

Grocery stores are very small and each one specializes in one thing. Buy meat at a butcher shop, cheese at another shop and vegetables at another. The Dutch woman goes every day to buy her food. Stores do not furnish sacks, they carry a satchel with them. You return all jars and bottles. Each village is built around a square and market days are held here when vegetables, fruit and flowers can be bought. Nine huge pigs that were delicious, cost 90 cents, Dutch, or about 25 cents in American money.

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—During the last two months the Congress and the Administration have been playing "High Noon" with one another. It is a sort of "You draw first" and when you do, you lose.

The President tells the Congress that if expenditures are to be reduced they should say where and how much. Some in Congress want the President to make the cuts. Whichever makes reductions, the other wants the credit but no blame for programs and activities curtailed.

Representative Wilbur Mills of Arkansas, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee—the committee which levies taxes and raises revenues—disregards this sort of back and forth challenge and goes to the heart of the question. He warns us to pause in headlong rush towards ever bigger government and to establish priorities of what is essential and what is not. He points out that spending in this fiscal year or in 1968, as welcome and desirable as they are, is really not the central objective. He seems to believe there is no solid indication of where we will be on Federal spending in fiscal 1969 through 1975, simply by resorting to piecemeal efforts. History in this regard indicates that cuts made this year will likely be matched by spending outbursts next year or the year after.

If these stops and goes are to continue we must go through the same torturous, time-consuming and inefficient procedures we are now experiencing. Worst of all, from the long-range point of view, the major objective would not be accomplished. Chairman Mills says that our focus should be on controlling the growth of Federal claims on the Nation's production capability over the years and on making sure that the kinds of things the Federal Government does—the nature of its claims on the economy—conform with the nation's changing preferences.

We all know well enough that the present budget contains programs that may have lost their justification and that we are called upon to approve others and vote vast sums for their operation, without having adequate information about what their current objectives are and how well they are performing or are likely to perform in the future.

The present emphasis is on curbing expenditures this year. This is desirable, but it is not enough. When Administration officials insist that it is Congress' job to cut appropriations and spending and insist that the President can not act until appropriations have been curbed, they are concentrating only on this year's expenditures.

This sort of course of action will not, in the long run, curb outlays nor bring them under better control. This kind of buck passing makes it all the more difficult to come to grips with the real problem.

What is essential is a change in spending programs. The Congress and the Executive must focus sharply on what the government is to do, as well as how much it is to spend. To establish this kind of control and make it work, requires the active cooperation of all who have a responsibility in fiscal policy. The first step should be the Administration's recommendation for basic changes in Federal Programs. Only the Executive Department is in a position to undertake this policy and to do it properly. The Congress' job then would be to evaluate and to act upon these recommendations, modifying where deemed desirable.

## Long Time Resident Is Buried in Houston

Funeral services for W. R. (Bill) Mulroy, a resident of Santa Anna for 40 years, were held in Houston last week. Mr. Mulroy was the manager of the local West Texas Utilities Co., from 1932 until he retired in 1962.

A member of the Roman Catholic Church and a very devout man, Mr. Mulroy served in many capacities in various civic organizations during his years here. A strong supporter of Santa Anna, he served as president of the Santa Anna Lions Club and Community Chamber of Commerce and in many other capacities. He served on important committees in just about every civic undertaking in Santa Anna during his many years here, including being a member of the School board for many years.

Mr. Mulroy died in the Herman Hospital in Houston at 9:30 p. m. November 10, after an illness of seven months. Wake services were held at the Earthman Chapel in Bellaire, Texas at 8:00 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 12 and non-sectarian services were held in the same chapel at 10:00 a. m. Nov. 13. Burial was in the Resthaven Cemetery in Houston, with the Rev. Hershal Martindale of Maplewood Bible Chapel officiating.

Mulroy was born July 4, 1898 in New Orleans, La., and was a graduate of Holy Cross College in that city. Before coming to Santa Anna he served as manager of the Ozona WTU office. Following his retirement, he and Mrs. Mulroy moved to Jacksonville, Texas. They have lived in Houston for the past 18 months.

He is survived by his wife of Houston; one daughter, Mrs. Evangeline Horton of Houston; one son, W. R. (Billy) Mulroy, Jr., of Birmingham, Ala.; four sisters, Mrs. L. B. Campbell of Abilene; Mrs. Fred Willette, Miss Mary Rose Mulroy and Miss Catherine Mulroy, all of New Orleans; and six grandchildren.

### Correct Address Essential For Overseas Mail

Postmaster John C. Gregg today urged the citizens of Santa Anna to be sure to use the correct address on their letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Postmaster Gregg reported that millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. He said that one of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5 digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

He said that last year more than 9 million pieces of mail were delayed in delivery. Of this number, 3 1/2 million pieces failed to include the complete 5 digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper addresses.

"As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination," Postmaster Gregg said.

There are four essential elements to an overseas military address. They are:

1. The serviceman's identity—grade, full name, and service number.
2. His military unit—complete.
3. Gateway post office—New York, San Francisco or Seattle.
4. APO or FPO—a 5 digit number.

When any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.
