## Fighting Mountaineers Take Hico Tigers In Easy Victory

The Fighting Mountaineers took an easy win over the Hico Tigers with a score of 54 to 20. The Mounties got on the scoreboard early in the first quarter with a 12-yard plunge from Dickie Horner. Tommy Blanton kicked the extra point. Santa Anna then kicked off to the Tigers and they couldn't go. The Mounties took over then with about six minutes gone in the first quarter. Quarterback Larry Williams took the ball on a keeper over left tackle and scored another six pointer from the 30 yard line. The point after touch-down was no good. Hico couldn't move the ball in the first quarter at all and the Mounties took over again. Tommy Blanton received the honors this time taking the ball around left end for the tally. Horner kicked the extra point leaving the score at the end of the first quarter at 20-0 for the Mounties.

It went back and forth in the second quarter with the "Raider's" playing most of it. Hico finally got on the scoreboard late in the second quarter. Howard Srader then pushed the ball over from the one yard line after three tries. The PAT was wide of its mark. On the kickoff Joe Hawkins took the ball back to the Hico 47. Four plays later they were on the Hico 21 yard line. On first down Dickie Horner kicked a field goal leaving the half time score at 23-6.

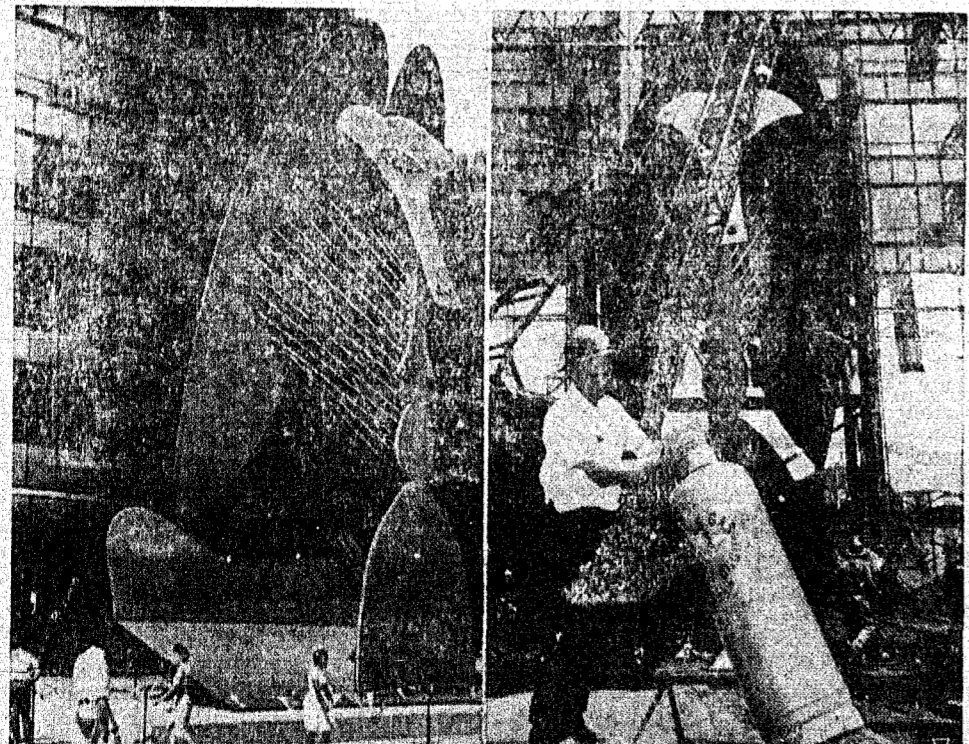

Attracting nationwide attention and curiosity is this unusual 50-foot-high steel sculpture erected in Chicago's Civic Center Plaza. The design for the massive 162-ton sculpture was a gift to the people of Chicago from Pablo Picasso, one of the world's foremost artists. During construction, liquefied petroleum gas was used to heat the metal joints prior to welding and to cut metal. LP-gas, widely used at construction sites for heating, power and lighting, was supplied from metal cylinders like the one in the picture.

A tear stained face says a buddy was killed.

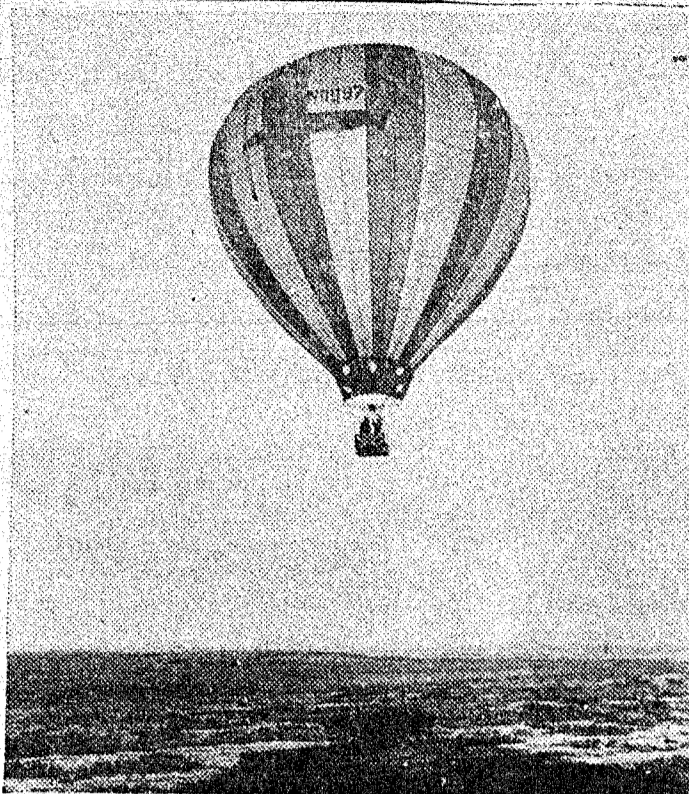
They pass me by with dragging feet, Drenched in sweat from the constant heat.

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### Viet Nam Maps Are Available

Washington, D. C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announces that he has a limited number of 300 Vietnam and Asian continent maps which he is desirous of distributing to families and close relatives of boys serving in Vietnam.

The congressman advises the maps are printed in several colors and indicate the political boundaries and the topographic elevations of the countries of Asia with enlargements of Southeast Asia including an economic map illustrating the products of the various geographic areas. The intent is to provide a useful, factual and informative document, but not to include any of the military aspects.

Burleson said he felt the document would give families of servicemen a better perspective of the area, layout and location where servicemen may be, and he wishes to place them with people who do have a son, husband, father or close relatives in Vietnam and will welcome such requests, on a first-come, first-served basis. Requests should be addressed to Congressman Omar Burleson, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515.

Suggested Deadlines For Mailing

Each year the Post Office Department is flooded with an avalanche of mail during the Christmas season. This year is no exception. It is expected that the Post Office Department will handle more than nine billion pieces of mail during the month of December alone. Your cooperation is requested in order that this huge mountain of mail might be properly delivered in the allocated time.

Special attention will again be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and surrounding areas and to service people stationed in other parts of the world. It is especially important that the following suggested deadlines be observed in sending Christmas mail to servicemen overseas. It is also very important to include their Zip Code in their address and to make the address as clear as possible. It should contain their complete name, rank, serial number, name of organization

and APO or FPO address and Zip Code. Each parcel, mailed inside the U. S. or to servicemen outside the U. S., should have a list inside the parcel, stating what it contains, the name and address of the sender and the name and address of the addressee. The department suggests the following deadlines be observed to assure yourself that your mail will reach its destination on time:

Gifts weighing more than five pounds sent by surface postage rates—November 11. Gifts five pounds or less, plus letters and greeting cards sent at surface rates (these go by air on a space available basis)—December 1.

Air Mail gifts and greetings—December 11.

Domestic Military and Civilian Mail

Gifts to distant states by domestic surface mail—December 4.

Greeting cards to distance states by surface mail—December 10.

Gifts and greeting cards to nearby areas—December 13.

Gifts and greeting cards by air mail—December 19.

Overseas Civilian Mail:

Surface mail to the far east—Now, as soon as possible.

Other areas by surface mail—November 1. Air mail to remote areas off main air routes—December 1.

Air mail on heavily traveled air routes—December 10.

**Eliminate "Spearing," Authorities Caution**

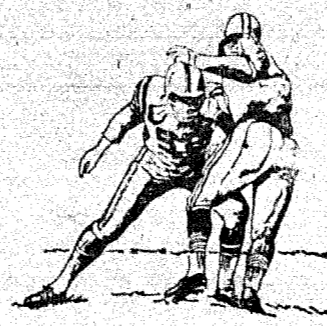
CHICAGO—Football "spearing" should be eliminated, warn sports and medical authorities. Spearing is the tactic in which a blocker or tackler uses his head as a battering ram. It's dangerous, both for himself and for the person he hits.

A group of coaches, physicians, and sports officials have joined the American Medical Association in calling for coaches to emphasize correct, head-up blocking and tackling, and for strict enforcement by officials of the rules against spearing.

Said Notre Dame football coach Ara Parseghian: "I can't begin to tell of the number of clinics where I have lectured on the (spearing) problem. We don't teach this at Notre Dame; and over the years, I have done everything within my power to influence others to coach against it."

The AMA's Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports asked for sports authorities' comments when recent studies showed that head and neck injuries continue to constitute a very high percentage of serious injuries in football.

In the correct, head-up tackle, the player uses his shoulders, arms, and chest to stop the ball carrier. In a "spear" or "butt" tackle, he drives into his opponent with his head. By spearing, the tackler may prevent the ball carrier from ad-



vancing a few extra inches—if he tackles him. With his head down, however, he risks serious injury to his head and spinal cord, and he is more likely to miss the tackle because he has a harder time seeing where he's going.

Studies of fatalities indicate that football has a good safety record, considering that virtually a million players are involved each fall. It could be even better, however, if head and neck injuries could be reduced. In 1966, head and neck injuries were responsible for 23 of the 24 fatalities directly attributed to injuries in college and high school football.

Said Murray Warmath, football coach at the University of Minnesota: "Spearing will never disappear from the game until we quit coaching it and until we absolutely disallow its use on the part of our players."

"It isn't the first man who makes the tackle," Warmath said. "It's that second tackler. He puts his head down, closes his eyes, and piles into the man who's down with one intent, and that's to maim and cripple."

Joining the coaches in condemning spearing and in calling for correct, head-up blocking and tackling were Richard C. Schneider, M.D., an Ann Arbor, Mich., neurosurgeon and member of the AMA Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports; Donald B. Slocum, M.D., chairman of the AMA committee and orthopedic consultant to the University of Oregon football team; William E. Newell, executive secretary of the National Athletic Trainers Association and head athletic trainer at Purdue University; O. B. Murphy, M.D., University of Kentucky team physician and AMA representative to the NCAA Rules Committee; Carl Blythe, Ph.D., Chapel Hill, N.C., chairman of the NCAA committee on football safety and president of the American College of Sports Medicine; L. W. Combs, M.D., director of the Purdue University student health center and a leader in the Athletic Medicine Section of the American College Health Association; and Clifford B. Fagan, executive secretary of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations.

Health claims like these are the business of the Federal Trade Commission, established over 50 years ago as a monitor of business ethics. In thousands of cases, the FTC has cracked down on advertising that ventured too far away from the facts.

To be sure, the FTC itself must stay within the limits laid down for it by Congress. It has no right to prevent mere salesmanship, even though exuberant. For example:

The FTC objected to the claim that a certain weight reduction plan was "easy to follow." But a court overruled the FTC's objection. "The term is obviously relative," said the court. "Such words as 'easy,' 'perfect,' 'amazing,' 'prime,' 'wonderful,' 'excellent' are regarded in law as mere puffing, upon which no charge of misrepresentation can be based." On the other hand, the FTC may indeed stop outright deception, not only in the field of health but in most other fields of business activity as well.

Thus, the FTC has struck down a "French" perfume factory nor library, and a "university" that had neither faculty nor library, an ad "lifetime guarantee" good for one year only.

At first, the FTC was set up primarily to protect one businessman from another. It could take action against a false claim only if honest business men were being harmed by their dishonest competitor.

But under a later amendment the FTC was made the champion of the consumer as well. Even if other business men do not complain the FTC may step in to protect the consumer from being lured.

In other words, the law has retreated from the old marketplace rule of "caveat emptor—let the buyer beware." As the Supreme Court said, in upholding an FTC order against a phony "free book" deal:

"Laws are made to protect the trusting as well as the suspicious. The rule of caveat emptor should not be relied upon to reward fraud and deception."

- 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 lbs. brisket of beef
- 2 tps. paprika
- 3 tps. flour
- 2 tps. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 tps. cooking oil
- 3 medium large onions
- 1/2 cup water

Peel potatoes and cut into halves lengthwise. Peel carrots and leave whole. Set aside in cold water. Blend flour, paprika, salt and pepper. Measure 1 tps. and set aside. Stir in reserved tablespoon seasoned flour into juices and onions in bottom of pan and cook over medium heat until thickened. Serve gravy with sliced meat and potatoes. 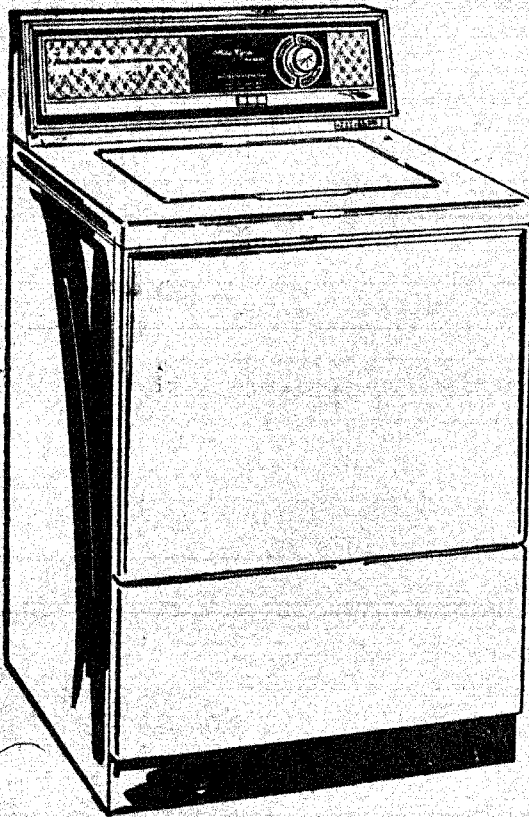

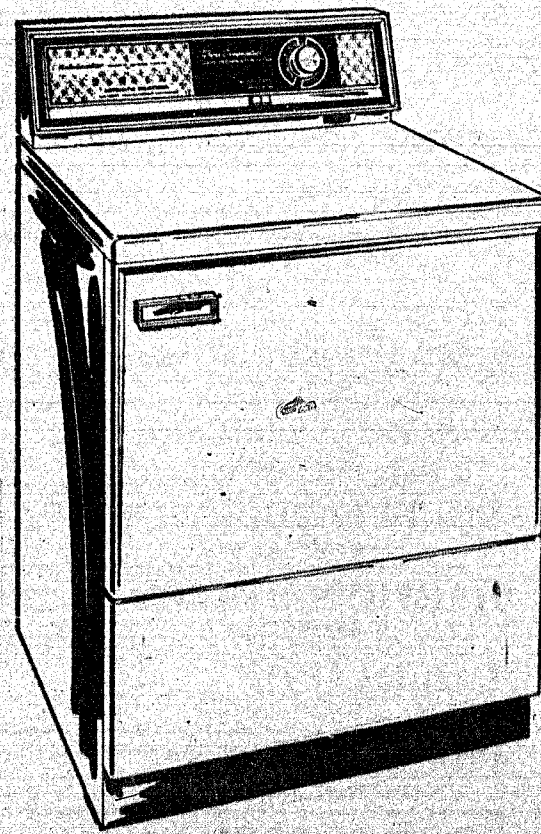

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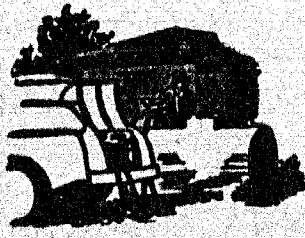

Austin, Texas — A proposed cutback in federal highway spending would seriously damage Texas economy, hamper safety efforts and break continuity in the state road building program, Gov. John Connally has told U. S. officials. This proposal was President Johnson's first response to demands for economy.

In responding to an invitation from U. S. Secretary of Transportation, Alan S. Boyd, to comment on the suggested slash, Connally said a 50 per cent reduction in the federal aid highway program would mean no jobs for 30,000 Texans.

Connally noted that the program has given states incentive for long-range planning vital to efficiency of public works. As a result, he said, Texas Highway Department has maintained continuity and balance in its program "rather than the feast and famine type approach so commonly practiced" in some other fields.

Texas is launching plans to improve highway safety, which would be curtailed by a fund reduction with a resulting increase in the traffic toll on outmoded highways, the governor pointed out.

"It is somewhat difficult for us to understand how a reduction in expenditures for highways financed from the trust fund for which taxes on the motorists have already been levied would be of any advantage to the balancing of the federal budget," Connally wrote. "It is assumed that there would be no corresponding reduction in highway user taxes to balance the reduction in federal aid highway expenditures. If such tax reduction is contemplated, it would be possible for the states to add such levies to their tax programs to keep the state economy in balance."

**COLLEGE ENROLLMENTS ... COST IS UP**  
Enrollments at universities, colleges and junior colleges in Texas are at a record 344,471 students, 9.7 per cent over last fall.

Costs, too, inevitably are rising. Coordinating Board, College and University System noted. Agency estimated that the state bill for higher education will go up \$31,400,000, or \$19.5 per cent, the next biennium if the legislature approves its fund allocation formulas.

In other action, the board

adopted a policy permitting professors in state schools to voice their opinion freely as private citizens without fear of punitive action affecting their jobs. Agency delayed until January the decision on a statewide educational television network proposal.

Enrollment breakdown follows: state senior colleges, 199,241; junior colleges, 76,007; private senior colleges, 58,929; and private or church-related junior colleges, 10,294.

**MUTSCHER CLAIMS VICTORY**  
Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham officially announced his candidacy for next speaker of the House of Representatives to succeed Ben Barnes.

The Speaker is elected by a majority vote on the opening day of the regular session.

Mutscher claims pledges from 135 of the 150 House members.

**COURTS SPEAK**  
The Third Court of Civil Appeals, reversing former State Savings and Loans Commissioner J. O. Gerst, approved the opening of a downtown Houston unit of Spring Branch Savings and Loan Association. Same court upheld State Banking Board award of a charter for the American Bank of Commerce at Grapevine.

The State Supreme Court backed the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals ruling that Mt. Pleasant cannot require Jere Dairy to deliver milk three times a week in the city.

Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the murder conviction and ordered a new trial for a Smith County man accused of killing his wife's former husband because the wife in a divorce suit was on appeal) was allowed to testify at the trial.

The same court reversed the murder conviction in a Harrison County case because the indictment was corrected after being read to the jury, changing the spelling of the victim's name.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES**

Fishermen can't catch fish with their bare hands in the waters of 32 Possum King-

dom Regulatory District, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that Judge Ewing Werlein of Houston cannot draw pay as a court of civil appeals justice for the month of September when he was sitting as a district court judge.

The broad and unlimited corporate purpose clause providing for preparation of income tax returns and assistance with such returns necessarily would include practice of law.

Employees of community centers for mental health and mental retardation are employees of political subdivisions entitled to social security coverage.

Texas probate code provisions that court may waive costs or fees charged in guardianship proceedings to qualify a person for public welfare assistance are not repealed by new county clerk's fee bill.

Act creating Caprock Hospital District provided that the maximum Floyd County tax assessor-collector can charge for assessing and collecting the district's taxes is the top rate he receives for handling county taxes.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED**

Larry Temple, Gov. Connally's top aide, has been named special counsel to President Johnson. Temple, 31, is the second Connally assistant to join the White House staff. George Christian, the governor's ex-administrative assistant, is the President's press secretary.

The governor appointed to Land Uses and Environment Control Study Committee Dr. Charles J. Lind, Jr., Charles Sowell, Stone Wells and Bill J. Ferguson all of Houston and Jim Jackson of Rockport.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed Sen. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock to the same committee.

Smith named Sens. James S. Bates of Edinburg and Jack

Hightower of Vernon to the new Texas Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice and picked Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi to serve on Special Interim Committee on State and Local Tax Policy.

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed Reps. Felix McDonald of Edinburg, John Wright of Grand Prairie and Frank Calhoun of Abilene, Marshall Formby of Plainview and Gregg County Commissioner Bill Owens, Glade-water, to Interim County Government Committee.

**PARK BONDS**

An ironic situation will face Texas outdoors lovers on November 11. That is the day the deer-hunting season opens and also the date of the constitution amendments election which could mean so much to the state's parks system.

Up for voter approval is a proposition which would authorize the state to issue \$75,000,000 worth of bonds to finance expansion and development of the parks system.

Bonds would be issued for 10 years and would be retired through admission fees that are charged at state parks.

Supporters of the constitutional amendment are urging outdoors-type people to vote absentee, if they plan to be out stalking deer on election day.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Damage to schools in the Lower Rio Grande Valley during Hurricane Beulah, along with normal shortages that occur this time of year, has caused temporary textbook shortages in some places across the state.

State Comptroller's office says that private clubs which serve but don't sell drinks must pay sales tax on the mixer and ice which goes into the "service charge" for mixed drinks.

Council of College Presidents of the state-supported colleges and universities has endorsed proposed constitutional amendment No. 6 (to

be voted on Nov. 11) which would allow non-elected state officials to serve on national advisory boards.

Association of Insurance Agents estimates 65,000 individual claims totalling about \$36,000,000 will be filed as the result of Hurricane Beulah wind damage to buildings in the Rio Grande Valley.

Agriculture Commissioner John White granted a 10-day extension to cotton farmers in 17 coastal bend counties to clear fields of stalks under pink bollworm regulations.

San Diego, Oct. 13.—Seaman Recruit Stanley V. McSwane, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer O. McSwane of Route 1, Rockwood, Texas has been graduated from nine weeks of Navy basic training at the Naval Training Center here.

**Whooping Cough Vaccine Is Available**

Whooping cough is an acute infectious communicable disease which involves the respiratory tract.

The characteristic cough accompanied by a whooping sound is almost diagnostic.

The American Medical Association's fact sheet on whooping cough reports that the disease was known as early as 1578 and occurred in epidemic form in England in the 17th century.

The organism responsible is a rod-shaped bacterium known as Haemophilus pertussis which is found in the discharge coughed from the respiratory passages by a victim of the disease. The organism does not survive for any length of time outside the body and is quickly destroyed by drying and exposure to heat and sunlight.

The disease may occur at any season but is most common in late winter, spring and summer. Most cases appear at ages under five years. One attack usually produces immunity. The vaccination against cough is effective.

Many school districts require vaccination against whooping cough and several other childhood diseases before the children may enroll in school. Symptoms include inflammation of the respiratory tract and much secretion of mucus, which becomes quite thick and sticky as the disease progresses. Coughing may be prolonged and violent and accompanied by a whooping sound. Sometimes the child may vomit after a coughing spell.

Convalescence usually begins after four weeks. Very young children are most seriously affected.

Medical care, isolation and good nursing care are essential.

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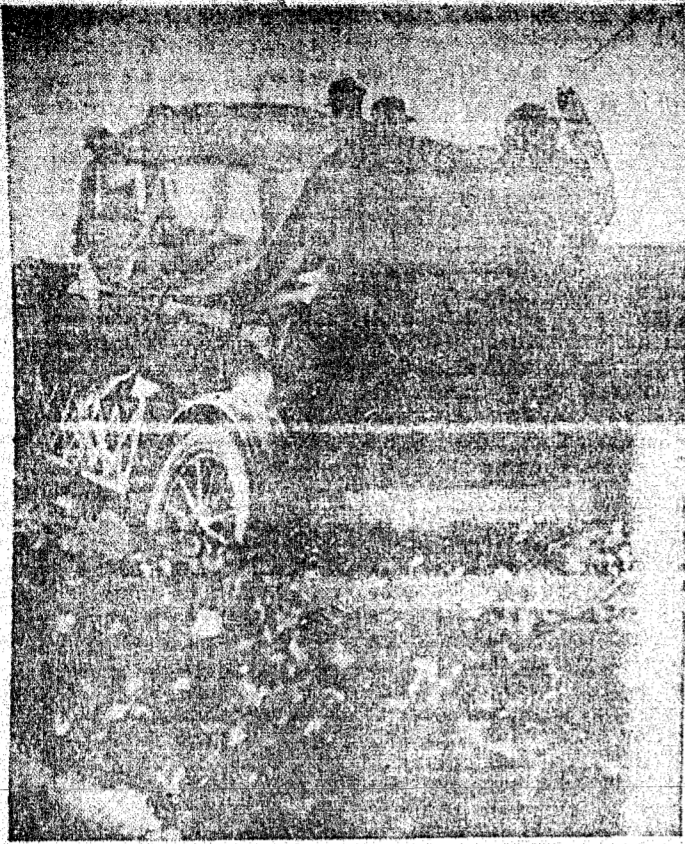

### Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I am already claiming all my exemptions. Can I reduce my withholding any further? I could use the money to pay some of my medical bills.

A—Additional withholding allowances may be claimed based on your actual itemized deductions last year. Ask your employer for Form W-4 and a Schedule A.

To claim such additional withholding exemptions, the taxpayer must expect his itemized deductions for the current year to be at least as much as they were last year. For someone in the \$4,000 to \$6,000 wage bracket, an additional exemption is allowable if itemized deductions were at least \$1,200 for 1966 and are expected to be at least that much in 1967. Taxpayers in the \$8,000 to \$10,000 wage bracket must have had an expect to have at least \$1,705 in deductions to be entitled to an additional withholding exemption.

Q—I'm working for part of my room and board at College. Is there any chance I'd have to pay tax on this?

A—The general rule is that any credit you receive towards your room and board as compensation for work is counted as taxable income. If this plus any other income you have amounts to \$600 or more for the year you will have to file a tax return.

Remember that if your earnings were less than \$600

and any Federal income tax was withheld, a return must be filed to obtain a refund.

Q—I just got a tax bill for additional tax. Can I pay this off in installments?

A—There is no provision for the payment of taxes in installments. Payment is due upon receipt of the bill. You will also find that the bill includes interest on your unpaid taxes at the rate of six per cent a year.

Q—What form do I use to report tips to my boss? I want to get credit for them for Social Security purposes.

A—Use Form 4070 and give it to your employer by the 10th of the month following the month the tips were earned. Do not give any of your tip income to your employer for withholding, however. He will make the necessary withholding from the

wages he pays you.

The general rule on tip income is to report it when it amounts to \$20 or more a month, earned while working for one employer. IRS has a diary that can be used to keep a daily record of your tips. Send a post card to your district director and ask for Document No. 5635.

Q—When I retired I was given some shares of stock in the company by my fellow employees. Will this be taxable to me?

A—If you received the stock as a gift from your fellow employees then they won't be taxable to you. However,

you will have to report as income any dividends you receive on them.

Q—I have several employees who work for me on a straight commission basis. Do I have to withhold any taxes for them?

A—Yes you do. The withholding requirements apply to payments to employees of commissions and bonuses as well as to regular salaries.
