## One Archer And Two Deer

The law of averages is against a man killing two deer from the same blind minutes apart. The odds for an archer killing one deer is about one in 200, and the odds against one man killing two deer with a bow and arrow on the same day are incredible.

Michael Morris, State game warden for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Palo Pinto County, reported Bill Marshall, Sanger, Texas, hunted from a tree blind on the Brazos River Authority Land at Possum Kingdom Lake, and beat the odds.

Marshall killed a four-point buck using a bow and arrow, and before it quit kicking, bagged another which happened along the same trail.

## Game Violations Show Increase

Game wardens of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issued 1,348 citations in October, a 24 per cent increase over the 1,102 citations issued in September.

Hunting violations were the most numerous at 550; 103 of these being for hunting without a license and 102 being for discharging firearms on a public road. There were only 194 hunting violations in September.

Fishing violations numbered 323; 300 of them being for fishing without a license. This was a slight increase over the 300 fishing violations in September.

Water safety violations were down with 228 October citations compared with 444 in September.

Commercial fishing violations were up with 22 citations being issued in October while 19 were issued in September.

There were two pollution citations issued in October and two in September.

Juvenile offenses showed a decrease with only 23 arrests made in October compared with 39 in September.

## TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

Most of us assume that the W-2 form that we receive from our employer is correct, and we file our tax return without checking on the amount withheld. The fact that 5 per cent of IRS's taxpayer assistance calls were about missing or incorrect W-2's shows that this is not always true. Obviously a lot of taxpayers have trouble in getting their W-2 form, or don't think their employer gave them a W-2 for the correct amount. It may be worthwhile to take a second look at that W-2 this year to make sure that your employer hasn't reported too much or too little withholding on your W-2.

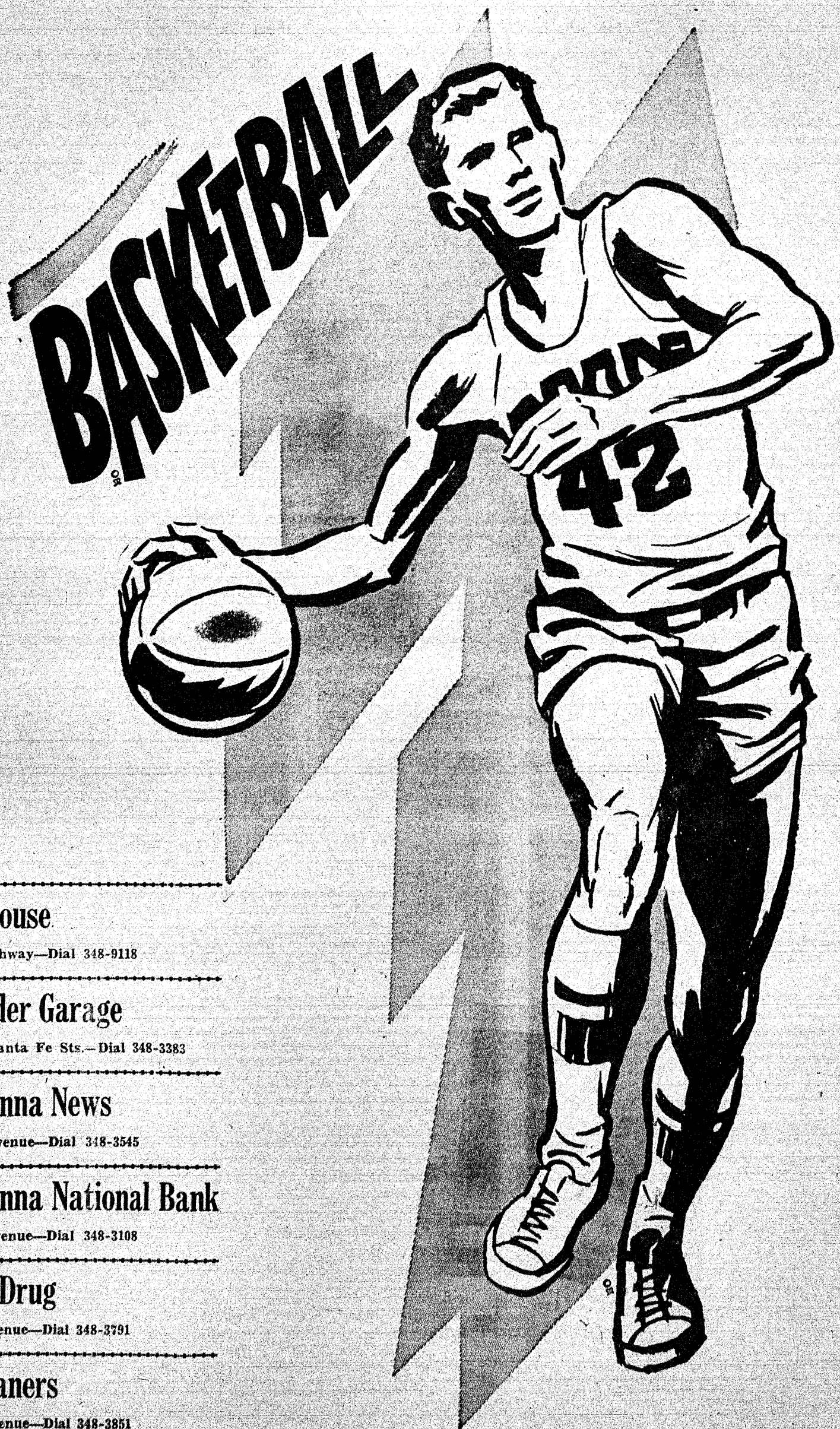

Austin, Texas — Texas will almost double its population — to nearly 18,000,000 by 1990 — and residents will have more money to spend, if not much room to live in.

These are among predictions for the not-so-distant future contained in a new forward look at the state's economy compared by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Their publication, "Texas 90: An Economic Profile of Texas to 1990, includes these highlights:

• New factory growth will bolster the Texas economy more powerfully than any other factor between 1967 and 1990, as the state becomes constantly dependent upon manufacturing. Value added by manufacture (a measure of the difference in value between the raw ma-

terials that flow into a factory and the goods shipped out) will increase to \$37,500,000,000 a year. It now is less than \$10,000,000,000.

• Due for rapid expansion is the work force—although not uniformly in all industries. Most dynamic is the work force—although not uniformly in all industries. Most dynamic employment growth will be in the service industries: laundries, barber and beauty shops, auto repairs, transportation, hotel management, recreation, professional services, etc.

• Texas agriculture will approximately double its output (cash receipts from farm marketings are seen as reaching nearly \$5,000,000,000 in 1990), although farm employment probably will decrease.

• Texas cities will lead the population growth trend. By 1990 both the Houston and the combined Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan areas will have populations of more than 3,300,000. That nearly equals the entire U. S. of 1790. All seven of the state's biggest standard metropolitan statistical areas will see massive growth.

• Negro population, while increasing in numbers, now represents less than 13 per cent of the total, compared to 25 per cent a century ago.

• Spanish-surname population is increasing rapidly and now makes up 15 per cent of the Texas total.

**HE'S GOT 'EM GUESSING AGAIN**  
Once more Gov. John Connally's plans are the No. 1 topic of state capitol specu-

lation. In a press conference here, Connally vigorously denied he may be the next U. S. Secretary of Defense. He plans to serve out his term as governor. But less than 12 hours later in Washington, he acknowledged the secretary's job "would be very difficult to turn down" if offered. With the rumor mill still buzzing, he flew to France on a promotional mission for HemisFair '68, the world's fair in San Antonio next year.

Before he left Texas, Connally had kind words to say about two men who have been mentioned as prospects to succeed him: former Congressman Frank Icard of Wichita Falls (who has stated he does not intend to run) and Secretary of State John L. Hill (who indicates that he plans to announce by mid-January).

Actual declared candidate list picked up a new name: State Rep. Don Gladden, Ft. Worth liberal, announced for lieutenant governor against House Speaker Ben Barnes. Gladden said he would like to run on a ticket headed by Sen. Ralph Yarborough as a candidate for governor. Houston attorney Don Yarborough, another likely gubernatorial candidate, said he wouldn't seek the governor's office if the senator does.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES**

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin has held that telephone companies owe sales taxes on electricity used to perform their operations. Decision means about \$400,000 in revenue to the state.

In other recent opinions, Martin has concluded that: • School board vacancy positions must be specifically designated on ballot.

• To qualify under "grandfather clause," for permit, a corporation need show it was engaged in the legal alcoholic beverage business in the State under a charter or permit prior to August 24, 1935.

• The University of Texas may enter into interagency contracts with Coordinating Board, College and Univer-

sity System to furnish it, at cost, data processing equipment and services.

• Firemen in certain cities are entitled to refund of paid-in contributions to retirement fund on separation from service, notwithstanding prior payment of disability benefits.

• Harrison County commissioners may approve purchase of equipment, supplies or material for road and bridge work though purchase was made by someone other than county engineer.

• Children under 15 can be convicted only for perjury under penal code.

TSPE President H. E. Boyer Jr. said the policies of the Federal Pollution Control Administration and the U. S. Corps of Engineers would seriously affect future Texas water development. He said their position fails to recog-

nize more effective treatment for waste will be discovered in the next century.

Refusing a Job

Two men, both out of work, put in claims for unemployment insurance. Each was asked if he had tried to find another job.

The first man said: "I was offered a job driving a taxicab, but I turned it down. The cab had an automatic transmission, and I happen to prefer a stick shift."

The second man said: "I was offered a job as a paint sprayer, but I turned it down. Although I could do the work, I am extremely allergic to paint."

Were these men, having refused to take jobs that were offered, thereby disqualified from collecting unemployment insurance? All states do disqualify, in varying degree, the person who refuses a job—but only if the job he refuses is "suitable."

In the above cases, the first man was indeed held disqualified. The cab driving job was suitable, because his only objection to it was petty and unreasonable. But the second man was held not disqualified. The painting job was not suitable, because it involved a real danger to his health.

Another factor that may affect the suitability of a job is the distance the person must travel to get there. For

example: A man was held disqualified for unemployment insurance because he refused a job located only 11 miles from his home. Good transportation was available, and hundreds of other employees were making the same trip every day.

But an older man was held justified in refusing a job 34 miles away. In his case, the only way he could have gotten there was by driving an old and ailing automobile. Hours and wages, too, may be taken into account. Thus:

A stenographer who refused a 9 to 6 job, because she preferred 8 to 5, was held too finicky — hence disqualified for unemployment insurance. But a man was held not disqualified when he refused a job at wages substantially below those prevailing in the community.

In this way, weighing individual factors, the law seeks to carry out the basic philosophy of unemployment insurance—to draw a reasonable line between those who do want to work and those who do not. As one court put

it: "Unemployment insurance was designed to alleviate the financial hardship of those unemployed through no fault of their own. It was not intended to provide a vacation with pay."

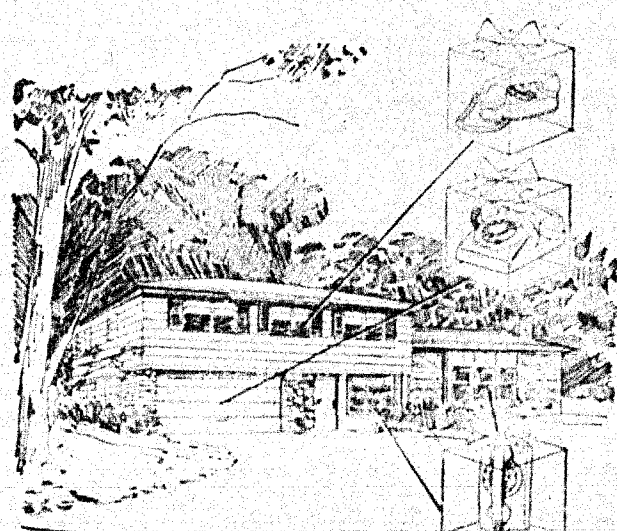

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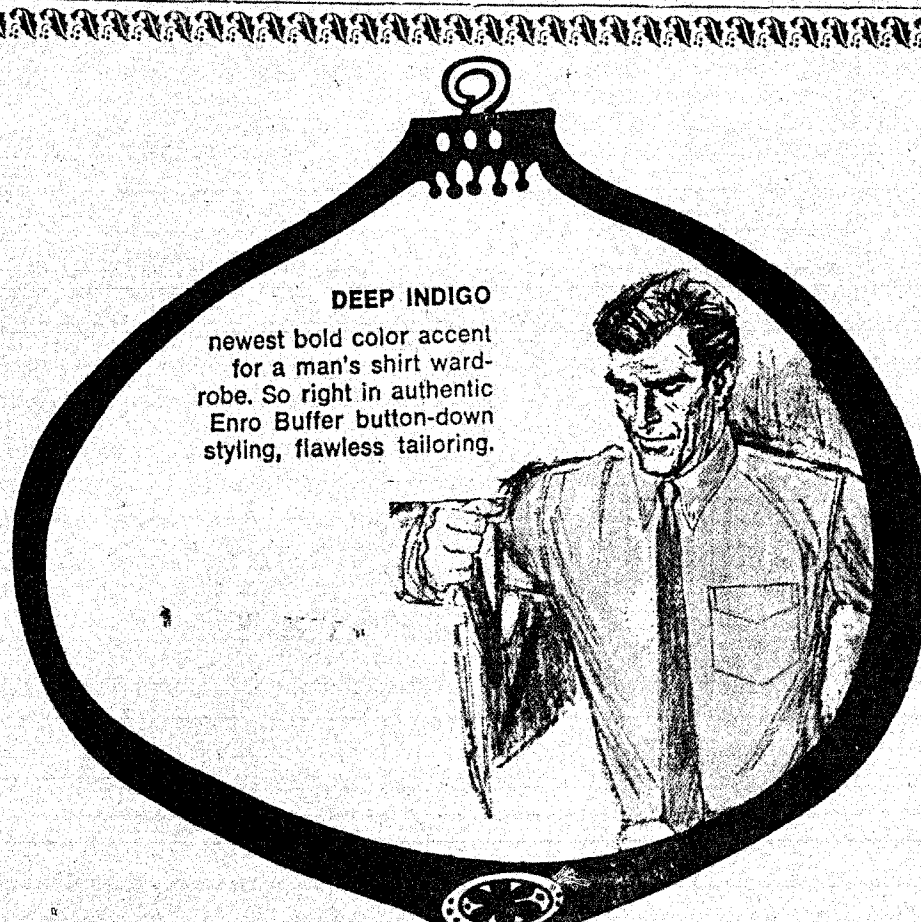
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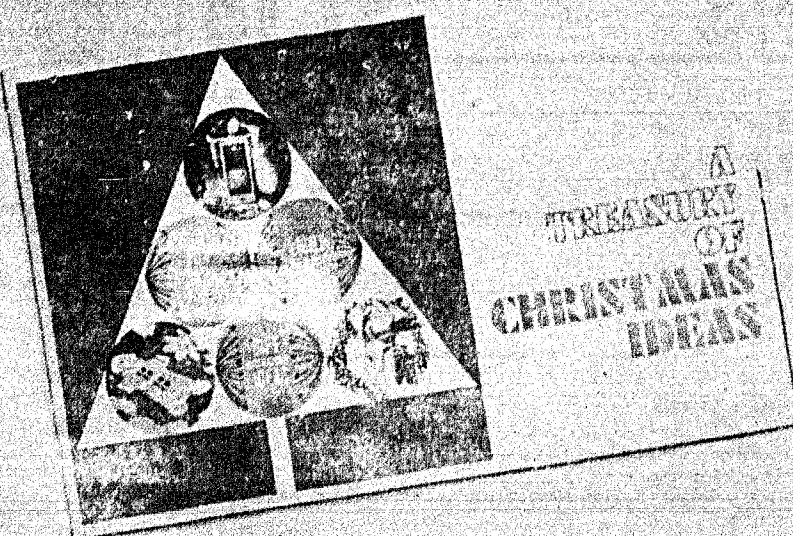


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# AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C. — The method of electing the president and vice-president of the U. S. came under a long and strenuous discussion at the Constitutional

Convention of 1787. Little difficulty was encountered on agreeing that the president and vice president should be elected officials, but there was wide disagreement on the method. At the 1787 convention and since, there have been proposals to elect the president and vice president by direct popular vote, election by the congress, election by state legislatures and election by electors, which is the present system.

There are presently pending before the congress proposals for a Constitutional Amendment which would abolish the present electoral college system. Others would

maintain the electoral system but provide that each candidate for whom votes were cast for president and vice-president within each state would be credited with such proportion of the electoral vote as he received. In other words, if a candidate received 51 per cent of the total vote in a given state, he would receive only 51 per cent of the electoral vote of that state, and the opposing candidate would receive 49 per cent. Under the present system, a candidate receiving 51 per cent of a state's vote, receives the entire electoral vote of that state.

The Constitution of the United States provides that "Each State shall appoint, in such a manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress." All states provide for "appointment" of electors through direct election by the people.

In the last presidential election (1964) the 50 states, with a total of 100 Senators and 435 Representatives plus 3 electors from the District of Columbia, totaled 538.

In each of the states, the political party obtaining a plurality of votes no matter how small, names the entire slate of electors. The electors thus chosen on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, convene as "Colleges" in their own states, on the first Monday after the second Wednesday in December and cast their votes for president and vice president of the United States. This group is known as the "Electoral College."

Originally the founding fathers intended that Electors vote as individuals in choosing a president. Experience, however, soon proved that electors merely acted as representatives of the political parties and expected to vote for candidates nominated by their party. By 1800 independent voting by electors almost disappeared. The states began to adopt the unit vote system by the electors, and by 1892 the present practice had evolved.

It is almost unanimously agreed that some change in the present process of Presidential elections is in order. Congressional committees are studying a variety of amendments which reveal broad differences as to the precise nature of the present inequity, as well as the method by

## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I do some work at home for my boss in an office which takes up about 10 per cent of my house space. Can I take 10 per cent of my house expenses as a business deduction?

A—Several requirements

which it should be remedied. If, however, people are to have a more direct voice in the election of the highest officials of the land, changes from the present system are necessary. Political parties, as such, have no standing under the Constitution, but under the present system it is the political parties which stand in for the people and between them and the election of a president and vice-president. Since political parties have no Constitutional standing, they should remain as intended—to be private and free of federal regulation.

Numerous flaws exist in the idea of the president and vice president being elected directly by popular vote. Perhaps any plan will not be perfect, but there is a need for the influence of the voting constituency to be brought closer in determining who heads our country.

have to be met before a business deduction can be taken for office space in a home or apartment. To qualify for any deduction, you must establish that you are required to provide your own space and facilities as a condition of your employment and that you regularly use this space for business purposes.

You also must be able to show the portion of your home used for this purpose and the amount of time it is so used.

If the office space accounts for 10 per cent of your total space as you state and the other conditions are met, then you may take 10 per cent of such items as rent, heat, lights, real estate taxes and mortgage interest. Depreciation of the office portion of a home is also deductible.

Expenses attributable only to the personal portion of a house or apartment are not deductible. If you use the office portion only half the time for business purposes then you may deduct only 5 per cent of your house expenses as a business deduction.

Q—How long do I have to hold stock before I can treat profits made on it as a long-term capital gain?

A—The profits on the sale of stock or other capital assets held more than six months are treated as long-term capital gains.

Q—Can I deduct fees paid to an employment agency?

A—Yes, fees paid for obtaining employment are deductible if you itemize your

expenses.  
Q—I pay someone to look after my children until I get home from work. Can I deduct this expense?

A—Child care expenses may be deducted when certain conditions are met. Be sure to check the instructions that come with the tax forms. They explain what you have to do to qualify for this deduction.

Q—My ex-wife has custody of our children but I claim them as dependents. Do I still take their withholding exemptions?

A—Yes, you can if they qualify as your dependents. Generally the withholding exemptions are the same as the exemptions that will be allowable on your income tax return.

Q—My company reimbursed me for a trip my wife and I took to find a place to live on my new assignment. On the check I received taxes were taken out. Why was that?

A—The amount you received is classified as wages and not a reimbursement for

deductible moving expenses. When you actually move to the new location, the unreimbursed cost of transporting you, your family and your household goods may well be a deductible moving expense. The cost of meals and lodging while traveling to your new home may also be deductible.
