



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

To qualify for any deduction, you must establish that you are required to provide your own space and facilities as a condition of your employment and that you regularly use this space for business pur-

You also must be able to show the portion of your home used for this purpose and the amount of time it is so used.

If the office space accounts space as you state and the other conditions are met, then you may take 10 per cent of such items as rent, heat, lights, real estate taxes and mortgage interest. Depreciation of the office portion of a home is also deductible.
