

A word to the wise cook: To prevent melting cover a jelly roll pan with aluminum foil and place in freezer. As each ball is finished, arrange it in a single layer on the foil-covered pan. When all the balls are scooped, remove from freezer and arrange

#### Triple-Treat Ice Cream Pie (Makes one 9-inch pie)

3 (1-ounce) squares unsweetened chocolate 3 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons hot milk

1 cup sifted confec-

2-2/3 cups (two 3-1/2 oz. cans) flaked coconut 1 pint each Lady Borden strawberry, chocolate,

Line 9-inch pie plate with a piece of aluminum foil large enough to extend about an inch over plate, keeping the foil smooth and even. In top of double boiler over hot, not boiling, water, melt chocolate and butter. Blend well. In a small bowl, combine hot milk and sugar. Stir into melted checolate and butter. Add only 2-1/4 cups of the coconut, Mix well. With spatula or back of large spoon, press mixture evenly against bottom and sides of foil-lined pie plate. Chill in freezer 25 to 30 minutes, or until firm. Remove from freezer. Lift foil out of pie plate. Carefully peel foil from firm chocolate mixture. Replace shell in pie plate. With a #40 ice cream scoop, quickly make strawberry and chocolate ice cream balls. Roll them in remaining coconut as they are made. Arrange alternate flavors in pie shell. Top with vanilla ice cream balls. Place a piece of aluminum foil loosely over top of pie and return to freezer until serving time.
