## Easter Seal Appeal Letters To Be Delivered

Easter Seal Appeal letters are to be delivered this week in Coleman County according to Amon Johnson, the Easter Seal Representative of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. As representative, Mr. Johnson serves as contact representative for disabled persons needing Easter Seal rehabilitation services and also serves as treasurer of the Easter Seal Appeal in Coleman County.

The Easter Seal Society offers physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special equipment loans to enable disabled persons to make the best use of their abilities to overcome handicaps. These services are financed by the annual Easter Seal Appeal.

The Society also provides for research into the causes and cures of crippling conditions, finances public education programs, and provides scholarships for training of professional personnel to staff rehabilitation centers.

Mr. Johnston pointed out that all these programs are important if Texas is going to continue to provide the best in rehabilitation services for its own disabled citizens.

During 1967, the Texas Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services to 17,622 children and adults who were in need of rehabilitation services. These services are available to any disabled person who can benefit from help provided by the Easter Seal Society, Mr. Johnston added.

The Easter Seal Campaign will run through Easter Sunday, April 14.

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## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Last year's medical expenses don't add up to 3 per cent of my income. Does that mean I can't use the new provision that allows you to deduct one-half of your medical insurance premiums.

A—You may deduct one-

half of your medical insurance premiums up to the maximum of \$150 even though your other medical expenses do not exceed the 3 per cent income limitation. However, to take this deduction you must itemize all your other deductions such as taxes, contributions, and interest expenses. You can't deduct your medical insurance premiums if you take the standard deduction.

Q—My brother and I provide over half of our mother's support. Who gets to claim her

A—If each of you contributed over 10 per cent of your mother's support and the combined total adds up to over half of her total support then either of you may claim her as a dependent.

A special declaration must be completed by the one not claiming the exemption and sent in with the return of the one who claims the exemption. Form 2120, Multiple Support Declaration, is the one to use.

Q—I just filed my 1967 return. What records should I keep in case I'm audited?

A—Keep whatever you need to substantiate the income and deductions on your return. Cancelled checks, paid bills, Forms W-2 and 1099, bank books and similar records will be helpful.

Q—If I send in my return now, how long will it take to get my refund?

A—Accurate and complete return are normally processed and the refund issued within five or six weeks.

Q—Do you have anything that explains how a small businessman should handle depreciation of tools and facilities?

A—Depreciation is covered in our publication "Tax Guide for Small Business."

Q—My son is going to school under the G. I. Bill. Will those benefits lose us the exemption we take for him?

A—Benefits received by your son under the G. I. Bill have to be included as part of his support. Determine his total support requirement for the year and if you provided more than half of this then you are still entitled to claim him as long as the other dependency tests are met.

Check your 1040 instructions for further details.

Q—Is alimony considered taxable income?

A—Yes, alimony is taxable income to the recipient and should be reported.

Payments specified in a divorce court decree for child support, however, are not taxable.

Q—One of my wedding gifts was shares of stock. Do I have to report this?

A—No you do not have to report gifts on your income tax return. However, any dividends on the stock or profits from the sale of the stock must be reported by you.

Q—I was just billed for taxes I paid last month. What should I do?

A—Write the office which sent you the bill telling them when you made your last payment and where it was sent. It is possible that your payment got separated from the return or notice accompanying it.

To make sure payments are properly credited, always put your social security number on your check or money order. It will also be helpful to write on the check what it is for and to return any bill or notice you may have received.

Q—I had several employers last year. Do you need all of my W-2 statements are just the totals?

A—A W-2 for each job held should be attached to your return. Processing of your return, along with issuance of any refund due, may be delayed if one is missing.

Q—Where do you profit from the sale of a home?

A—Use Schedule D to report gains or losses from property sales. Schedule D is available at many banks and post offices as well as local IRS offices.

Q—I helped paint some classrooms for my church school. Can I deduct anything for my time?

A—No, you cannot deduct

the value of your services to a charitable group.

Q—Do people over 65 have to file a return?

A—Yes. A tax return has to be filed by everyone 65 or over when gross income is \$1,200 or more.

## Your New Social Security

(By R. R. Tuley, Jr., Dist. Mgr.)

(Editor's note: This is the 6th of 11 articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

About 14 million people over 65 who missed out on the signing up for the supplementary medical insurance under medicare—which helps pay doctors' bills and other medical bills not covered under hospital insurance—will also miss out on some new benefits unless they take advantage of the period now open to enroll, provided by recent legislation.

These people will be receiving an application blank in the mail soon which will give them through April 1 to indicate whether or not they want the supplementary coverage. If they sign up by April 1, their coverage will begin July 1, 1968. The premium paid by the person who enrolls on time will be \$4 a month, matched dollar for dollar by the Government—so the insurance is worth twice the amount of the premiums people pay it.

Those who miss out on this second chance to take the supplementary protection if they do not enroll by that date, they will have to wait until 1969 for another opportunity to do so.

If you are son, daughter or guardian of an elderly parent who is a bit absent minded or has reading difficulty, and you are not sure whether he is signed up for medical insurance, we suggest you check to see whether that elderly person gets the letter in January offering this opportunity to enroll. You may want to advise him, or help him be sure the application for this important protection is mailed back.

Last year the Internal Revenue sent 987,000 refunds amounting to more than \$136 million to Northern Texans. Unfortunately, thousands of these checks were delayed due to simple errors.

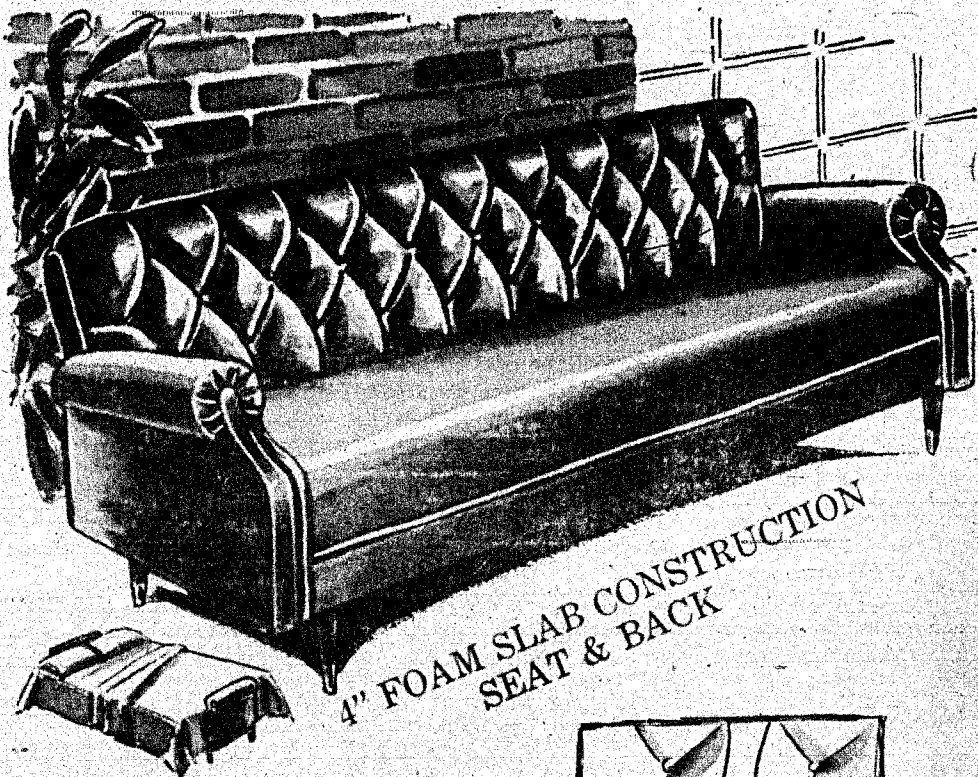

#### Enact the Ten Commandments?

Not long ago, a western lawmaker proposed the enactment of the Ten Commandments as part of the state's criminal code. The proposal did not pass. But it did put into sharp focus the relationship between moral law and criminal law.

There are striking differences between the two systems of law.

For one thing, moral law usually deals in generalities, criminal law in specifics. While the Sixth Commandment says generally that "Thou shalt not kill," the criminal law weighs the specific variations that may effect guilt in a particular case.

Thus, the criminal law recognizes that a person may indeed kill in the necessary defense of himself or his family. This is not a rejection of the Sixth Commandment. It is merely law on a different level.

Furthermore, moral law often sets standards that are too lofty, as a practical matter, to be enforced by criminal penalties. Imagine for instance, the difficulties of enforcing the Tenth Commandment—"Thou shalt not covet"—by fines or jail sentences.

Yet, in a deeper sense, criminal law must at least be in harmony with moral

law if it is to be acceptable to the community. It is to the moral law that mankind looks for its direction and its aspirations.

And if moral law has the disadvantage of being general it has the advantage of being enduring. Poet James Russell Lowell put it this way:

"In vain we call old notions fudge,

And bend our conscience to our dealings;

The Ten Commandments will not budge,

And stealing will continue stealing."

Also, because moral law speaks directly to the conscience, it may influence conduct in a way that no mere legislative enactment ever could.

In one case, a farmer post-

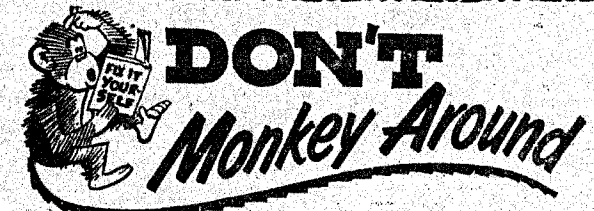

Austin, Texas — A rather important corner may have been turned by the State of Texas in providing transportation facilities for its people. This by clarifying where the line between state and federal regulatory power should be drawn.

Texas Aeronautics Commission took the big step when its six members voted to certify Air Southwest Co. of San Antonio as an intrastate airline competing with the large, federally regulated interstate lines.

Air Southwest plans to offer commuter service among Dallas, San Antonio and Houston using Lockheed Electra prop-jets. It says it can offer service comparable to the large airlines and at rates lower by more than 20 per cent.

Federal-state rub is that the Civil Aeronautics Board licenses the interstate carriers and has its service and subsidy balances all worked

out, without considering any state-licensed airlines.

So, Air Southwest is going to upset those balances somewhat, by taking from Braniff, Trans-Texas and Continental airlines some of the revenues now received under their charter from the CAB. CAB did not make its wishes in the matter of Air Southwest's certification known to the Texas Aeronautics Commission. But Braniff TTA and Continental did. Result was a seven-day hearing before TAC examiners, then another hearing for oral arguments before the commission itself.

Despite TAC's favorable ruling, the flight is far from over. Opponents to Air Southwest's plans have made it known that they plan to take their case into the courts—as far as it will go. In the state courts, they will maintain that the TAC's action was not based on "substantial evidence." If they fall there, one attorney said they might go into the federal courts, charging that the TAC certification placed an undue burden on interstate commerce in violation of the U. S. Constitution.

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**OUTLOOK**

Gov. John Connally revealed a "new unofficial estimate" by State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert on available General Funds, indicating that available revenue for operating state government may be some \$5,000,000 higher than the comptroller's October, 1967 estimate of \$297,600,000.

Governor Connally says the import of that is "the increase in available revenues will relieve the pressures as large a tax bill as was originally anticipated" for the special legislative fiscal session. Connally has denied rumors that he will call a special session of the legislature in March.

"I am hopeful that if the special legislative session this year can be postponed until June," Speaker Ben Barnes said, "the figure will be even less" than the previous estimate of \$115,000,000 in new tax resources necessary to support the state government in the fiscal year which begins September 1.

Barnes said recent revisions in revenue estimates means that if the legislature had passed a two-year tax bill in 1967, instead of waiting for a special session, Texas taxpayers would have been taxed about \$60,000,000 more than necessary.

**L. B. J. CONTRACT AWARDED**

A contract for construction of 16,673 feet high gameproof fencing at Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County has been awarded to Jasper Moore of Ingram. Moore was lowest among five bidders with a project price of \$19,717.

Parks and Wildlife Department said the fencing project was designated more to keep exhibition animals in L. B. J. State Park than to keep visitors out. But it will enclose a large portion of the park and separate it from Ranch Road 1 and the L. B. J. Ranch, known as "The Texas White House."

**PEOPLE POLLUTION!**

A five-state district meeting on the subject is set for March 4 and 5 in Austin. This conference will be followed by a series of state sessions on family planning. Among them will be a special family planning conference

by OEO, the American Association of Planned Parenthood Physicians and the State Nursing Association.

Cost of planned parenthood for one family per year is about \$15, whereas the cost of welfare support—federal, state and county—for a dependent child is about \$1,200 a year.

**COURTS SPEAK**

Supreme Court will hear arguments on March 27 in a Fort Worth case involving whether the city has provided required services to keep 6.3 square miles of annexed land or whether it must relinquish the property taken February 18, 1963, near Everman.

The high court agreed a South Houston Gardens man is entitled to \$14,000 damages for harm to his house and peace of mind caused by low-flying planes after the William P. Hobby runways were extended to near edge of his property.

Transfer of four square miles from Rosenthal to Lorenna school district is invalid without Falls County school board approval, the Supreme Court concluded, upholding Court of Civil Appeals.

The State Banking Board's award of a charter to American Bank of Commerce in Grapevine now has Supreme Court approval.

Third Court of Civil Appeals backed up a district court order that a charter should be granted to Mission Savings and Loan Association in northeast Bexar County.

The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed death penalty assessed Kenneth Allen McDuff who was accused of killing three teenagers.

Residency requirement in state aid to families of dependent needy children act is under attack in a new federal court suit.

**POVERTY PROGRAM SHIFTING**

Texas War on Poverty program seems to be heading for a shift in control to the cities and counties under new federal legislation. New law will give local governments the option of taking over programs, effective February 1, 1969.

Cities and counties would have three alternatives: designate an existing community action agency; or designate themselves or some other public or private agency to operate the poverty program; or leave the decision of who is to run the program up to state poverty officials.

The change in control may also mean a change in the funding formula for the poverty program. Regional EEO Administrator Fred D. Baldwin said there is a "strong possibility" that next year's federal appropriations will come to the states without federal strings on how the money should be used.

**PARK DEVELOPMENT IS ASSURED**

Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will Odom announced a \$34,000 Federal matching grant to develop outdoor recreation facilities at Goose Island State Park, north of Rockport.

With state matching, this will finance a \$108,000 development project including restrooms, tent camping units, trailer camping, shelters, roads, parking areas and utilities. The park, acquired in 1935, is the home of a 2,000-year-old-live oak tree, Chairman Odom noted.

Coke Stevenson, Jr., for 20 years administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board, resigned effective when the board finds someone to replace him.

Railroad Commission approved an exception to its order banning saltwater disposal pits for Garrison Drainage Co., of Corpus Christi which handles disposal for a number of fields in Nueces County.

U. S. Army Corps of Engi-

neers has produced an \$11,700,000 Colorado River project to relocate its flood-discharge channel and convert the lower six miles of the river into a separate shallow navigation channel.

Governor Connally has designated March as "Beauty Texas Month" to recognize the Texas Garden Clubs, Inc., which is celebrating its 40th anniversary.

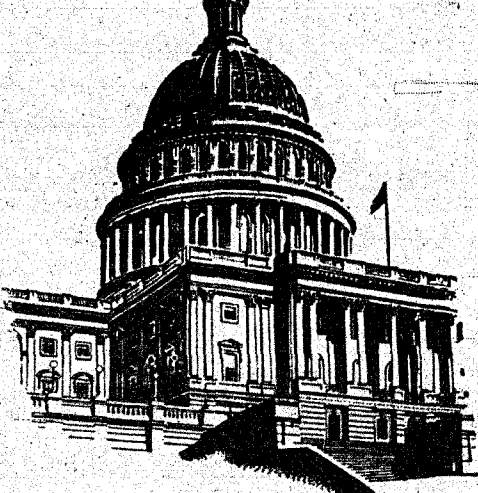
