Leola Christi Barnes, wife of W. Ford Barnes, mayor of Santa Anna, widely known as a poet, lecturer and civic worker, has written her first prose book, HER MAJESTY, NEVERTHELESS, which will be published by The Naylor Company in the spring. This is the story of San Antonio's annual International Black and White Ball, originated in 1933 by the late Maria Magnon as a means for developing closer ties between Americans and their neighbors.

There are more beauty contests in the United States per thousand or hundred thousand population, than any other country in the world. And the trend has spread to many other countries in the past twenty years.

We have the Miss America, the Miss World, the Miss Universe, Miss U. S. A., the Mrs. America and the Miss Just about everything else. Along with the emphasis placed on the female figure by Hollywood and the television industry, it all amounts to over-emphasis on physical beauty.

Physical beauty is not unimportant and it is to be admired and encouraged. However, over-emphasis tends to become unrealistic, what we should admire and encourage in our young girls is a good attitude toward studies, life and home making, dependability, good habits, appropriate modesty and sincerity.

Unfortunately, American girls have the reputation all over the world of being (too often) spoiled or dominating while being unable to completely run a home. Over emphasis on physical beauty and neglect of more realistic values and training is one of the causes.

## Lynn Nabers Announces Candidacy For State Representative, 64th Dist.

Lynn Nabers of Brownwood today announced his candidacy for State Representative from the 64th district, embracing Brown, Comanche, Coleman and Runnels counties. Nabers, a lifelong graduate of the Brownwood High School, Howard Payne College, and Baylor University School of Law. He is presently practicing law in Brownwood.

Between now and May 4, date of the first Democratic Primary, Nabers said he planned to visit every community in the 64th District and contact as many voters as possible to present his position on issues expected to come before the next term of the Legislature.

Nabers said he would support legislation aimed at greater law enforcement and oppose measures which hinder dedicated officers in the dispatch of their duties. Obedience of the law is not only based upon the measures enacted but upon respect for those who enforce it. Lawmen need not only compensation commensurate with their responsibilities but co-operation and respect from all good citizens. Perpetuation of a law-abiding society demands nothing less. We must not settle our differences by riots in the streets and by placard-packing persuasion but the orderly, constitutional process bequeathed to us by God-fearing, law-abiding forefathers, he declared.

## FHA HELPS Rural Families Improve Homes

More than 1260 rural people in the Coleman unit, consisting of Callahan, Coleman and Runnels Counties, have new or vastly improved homes as a result of \$248,750 in insured loan funds advanced through the Farmers Home Administration in the past two years, John H. Curry local County Supervisor of the supervised credit agency reported today.

Approximately \$87,860 was advanced in 1967.

The rural housing program was greatly expanded in 1965 when, as a part of President Johnson's effort to strengthen rural America, the financing of the loans was then switched from federal to private sources. Practically all of the rural housing loan funds now come from private sources on an insured basis. Nearly \$10,000 of amount loaned during the past two years went to individual families with senior citizens, 62 years or older.

The construction that took place as a part of this credit program, provided 4975 man-days of employment for local carpenters, plumbers, electricians, and masons.

In addition, the housing funds circulating through the counties gave the local economy a \$1,741,250 boost.

"In other cases, by putting off filing, there is a delay in receipt of the first benefit check that could have been avoided had an application for benefits been filed shortly after the person became disabled," Austin said.

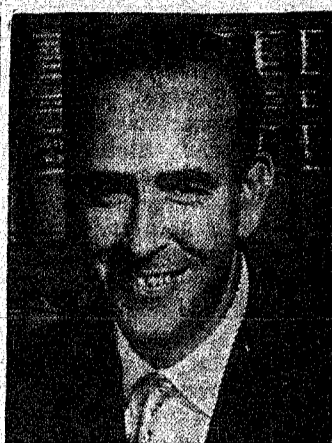

## George Day Is Candidate For District Attorney

George Day announced today that he will be a candidate for District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District. The district includes Brown, Coleman and McCulloch counties.

Day has served as County Attorney for Brown County for the past eight years.

Day stated "It has been my privilege to work for the Citizens of Brown County as County Attorney for the past eight years. I feel that this experience qualifies me to serve as your prosecutor in the District Court. I ask you to elect me to the office of District Attorney.

I shall need and I invite the active cooperation and work of all my friends throughout the district. No one ever won a political race alone and I am no exception. The people of Brown County have been fine and kind to me in the past. I hope that the Citizens of Coleman County will permit me to serve you.

I feel that vigorous and fair prosecution for criminal charges is a vital part of our free society. It is necessary to protect our lives and our property. If you see fit to promote me to this high office, I will try to conduct it in such a manner as to make you proud of the office. If elected, my door will always be open to the people of the district. I ask all law-abiding citizens of the district to join with me in this campaign, and, if elected, to join with me in an untiring effort to enforce the law and suppress crime."

A descendant of a pioneer Brown County family, Day was born in Brownwood in May, 1928, and is the son of William (Bill) and Gladys Day of Brownwood. Day is a graduate of Brownwood High School, Texas A. & M. University and the University Law School. He served with the 45th Infantry Division in Korea and is a Major in the U. S. Army Reserve.

Day is a Shriner and a member of Baptist Church. Other organizations to which he belongs are Kiwanis, Knife and Fork Club, Brown County Sportsman Club, the Brown County Fair Association, Rifle and Pistol Club, V. F. W., American Legion and he is on the Board of Trustees for Howard Payne College.

He is presently a State Director of the Texas Trial Lawyers Association and is a past director of the Texas County and District Attorney's Association and the Brownwood Jaycees.

Legal organizations to which Day belongs are Brown County Bar Association, Law Science Academy of America, Texas Bar Association and has been admitted to practice before the U. S. Supreme Court. Day has actively practiced law for the past 11 years. He is married to the former Shirley Campbell of Brownwood, has three children, Diann, age 14; Gloria, age 11; and Rance age 2. He resides at 1300 13th Street in Brownwood.

Austin, Texas — Political candidates have only a few more days to make up their minds whether they are going to have a share of the action in the slam-bang 1968 races.

Already the governor's column is jammed with impressive Democrats who include former State Rep. Dolph Briscoe, Jr., former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Secretary of State John Hill former U. S. Deputy Ambassador to Vietnam Eugene M. Locke, radio executive Gordon McLendon, insurance executive Pat O'Daniel and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith. Briscoe is from Uvalde,

Carr and Smith are from Lubbock. Hill is from Houston. Locke, McLendon and O'Daniel are from Dallas.

Republicans promise a candidate or two for governor — maybe three — in their own primary. Already announced is Dallas Attorney John Trice.

While the spotlight will be on the Democratic governor's race in the May 4 primary, there will be action in the lieutenant governor's contest also where House Speaker Ben Barnes faces opposition from State Rep. Don Gladden of Fort Worth.

Court races have brought forth the following candidates:

For Supreme Court—Place 1: District Judge Sears McGee of Houston and Associate Justice Matt Davis of the Texas Court of Civil Appeals. Place 2: District Judge Tom Reavley of Austin and Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals.

Fort Court of Criminal Appeals: Judge W. A. Morrison, incumbent, and State Attorney Leon Douglas of Austin.

**CERTIFICATION PROGRAM MOVES FAST**  
Texas Animal Health Commission's crash program for brucellosis certification is picking up steam . . . before

a U. S. Department of Agriculture regulation makes it impossible to move cattle from uncertified counties out of state. Only 97 of the State's 254 counties remain to be certified.

In December, the Commission began testing for initial certification in 26 new counties and brought the number in the certification process to 61. To date 36 counties have not started any program.

Federal regulation is expected this year. AHC, in cooperation with USDA animal health authorities, is working toward total certification.

Commission reported that the screwworm epidemic, on the other hand, is well under control. Confirmed cases in Texas dropped from a total 63 in November to four in December.

**PLANNING FUNDS APPROVED**

Governor Connally has approved \$36,000 in grants in 29 counties to aid regional planning by local governments.

Largest grant, \$22,000, went to the North Central Texas Regional Planning Commission for support of its work program in Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Johnson, Kaufman, Parker, Rockwall, Tarrant and Wise Counties.

A grant of \$7,500 went to the West Central Texas Council of Governments, made up of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, Stephens, Taylor and Throckmorton Counties.

North Regional Planning Commission received a \$6,500 grant for regional planning programs in Archer, Clay and Wichita Counties.

**INDUSTRIAL AWARD PROPOSED**

Until February 5, Texas Industrial Commission is accepting nominations for the "Governor's 1967 Industrial Expansion Award." Nominees should be 1966 manufacturing concerns that expanded in 1967 to the economic benefit of the community at large.

Another point may be won by showing that the nominees contributed to civic and community development in 1967. Award will be presented during the Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion in Austin's Municipal Auditorium on April 3.

**PARKS AND WILDLIFE BUDGET**

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is proposing a \$22,000,000 budget for the year beginning Sept. 1, 1968.

That would be a \$7,000,000 increase over the current appropriation and would cover renovation of Fort Leaton in Presidio County, McKavett near Menard, Lancaster near Ozona, Griffin near Albany, Concho at San Angelo and Richardson near Jacksboro, as well as \$2,000,000 for wildlife management area land acquisition.

**STATE FILES VACANCY SUIT**

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin filed suit for the state seeking to recover as much as \$22,000,000 and as many as 315 oil or gas wells

if Walter C. C. Atchley succeeds in his vacancy suit against State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

Atchley filed in the 36th District Court, in Sinton to establish that a tract of oil- and gas-rich land in the Welder Ranch area is really vacant school land. He filed after the Land Commissioner turned down his vacancy claim.

Martin now is going a step further by filing the petition to intervene. He says he agrees with Atchley, but if he is wrong, and the tract he filed on is not vacant, another is, and the state should recover oil and gas production from the contested area since drilling began in 1942.

**COURTS SPEAK**

State Supreme Court will hear arguments March 13 by Franklin County landowners to abolish the local water district. Also the application for release sought by a Fort Worth man sentenced for contempt of court in a workmen's compensation case.

Same Court upheld right of a city to regulate the sale of liquor and beer within its boundaries when he refused an Amarillo distributor's appeal of a Liquor Control Board license denial.

High Court upheld \$11,289 default judgment won by a former Central Airlines President in a suit for vacation time compensation.

By a divided vote, the Court also reversed and sent back to trial courts a Hidalgo County man's suit to establish royalty rights on an oil lease. Lower courts had held against the claim of W. R. Montgomery.

**MEDICAL AND DENTAL SCHOOLS ARE NEEDED**

At least one and maybe two new medical and dental schools should be authorized by the Legislature next year, according to the Legislative Budget Board.

Higher Education Commissioner Jack K. Williams reported need for one new institution in each category.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith said at least two each should be authorized.

Higher Education Coordinating Board has favored putting a medical school in Houston and a dental school in Dallas. Texas Dental Association favors San Antonio for the dental school since a medical school is already there.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED**

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has designated A. J. Carubbi, Jr., formerly of Galveston County and Pampa, as his executive assistant.

Gov. John Connally has elevated B. G. Allen of Hamilton from acting director to director of the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

Connally also announced appointment of D. O. Tomlin of Fort Worth to the Texas Air Control Board. And to the Coastal Industrial Water Authority Board Robert

C. Lanier of Harris County, George Hensley of Liberty County and John G. Jennings of Chambers County.

Brownsville business man Manuel A. Sanchez III is the state Republican Party's new assistant deputy state chairman for Region III (South Texas).

Robert Nail of Albany has been named chairman of general arrangements for a governor's conference on the arts set for Austin on March 31-April 2.

William Allan Robinson of Austin has been named by the governor as supervising director for the art exhibit and cultural activities display in the Institute of Texan Cultures at HemisFair '68.

**LCB AND DPS MERGER PROPOSED**

Former Attorney General Waggoner Carr, now a candidate for governor, suggests merging the Texas Liquor Control Board with State Department of Public Safety.

In speaking as a Junior Chamber of Commerce banquet here Carr said he had learned to respect the LCB and its agents when he was assistant county attorney in Lubbock with the job of helping to enforce the liquor laws. Carr says LCB agents are the "step-child" of other law enforcement agencies—and are paid less than other officers. He contends they need higher pay and better state transportation and this could be accomplished by the merging of the two agencies.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Texas retail sales boom continues into its 8th year, with three per cent gain reported last year over 1966.

State Treas. Jesse James filed for his 14th term. Ground has been broken for the new multi-million-dollar state finance building in the Capitol Annex.

The American Party has opened Austin headquarters booming George Wallace of Alabama for President.

A magistrate must appoint an attorney for an indigent brought before him if the accused requests it, says Attorney General Crawford C. Martin.

Parks and Wildlife Commission will hold its regular quarterly meeting in Austin at 10 a. m. on February 13.

Governor Connally, 1941 law graduate of UT, will deliver the June 1 commencement address at his alma mater.

**Federal Tax Questions And Answers**

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q**—Can I forget about the fourth installment of my estimated tax if I file my 1967 return early?

**A**—If you file your 1967 return and pay the balance due by January 31, there will be no penalty for not paying the fourth installment. If you do file early, don't forget your estimated tax declaration for 1968. The deadline for filing this declaration and paying the first installment of any tax due is April 15, 1968.

**Q**—I got a Form 1040A in the mail. Does that mean I can't use the long Form 1040?

**A**—You should file the form that best meets your tax situation and the requirements of the law. You received Form 1040A in the mail because that was the form you filed last year.

**Q**—When can I expect to get my W-2 statement?

**A**—The law requires employers to distribute W-2 withholding statements to employees by January 31.

When you receive your W-2 be sure to attach it to your return when you file. Failure to do so delayed refunds on over 200,000 returns last year.

**Q**—When is the next payment due on my maid's social security?

**A**—The next quarterly report is due January 31.

Also due by January is a statement to your maid covering the total amount of wages paid and social security

**Searching Your Car**

If a policeman stops you for a traffic violation, may he search your car?

This question might seem minor. But it raises some major constitutional issues. According to the Fourth Amendment, you are protected against "unreasonable searches." And evidence obtained from such a search cannot be used against you in court.

But what is "unreasonable?"

Gradually, through a series of court rulings, several basic

taxes withheld during 1967.

This report may be made in any form suitable for the employee to keep. It should show the employer's name and address, the employee's name, address and social security number, the total amount of employee social security tax deducted.

For your convenience, IRS has prepared Form SS-14, that can be used to provide this information to household employees. Copies may be obtained by sending a post card to your district director.

**Q**—Can you take a deduction for clothing or furniture given to charity?

**A**—If you made the donation to a qualified charitable organization, you may deduct its fair market value as a charitable contribution on your return. In order to do this you must itemize all of your deductions rather than take one of the standard deductions.

**Q**—The label on the tax return I received in the mail is wrong. What should I do?

**A**—Draw a line through the incorrect part and put in the proper information. Return the corrected label with your return when you file so that your return will be properly identified and the needed correction can be made on your tax account.

**Q**—When you support a person over 65, can you take an additional exemption for him because of his age?

**A**—No, there is just one \$600 exemption for a dependent regardless of age.

**Q**—I didn't cash one of my stock dividend checks until this year even though it was issued in 1967. What year should I report it?

**A**—The law says income should be reported the year it is constructively received. In your case this means the dividend check should be reported as income for 1967.

Applying this same rule to interest of savings accounts, interest should be reported the year it is credited to an account even though it is not entered into the saving-account passbook until the following year. For example, interest for the quarter ending December 31, 1967 should be reported as income on 1967 returns.

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rules have become fairly well established.

For one thing, the search is not lawful if the motorist was stopped on a trumped-up charge, merely as an excuse for making the search.

In one case police suspected that a certain car contained illicit lottery tickets. To find out, they halted the car for "passing on a curve"—even though passing on that that particular curve that particular curve happened to be perfectly legal.

As it turned out, the police did indeed find lottery tickets in the car. Nevertheless, this evidence was held inadmissible in court, because there was no valid basis for the arrest in the first place.

Nor is the search lawful, even when there really was a traffic violation, if the search has no logical relation to the violation. Thus, police who stopped a motorist for making an improper U-turn were held not justified in searching the car for narcotics.

On the other hand, police who stopped a motorist for drunk driving were held justified in looking for whiskey. Their discovery of a bottle of gin, half empty, helped afterward to convict the motorist of driving while intoxicated.

Furthermore, the search is lawful if, after the car is stopped, police observe some telltale sign of criminal activity.

For example, while an officer was writing a ticket for speeding, a passenger in the car shifted his position—accidentally revealing a hidden

pistol. The officer promptly made a search, discovering not only weapons but stolen merchandise as well. Under these circumstances, the search was held lawful and the evidence admissible in court.

Of course, the safest procedure for the police is to get a warrant before making their search. But the law is less insistent on a warrant for searching a car than for searching a house.

The reason is obvious: whisking a car out of the jurisdiction is easier than whisking a house.

## People With Chronic Bronchitis Must Stop Smoking Cigarettes

People with emphysema or chronic bronchitis must stop smoking cigarettes, seek out a physician, and follow his advice if they want to get better. This advice appears in a new publication just released by the National Center for Chronic Disease Control, U. S. Public Health Service.

"If you have Emphysema or Chronic Bronchitis," prepared by the Center's Chronic Respiratory Disease Control Program, is designed to help patients understand what causes their shortness of breath, fatigue, coughing, and wheezing, and how to minimize their discomfort. It answers questions patients ask about the effects of climate, altitude, and air pollution and outlines steps physicians take in treating the diseases.

It points out that most people with severe emphysema have been heavy cigarette smokers, and that continued irritation to the lungs from this habit can rapidly advance the progress of the disease. It explains that for those who break the cigarette habit, a complete cure of chronic bronchitis is likely and rapid improvement

in emphysema is possible. Continued smoking can completely nullify the possible benefits of medical treatment.

Emphysema and chronic bronchitis, diseases of the breathing system, killed 23,432 people in 1965. The number of deaths from these diseases has doubled every 5 years since 1950. This rate of increase is greater than for any other cause of death in the United States and is four times the rate of increase for lung cancer death. In addition, thousands of people are disabled every year by emphysema and chronic bronchitis.

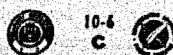

## Anglers Can Grow Earthworms At Home

Austin — Few anglers will dispute a fish's partiality toward the earthworm, and the fisherman who grows his own earthworms can enjoy almost unlimited bait for very little money.

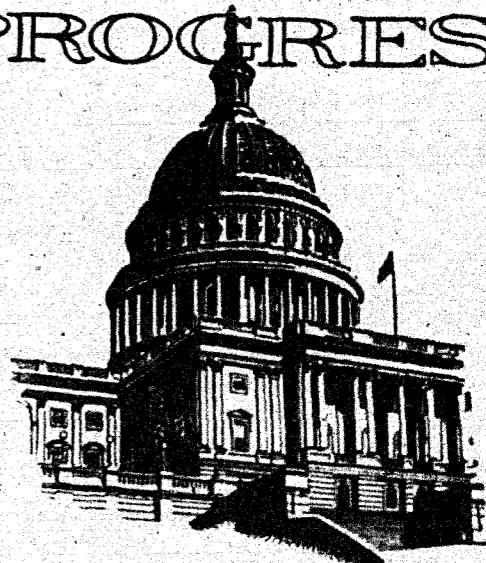
The angler who decides to sell a few worms can even come out ahead.

According to a circular by the U. S. Department of Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, several thousand bait-size worms can be grown yearly in a tub two feet in diameter and ten inches deep.

The circular says worms can be fed chicken mash or a mixture of coffee grounds, dried cracked wheat, and bread crumbs.

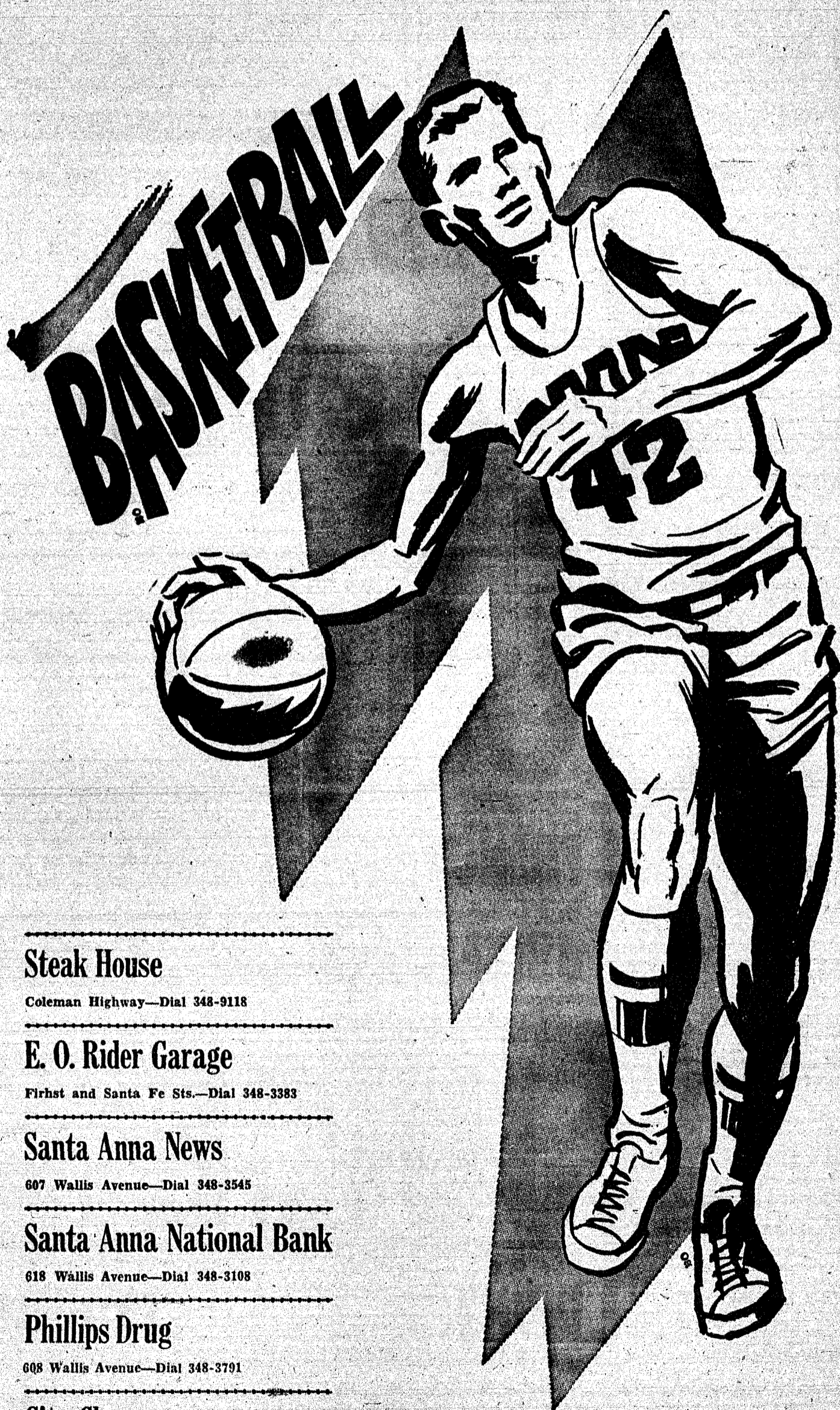


