Federal Tax **Questions And Answers**

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by tax-

Q-Can I forget about the fourth installment of my estimated tax if I file my 1967 return early?

A-If you file your 1967 return and pay the balance due by January 31, there will be no penalty for not paying the fourth installment. If you do file early, don't forget your estimated tax declaration for 1968. The Mrs. Epperson was visiting deadline for filing this declaration and paying the first installment of any tax due is April 15, 1968.

Q-I got a Form 1040A in the mail. Does that mean I can't use the long Form


