Bert Massey Announces For State Representative

Bert Massey of Brownwood, announces today that he has filed for the office of State Representative, 64th District.

Massey, who made the formal announcement of his candidacy in November, is a life-long resident of Brownwood, and he is a graduate of Brownwood High School and the University of Texas at Austin. At the University, he was very active in campus affairs, having served on the University Chancellor's Advisory Cabinet, and as vice-chairman of the Board of Directors of the University Co-op. He is a member of Delta Theta Phi legal fraternity. Massey has also been active in the work of the First Baptist Church in Brownwood, and the Order of DeMolay, having served as State Master Councilor of that organization. He is a member of the Brownwood Jaycees.

Concerning his candidacy, Massey said, "I consider the office of State Representative one of high responsibility. The Legislature of Texas is the Board of Directors for approximately a three billion dollar business. I have attempted through my work in the House of Repre-

sents during the past two sessions of the Legislature and my study of the workings of state government to qualify myself to effectively represent all the people of the 64th Legislative District. I shall campaign hard in an effort to personally meet as many residents of this district as possible, and I earnestly ask for the support and vote of each and every one of them."

The board also ordered the annual trustee election for April 5, 1968. The terms of Richard Horner, James Eubanks, Sr., and Joe Wise expire. It was first thought that William Brown, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Allyn Gill, would be required to run, but it was found that the effective date of the new law regarding appointments was August 28, two months after the appointment of Mr. Brown and therefore does not apply at this time.

Application forms for candidates for the Board of Trustees are available at the office. Candidates must file not less than 30 days prior to the day of the election which will be March 6.

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Austin, Tex. — Around and around goes the Texas Liquor Control Board inquiry — and where it stops nobody knows.

Threatened with disclosures that would "blow the top off" irregularities in operations of some of its field personnel, the board heard just enough to rattle its windows at a one-day public hearing here.

Widely heralded fact-finding proceedings before the three-member board developed little evidence.

But the probe, according to LCB Chairman W. D. Noel of Odessa and First Assistant Atty. Gen. Nola White, coordinator, will continue behind the scenes.

Gov. John Connally said the fact that only five witnesses showed up for the hearing (when 500 had been invited) was "very disappointing."

Ex-inspector William G.

Groce and Raymond Valenta among seven Dallas LCB employees fired on December 13, provided most of the testimony. They denied any wrong-doing and demanded exoneration of any part in alleged rigged sale of confiscated \$78 truck and the reported trading of 11 bottles of confiscated liquor to an auto painter.

Dallas Assistant District Attorney William F. Alexander repeatedly questioned Groce and Valenta about their association with a 417-pound private investigator named Smokey Joe Smith. Smith is under indictment on charges growing out of alleged efforts to "fix" liquor license suspensions.

That some partially was shown in enforcing liquor laws in the Dallas area, was hinted by the ousted inspectors. But they denied pressure to put anybody out of business or any knowledge of license suspension reductions by the board's state headquarters.

White commented after the hearing that no real evidence of wrong-doing developed.

Further hearings in Jasper, Dallas, Odessa and Tyler

have been suggested. Meanwhile, new fuel was thrown on the fire by the firing or resignation of the board's supervisor of investigation, John W. Crank. Crank said he quit because he was "fed up." The board said he was relieved of his duties.

BUDGET
State agencies now are in the process of presenting their 1968-69 budget requests to the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's Budget Office.

Staffers in these offices have indicated they can be ready for a special legislative session by the end of February if that time should strike the fancy of Governor Connally.

Budget office personnel are confining their attention to agencies offering major changes in their proposals over funds allocated for fiscal 1968.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION

A blue-ribbon constitutional revision commission has set itself a late — may deadline for the processing of study-group proposals for changing the state constitution by sections.

The commission granted its study sub-committee broad leeway as to whether to recommend sweeping "philosophical" rewriting or simple updating of basic laws and elimination of deadwood. Most members appeared to lean toward the latter, and some warned that the legislature is going to do as it pleases anyway with the final handiwork.

POLLUTION SUITS
Two Dallas corporations are suing the Texas Water Quality Board which ordered them to stop releasing untreated sewage into the Sabine River near Orange.

Meanwhile, the board has taken legal action against Harris County Water Control and Improvement District No. 60 to stop the discharges from its plant into Middle Bayou and Clear Lake. The board also called for Spring Branch Utilities, Inc., to show cause why

it should not be ordered to stop pollution of Spring Branch Creek in Houston and Spring Valley with sewage plant effluent.

Inwood Development Company and Westgate Corporation, owners of Riverside Homes Addition near Orange U. S. Naval Station, filed suit after the board told them to tie into the Orange sewage system. Petition claimed the board has no authority over Sabine River since it is the subject of a Texas-Louisiana boundary dispute. Also involved are questions of proof that the plant release is detrimental to health.

The Board also learned that the Shell Company is building a \$4,000,000 secondary waste-water treatment plant at Houston.

SCHOL HEARING SET

House standing committee on education will hold 10 statewide public hearings during February. First will be in Kilgore on February 20 and the second in Gainesville on February 22.

Chairman George Hinson of Mineola says the principal purpose is to determine the needs in the area of vocational and technical education, and to explore inadequacies and lack of coordination. Most of the hearings will be held in rural areas and smaller towns, although metropolitan problems also will be explored.

Representatives of the Texas Education Agency, the higher education coordinating board, the regional education centers and the governor's public school study committee will report at hearings. Educators, business and industrial leaders and private citizens are invited to testify.

COLLEGE SALARIES

A new report from the Coordinating Board, Texas Colleges and Universities System, has pegged Dallas County Junior College as the highest paying junior college in the state.

Salaries there average \$8,962 annually. But the highest individual income for a junior college teacher, \$13,600, is reported from Tar-

rant County Junior College in Fort Worth.

One with the lowest average salary rate is Hill Junior College at Hillsboro. The average salary there is \$6,525 per year.

CAR INSPECTION SLOW

More than 4,250,000 vehicles still have not been inspected for 1968 auto safety stickers reports the Texas Department of Public Safety. April 15 is the deadline.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS director, said only 1,574,367 cars have been thru inspection lines. A total of 5,702,882 were inspected in 1967.

Garrison urged drivers to have cars inspected soon in order to avoid those long lines which develop every year near the deadline.

Inspections will be a little tougher this year. Items covered include steering, wheels, rims and front seat safety belts where anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment. Garrison observed that some drivers may have to install seat belts before they can get a stamp.

There are now 5,336 inspection stations in Texas.

PARKS GRANTS APPROVED

Federal grants of \$35,200 and \$31,250 respectively have been approved for development of state parks in Daingerfield and Corpus Christi. Funds will be matched by legislative appropriations for \$70,400 and \$62,500 total cost projects.

Daingerfield's 551-acre unit adjoins an 80-acre lake. Corpus Christi park is on 13,838-acre Lake Corpus Christi near Mathis on the Nueces River.

COURTS SPEAK

The State Supreme Court, backing the lower courts, denied Sun Oil's plea for injunctions to keep two Hockley County men from blocking its use of fresh underground water in secondary oil recovery operations.

The High Court refused to review a Midland woman's suit against a physician who, she claimed, performed an unnecessary operation that caused a stroke.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

House Speaker Ben Barnes and California Speaker Jesse Unruh has been named co-vice-chairmen of a new Council of State Government Committee on Legislative Modernization. Committee is to develop a series of new techniques to cope with growing problems facing state legislative bodies.

Danny Burger of La Marque has been appointed as manager of the \$400,000,000 Texas Water Development Fund, succeeding Howard B. Boswell, who has moved up to executive director of the

Water Development Board. Howard Rose, Austin attorney, has been elected chairman of the Texas Water Quality Board.

Miss Katherine Ard, Conroe, will serve as a field consultant for Texas State Library in a 33-county Southeast Texas area.

Governor Connally appointed former Congressman Ed Gossett of Dallas judge of County Criminal District Court No. 5. He succeeds the late Judge A. D. Bowle.

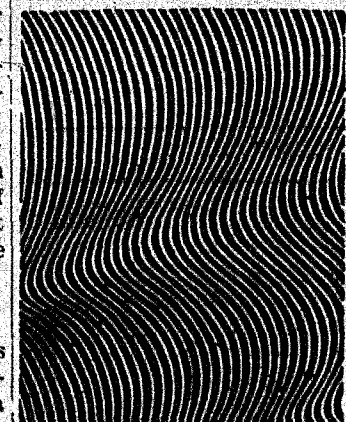
SHORT SNORTS

Republican leadership has agreed on Wichita Falls attorney Paul W. Eggers, 48, a political unknown, as its preferred GOP candidate for governor. Two other Republicans, John Trice of Dallas, and Wallace Sisk of Houston already had filed.

Texas State Teachers Association is polling legislative candidates on how they stand on another pay raise for teachers. State Public Safety Commission announced a far-reaching new statewide crackdown on crime, with state officers moving in where local law enforcement efforts bog down.

Last year Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and his staff of 100 attorneys won 98.5 per cent of the Department's lawsuits which it tried—Score: 4,995 cases won, 65 lost. Water Development Board sold a \$15,000,000 bond issue to a syndicate

headed by a Chicago bank. Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon has filed for reelection to that post.



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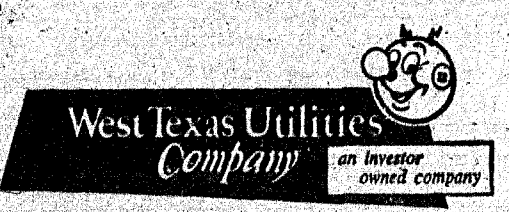

They answer questions, draw diagrams, write a short report and send a photo. Each contestant needs an adult sponsor to oversee the garden project and co-sign his entry. Seeds are good quality, donated by some of America's leading seed companies.

Valuable prizes include all-expense-paid trips to interesting places in the United States, cash and bicycles. The contest, conducted on a

regional basis to give more equal opportunity to all, is divided also into two sections—teen and preteen.

Prospective entrants should send 25c to help defray postage and handling costs, to Mrs. Sandra D. Greaves, assistant county home demonstration agent, P. O. Box 29, Coleman, Texas 76834. They must include their name, age, address with zip code, and the name and address of their adult sponsor. The county deadline for entering the contest is February 29. Any adult may sponsor any number of contestants. Contestants must be age 6 to 19, as of Sept. 1, 1968, and not have won a first prize in any previous YAG contest. The contest will be limited to the first 6,500 entries received on the nation-

al level. Winners will be announced in the December, 1968 issue of Flower and Garden Magazine, as well as by mail.

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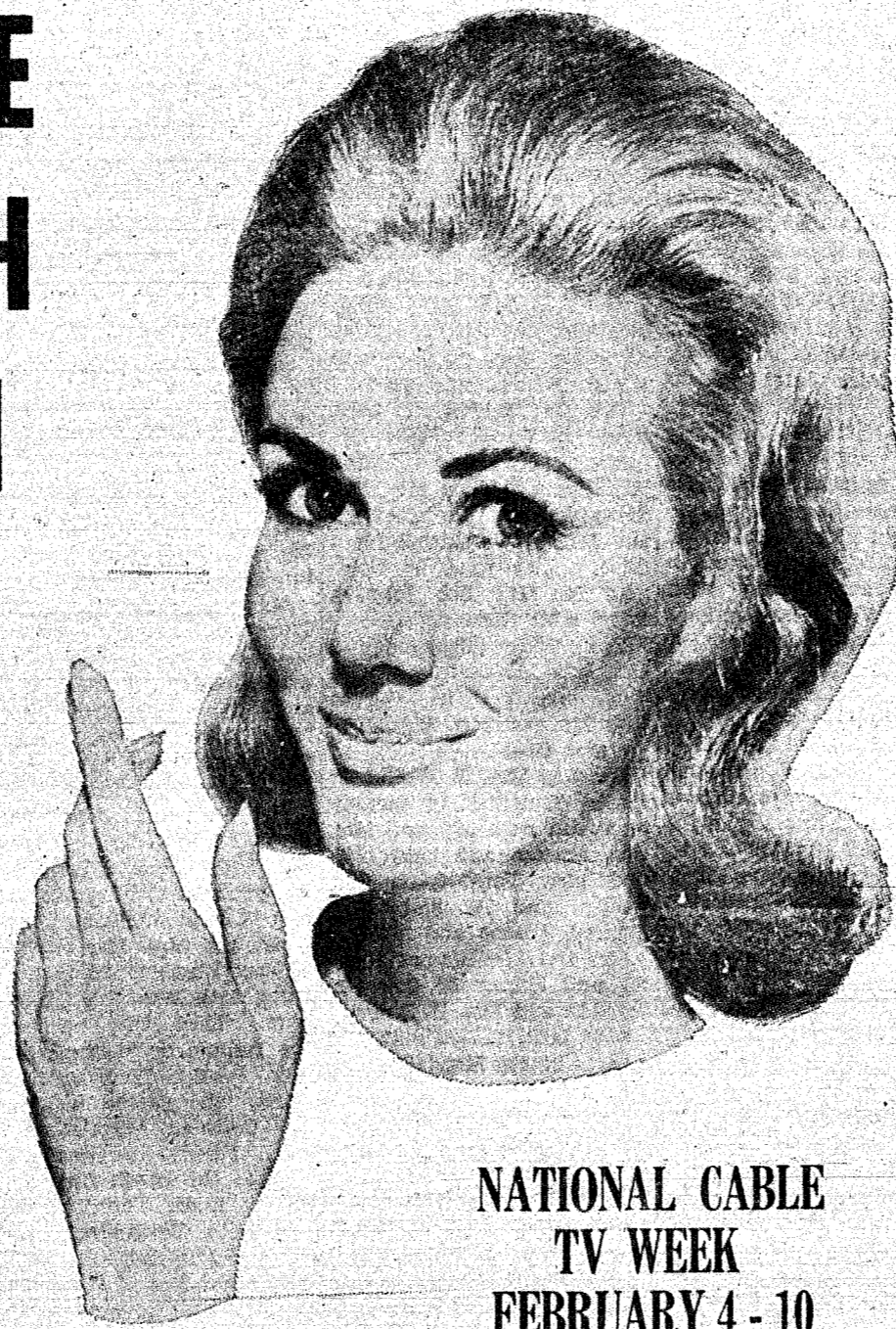

**New Industry
In Santa Anna**

A new industry has developed in Santa Anna, for the marketing of eggs, announces Ken Bowker, owner and operator of the business. The product will be sold under the name of Ken's Eggs.

Bowker plans to serve the area known as the "Big Country." Current production is 90 cases of eggs per day and this production will be stepped up as the demand increases. Bowker hopes to double that production figure by fall.

The eggs are all produced in Coleman and Santa Anna, and the firm is now using 53,000 lay laying hens, produced from a top strain of Texas chickens.

The industry is now employing seven full-time employees, and this employment will be enlarged as the production increases. Also, Bowker, has ordered new equipment which will assist considerably in the handling of the eggs.

In addition to egg business Bowker owns and operates Ken's Farm and Ranch Supply here in Coleman and the Griffin Turkey Farms at Santa Anna. The hatchery produces between 150 and 200 thousand poulters per year. Bowker stresses that he is not in competition with the other egg producers in Coleman County, that he will serve a multi-county area, and strongly believes in free enterprise.

Bowker is proud of his new egg business and the plans for same, but unlike other businesses he is not able to welcome visitors. In fact, visitors are not permitted in keeping with isolation requirements as recommended by the national organization.

Ken Bowker is a director of the Texas Poultry Association and is a member of the Texas Poultry Federation and the Texas Egg Council.

When A Child Darts Out

Rare is the parent, and rare is the motorist, who has not been haunted by the vision of a child darting out in front of an oncoming automobile. Yet, tragically, such accidents are anything but rare.

If a child is injured or killed in this manner, who bears the legal responsibility?

In a sense the child himself is at fault, since he "took the initiative" in causing the accident. But the law adjusts its standard of care to fit the age of the individual.

In most of these darning-out cases, the child is too young to be tagged with the label of negligence.

Yet, the fact that the child is not responsible does not automatically shift responsibility to the motorist. Our humanitarian sympathy for the youthful victim does not

justify placing the blame on someone who is truly blameless.

Thus, a motorist is ordinarily not liable for running down the child who darts out suddenly from behind a parked car. For there is nothing to give the motorist fair warning of what is to come.

But there are many circumstances which should put the motorist on a special alert. An obvious example is the presence of a child in the street. The motorist should not assume, even if he blows his horn, that the child will promptly and prudently retreat to the sidewalk.

Even if there is no child in sight, other telltale signs may cry caution. For example:

In one case, the fact that a ball bounced into the street was held good reason for an oncoming motorist to expect that a child might follow.

In another case, a posted notice of "CHILDREN AT PLAY" was held sufficient

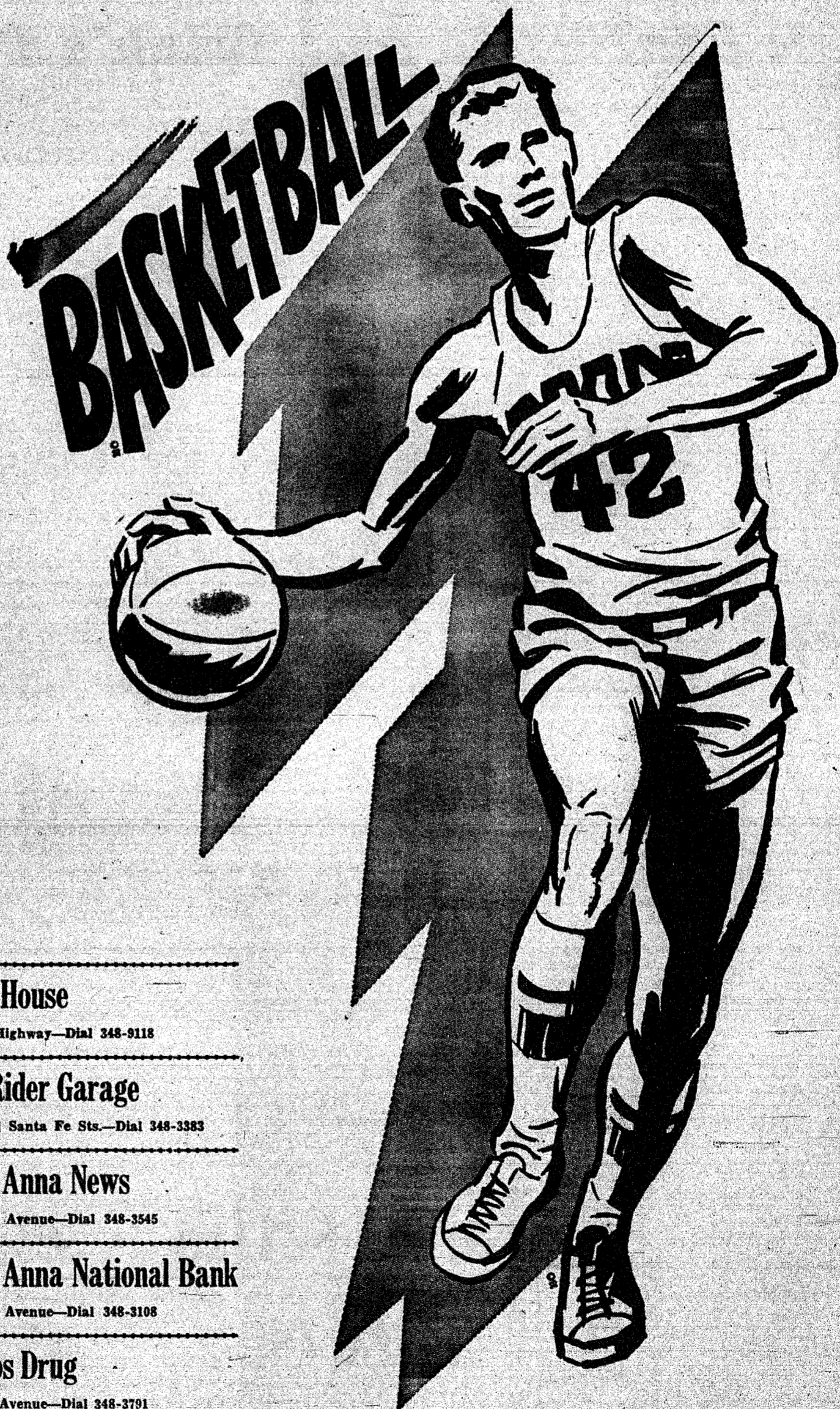

Your New Social Security

(By R. R. Tuley, Jr., Dist. Mgr.)

(Editor's Note: This is the third of 11 articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

When medicare first started on July 1, 1966, there were two ways for older people to get their doctor bills paid under the program. The first called for the doctor's agreeing to claim the 80 per cent payment direct from Medicare, by filling out a very simple one-page application form. The other required that the beneficiary first pay the bill and then apply for the medicare payment, with or without the help of the doctor.

During the first year and a half of Medicare, about half of the claims for doctor bills were put in directly by the doctors, while the

beneficiaries had to apply after paying the bill, in about half the cases. The system worked well enough—almost \$1.3 billion was paid in benefits under it—but not without some hardship to those older people who could raise the money to pay the bill only by borrowing or by depriving themselves of the necessities while waiting for the medicare payment to come in.

Now Congress has changed all this to eliminate the necessity for the beneficiary paying the bill first, in cases where the doctor decides not to make the claim himself.

As of now, all the beneficiary needs is an itemized bill—not an itemized receipted bill as in the past.

Of course, the assignment to the doctor method is still the simplest method for all concerned. It requires the use of only a single sheet of paper (the "Request for Payments" form), with no attachments or enclosures that might become separated or

lost from the claims form and delay a payment. Also it has blanks for all of the kinds of information needed to pay a claim, thus further preventing "write-backs" for missing data without which a claim cannot be paid. Under this method, the doctor will agree to accept the "reasonable charge" determined by the carrier, as his full charge and the basis of the 80 per cent payment made to him. The patient is responsible for the other 20 per cent.
