GRENOBLE, FRANCE — Skaters practice on what may be the world's fastest ice at this French Alpine town, site of the February Winter Olympics. A special mineral-free ice is being used, produced by new Culligan water conditioning equipment. Deionized water, normally used for industrial purposes, such as washing of electronic components, contains less than 2 parts per million of dissolved minerals. The potential importance of low solids ice was first noticed by the Russians whose skating times were faster just after a rain. The simple scientific explanation is that as hard water freezes its minerals separate, making ice uneven in texture and hardness and causing the skaters' blades to become dull.

Board To Order Trustee Election

The Board of Trustees of the Santa Anna Independent School District will order the annual election of school trustees when the board meets in regular session on February 6. The annual election is established by law on the first Saturday of April each year.

The terms of Richard Horner, James R. Eubank, Sr. and Joe Wise expire on the 1st day of May and the board will be reorganized at the regular meeting on the 1st Tuesday of May or earlier if necessary.

Due to change in laws by the last Legislature any person appointed to fill the unexpired term of a member who resigned is appointed to serve only until the next election. Mrs. Allyn Gill resigned from the board in June, 1967 and William R. Brown was appointed to serve in the position. This position will have only one year left after the next election; however, specifically designated candidates must run for that position separately and specifically for that position in order to maintain the routine of established term expirations. A candidate must decide specifically contest for one of the regular terms or for the unexpired term.

A candidate must file an application for a place on the ballot not less than thirty days before the day of the election; this deadline would be March 6 and these applications must be in the hands of the county judge on that date. Application forms are available at the school office at Santa Anna High School. The ballots must be printed at least 20 days prior to the election at which time absentee voting can begin and continue through the

fourth day preceding the date of the election. Each person making application for a place on the ballot must file a loyalty affidavit with his application.

Last Rites For Former Santa Annan Are Held

Funeral services were held in Houston Thursday for Mrs. Jennie Banister Seddon, 71, a native of Santa Anna and a resident of Houston since her marriage in 1928. A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John R. Banister, she began studying piano at the age of four and made music her career, receiving a B. A. from the Louisville Conservatory. Pianist and organist for many churches and organizations, she also had a small class of pupils through the years.

The only child of the Seddons died in infancy. Mrs. Seddon, at the height of the polio paralysis, organized a class in musical therapy in a children's hospital in Houston which had been set aside for crippled children. Ob-

taining donations from the Shriners and other sources, she provided whatever instrument the handicapped child was able to play, arranged for teaching, and accompanied the group on the organ. This theory was new to polio rehabilitation, and her writings on the subject provided a basis for its study.

After new vaccines had conquered polio, Mr. and Mrs. Seddon organized and conducted religious services each Sunday morning in the day room of the M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, with all patients and visitors who wished to do so attending the sermons given by various Houston ministers.

Mrs. Seddon served as president of the Houston Music Teachers Association in 1960-62, and organized during that time a concert of 500 to 600 gifted piano students, the Pianorama, presented at the Houston Music Hall, the first year using 50 pianos and later 60.

She was a charter member of the Houston Homeocalls Society, her two gardens on either side of her home having one of the great collections of Daylilies in the state. Mrs. Seddon also was president of this group and her garden, containing 180 varieties of daylilies being a part of many Garden Club tours.

Among her other activities were the Starlighters, a choir from among Eastern

Star members, who have sung in many Southern cities; the Soroptimists, among the foremost of the benevolent groups. And in 1964, Mrs. Seddon was named Ex-Student of the Year in Santa Anna. She was a Presbyterian.

She is survived by her husband, James T. Seddon, of Houston; a sister, Mrs. C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna, and two brothers, Grady W. Banister of Houston and John R. Banister of Austin. Burial was in Forest Park in Houston.

Divorce Bait

Janet and Ed knew that his mother was none too happy about their marriage. Yet they were both dismayed to learn, after her death, that she had left money to Ed strictly on condition that he get a divorce.

In sort order they challenged the validity of this clause in court. There, the executor of the estate argued:

"It was the mother's money to do with as she pleased. If Ed doesn't want to accept it on her terms, he is free to refuse it—and stay married to Janet."

However, the court ruled that Ed could collect his bequest without getting a divorce. The judge said that, as a matter of public policy, the law frowns on any device that is so clearly "hostile to the marriage relation."

It is a general rule that the law is biased in favor of matrimony. This kind of an effort to break up a marriage by using a bequest as "divorce bait," is usually held

null and void.

Nevertheless, an anti-marriage clause might be upheld if, under the particular circumstances, its impact is relatively slight. For example: A mother left money to her daughter, payable only if she got a divorce. But it seemed that the daughter was already separated from her husband, and that a divorce suit was pending.

Upholding the terms of the bequest, the court pointed out that in this situation there was not much marriage left to preserve.

What if the bait has the opposite purpose; to keep the child married rather than to get him divorced?

In one case, for instance, the will gave a son his bequest only if he remained married for a certain period. He sued to knock out this re-

quirement, complaining that it would force him to stay married no matter how much his wife might behave.

But the court held that the son would indeed have to give up his right to divorce, at least for the specified time, if he wanted to collect the bequest.

The judge felt that society has less reason to protect the institution of divorce than to protect the institution of marriage.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Are there any changes in the tax law I should be aware of when I file my 1967 income tax return?

A—The filing requirements for 1967 returns are little changed from what they were a year ago. Perhaps the major change concerns the handling of medical deductions.

All taxpayers itemizing medical deductions on 1967 returns will be subject to the

same 3 per cent and 1 per cent income limitations. Previously, taxpayers 65 years of age and over could deduct all of their allowable medical expenses, not just those in excess of 3 per cent of their adjusted gross income.

Another change in the medical deduction area concerns premiums paid for medical insurance. On 1967 returns, one-half of the premiums paid for this insurance may be deducted without regard to the 3 per cent limitation. The maximum that may be deducted under this provision is \$150. The balance of the premiums paid should be added to the taxpayer's other medical expenses subject to the 3 per cent rule.

Insurance premiums paid to you under Medicare are covered by this provision but not that portion of the Social Security tax withheld from wages for Medicare.

These changes in the medical expense area are explained on page 7 of the 1967 instructions. To avoid errors that could lead you to underpay or overpay your taxes, read the instructions before you file.

Q—Where can I get 1967 tax forms?

A—Most taxpayers should receive their income tax forms in the mail early in January. Additional copies of the forms will be available in post offices, local IRS offices and many banks.

Q—I inherited some stock from my grandfather's estate and later sold it. Do I have to report anything on my tax return?

A—Yes. You will have a

capital gain or loss measured by the difference between the sale price and the fair market value of the stock at the date of your grandfather's death. The transaction should be reported on Schedule D and attached to your Form 1040.

Q—I was married last month. Since my name has changed do I also have to change my Social Security number?

A—When your name is changed, you should notify your local office of the Social Security Administration as soon as possible. Your number will not be changed but your record will be corrected to reflect your married name.

Q—I'm a full time college student and my parents claim my exemption on their tax return. If I file for a refund of taxes withheld on a summer job, will they lose their exemption for me?

A—No, your parents will not lose you as an exemption, provided the necessary dependency tests are met.

Q—Are gifts ever taxed?

A—There is no federal tax to pay for the recipient but the giver may have to pay a tax if the gift is sizeable. The law generally requires a tax return to be filed by the donor when a gift or gifts

to any one person during the year exceeds \$3,000. However, income earned on gifts is taxable to the recipient.

Q—I sold my house just a month or so before my 65th birthday. Does this mean I won't be entitled to the special benefits for the elderly on this sale?

A—To qualify for these special benefits you must be 65 or over before the date of sale or exchange.

Q—Do you have to report as income insurance compensation for injuries received in an auto accident?

A—No, damages for injuries suffered in an accident are tax free.

Q—Who has to file a tax return?

A—A return must be filed by every person under 65 who has gross income of \$600 or more during the year. For those 65 and over, a return does not have to be filed until gross income reaches a total of \$1,200. However, if you are self-employed, you must file a return if you had net self-employment income of \$400 or more, even though your gross income was less than \$600.

The filing requirements also apply to minors. If, for example, a child has income of \$600 or more from a savings or trust account, or any other sources, then a return must be filed on behalf of that child.

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School Census Set for January

January is school census month. Beginning this week the Santa Anna schools will begin the task of enumerating all eligible schoolistics for the 1968-69 school year. As required by law every child born after September 1, 1962 must be enumerated. The census will be compiled through home rooms for children currently enrolled in school; however, the assistance of all patrons is requested to help locate all eligible children not currently enrolled or who will enroll in the first grade in September, 1968. Parents may add the beginning student to the census blank if an older brother or sister is currently enrolled.

The census law requires that children be placed on the census roll of the school district in which the residence is located. This applies to students currently transferred out of the home district to attend school in an adjoining district. In May of each year the parents may again transfer out and into other districts with the approval of the two boards of trustees and transfers are made through the office of the county superintendent. The local school will appreciate every assistance given to assure a complete census of all-eligible schoolistics for the 1968-69 school year.

Letter To Santa Anna Fire Dept.

Dear Friends:

I wish to thank the Firemen for the generous cash gift sent to India to help the unfortunate children.

Every dollar will bring 7 rupees, and I am sure this money will be spent for gain. It will go to a colony of Christian converts, that number nearly 300, who, during the two years of drought, kept alive by wild meat from the forest. Then last summer they had wonderful rains and they had fine crops growing—rice, corn, lentils, peanuts, and they had hopes of having an abundant harvest, and they would have plenty to eat, but early in September a dam broke about 30 miles away and the flood swept away their crops, grass, huts, oxen, everything. They climbed up into large trees and stayed two days. The letter telling about this disaster was full of praise because not one life was lost. In October they planted wheat and mustard and they have good crops, growing, hoping for an abundant harvest in April. In the meantime they are keeping alive by meat from the forest and are always grateful for money to buy grain, so they can have bread.

is also probing a claim that one liquor license was so quickly granted, that local law enforcement people had no chance to object.

Connally said he is confident the board itself will pursue every lead relentlessly and will call on DPS and the state attorney general to assist with the January 29th hearing.

"The board feels as I do," said the governor, "that employee guilt of questionable conduct or misfeasance or malfeasance should be punished severely and quickly."

JUNIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

Only minor objections were heard as the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, held a public hearing on its new plan for dividing the state into 52 regions. Plan would allow each region at least one junior college.

Project envisions basic post-high school education at junior colleges, with upper-division college work done at senior colleges and post-graduate work at the major universities.

Only objections to the plan were from Chambers of Commerce and similar organizations. Some did not like the way the board lined up the regions, leaving them with little hope of having their own junior college.

APPLICATION REVIEWS BEGIN

The Texas Water Quality Water Board will begin considering applications for grants and loans to plan areawide sewage treatment facilities on March 1.

Last year the Legislature allocated \$2,000,000 for planning and feasibility studies for such facilities.

The Board already has established a tentative priority system with ratings from "A" to "D". Top "A" priority areas are "almost assured of getting part of the funds available."

"A" areas are Bexar and Guadalupe Counties; Jefferson and Orange Counties; Galveston County; Brazoria, Fort Ben, Harris, Liberty and Montgomery Counties; Cameron County; and Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Johnson, Kaufman, Rockwall and Tarrant Counties.

"B" ratings went to Travis, McLennan, San Patricio and Nueces, Lubbock, Potter and Randall, Archer and Wichita Counties.

"C" areas include: Gregg and Rusk Counties; Bowie, Grayson, Jones and Taylor Counties; El Paso and Bell Counties. Counties in "D" priority are Brazos, Webb, Midland and Ector, Howard, Tom Green and Smith.

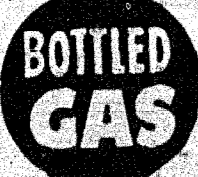

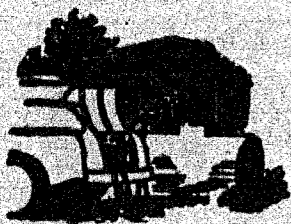

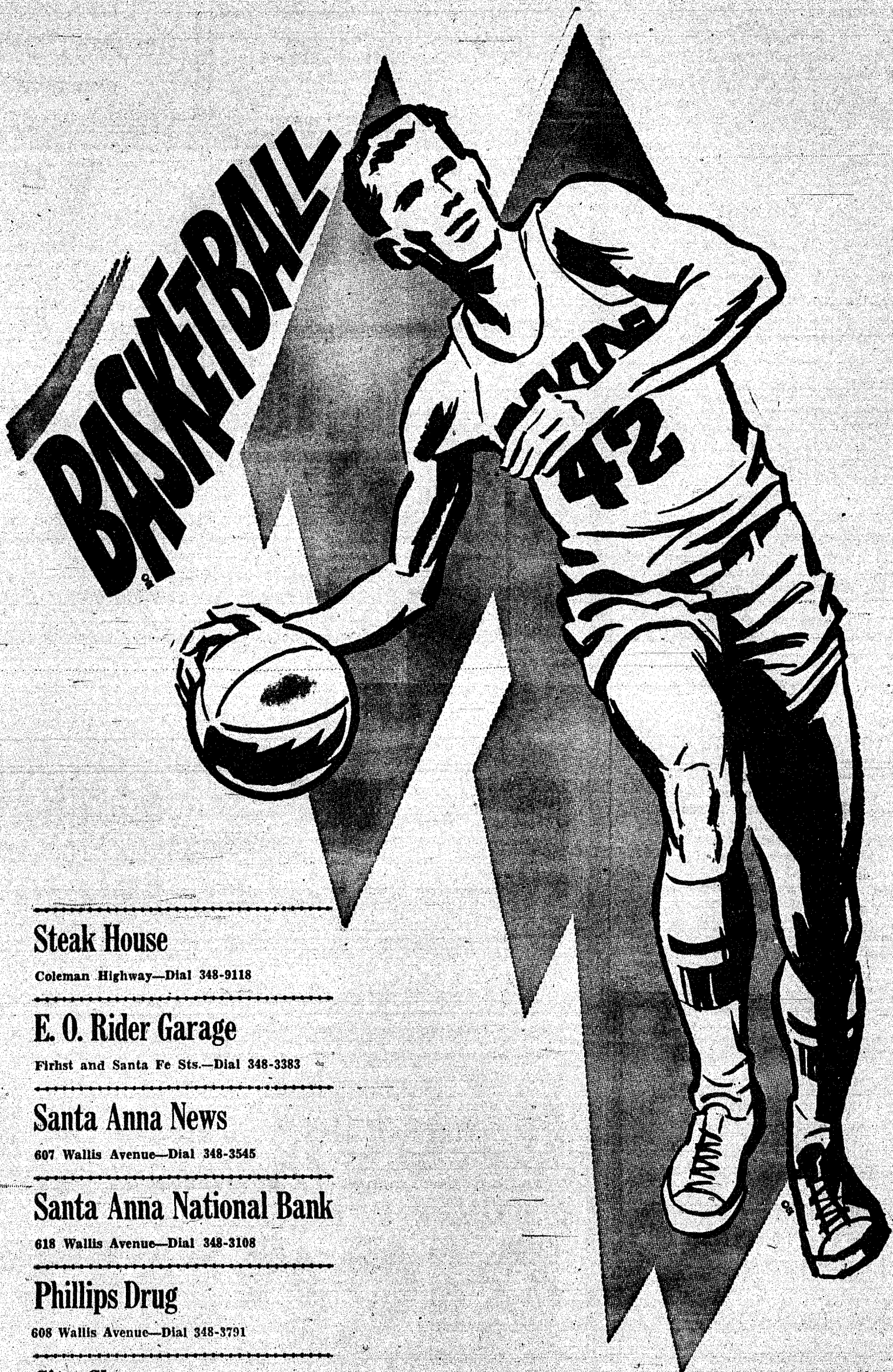

Your New Social Security By R. R. Tuley, Jr., Dist. Mgr.

(Editor's Note: This is the first of 11 articles giving the details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on January 2, 1968, will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 per cent in the social security checks of some 30,500 men, women and children in the 15-county Abilene District.

The Social Security Administration's high speed electronic computers are now figuring the increases and will include the increases in the checks delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 per cent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55.

The last increase in social security benefits amounted to 7 per cent, and was effective January 1965.

About 3 out of every 10 beneficiaries receiving an increased check early in March will be someone under 65, many of them the children of working fathers who have died.

The value of social security

survivors insurance is often overlooked. Social Security is more than just a retirement system. It is also income protection for the family in case of the breadwinner's death or disability.

With the increased benefit payments provided under the new amendments to the law, the face value of social security survivors insurance protection is increased to about \$940 billion. This is just about equivalent to the value of all the private life insurance now in force.

Under the amended law, maximum payments to families now on the social security benefit rolls will go up from currently payable maximum of \$309.20 a month to \$322.40. In the future, the maximum payable monthly to any one family can be as high as \$434.40.
