Easter Eggs

When coloring eggs, you may wish to use the white shells to get clear, bright color. Brown and speckled shells are best suited for use with decals, transfers and for decorating with crayons, pencil or paint brush.

The shells take color when the eggs are still warm or hot, according to Gwendolyn Cyatt, extension consumer marketing specialist. All dyes sold for coloring of Easter eggs must bear the words "Inspected and approved by the Food and Drug Administration." These are vegetable dyes and safe to use.

Store cooked eggs in the shell before or after Easter, in the refrigerator, except during the hunt, of course, says the specialist. They will remain tender and tasty, and they can be eaten when the fun is over, but it may be wise to discard any cracked during the play period.

Outdoors In Texas

Each year thousands of Ringtail Cats are taken by nocturnal hunters or trappers during the winter season and are sold on the fur market. Traditionally, the pelt of a ringtail brings the highest price among all furbearers on the Texas market.

Yet surprisingly, few people have seen a ringtail outside of a zoo. They might be driving down a road at night and see one of the diminutive critters scampering in front of their headlights, but more often than not, they mistake the ringtail for a common raccoon.

Although the ringtail is a distant cousin of the coon and has the same striped tail the two animals do not resemble each other in the least.

While the raccoon is very chunky and heavy-set, the ringtail is a slim animal. One will weigh about two pounds and its tail, with 14 to 16 alternating black and white rings, will be almost as long as its body. The ringtail

also is frequently identified by its large, bright eyes and oversize ears.

Although a few scattered ones are found in the Piney Woods of East Texas the ringtail is most common in west and central Texas. They are more abundant in the Edwards Plateau region.

Ringtails prefer to den in a rugged habitat of craggy ledges and cliffs since their survival prerequisite is a readily accessible water supply, the modern trend towards ponds and tanks on ranches and farms has accentuated the amazing propagation of the ringtails.

Actually, the name ringtail cat is a misnomer. The ringtail is not a cat, instead being a carnivore. It got its name because of its cat-like size and its predominant ringed tail.

Ringtails are almost entirely nocturnal. They spend the greater part of the days in dens, venturing forth only after nightfall. It is rare to find one out and about when the sun is shining.

Most young ringtails, tiny fuzzy creatures, enter the world in May with two to four in each litter. The young remain with their mother for about four or five months and upon weaning are nearly full grown.

The ringtail's diet runs the gamut from flesh of squirrels, field mice and rats to various plants like hackberry, persimmon and mistletoe, and all types of insects.

Though temperamental, a ringtail can become a pleasing house pet. This despite its menacing habit of continually climbing anything suited to its purpose. Window drapes are particularly inviting. The ringtail has a tendency to be wary of strangers, but quickly will associate with persons it recognizes.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Bequeathing Your Body
Since time immemorial, men have been making bequests of their money or other worldly possessions. But suddenly, just within the past few years, a new kind of bequest has come into being.

Today a person can bequeath not only his wealth but also various parts of his own body. This has become possible because of a series of scientific breakthroughs. Doctors are now able to transplant, from the dead to the living, everything from eyes to kidneys, from skin to bones.

One result of this development has been to focus attention on the unusual legal problems that are involved.

Offhand it might seem that it should be just as easy, legally, to donate one's body after death as to donate one's blood during life.

But there is a stumbling block. In matters of burial, the law has traditionally given consideration not only to the wishes of the deceased but also to the wishes of his surviving family. And even though the deceased may have wanted the deceased all or part of his body, the widow or other relatives might well feel differently about it.

In many states, relatives do have a legal right to say no. The doctor who defies them, removing organs or tissue without their consent,

may be exposing himself to a damage suit—and perhaps criminal liability too, tampering with a dead body.

Even if the rights of relatives are in doubt, the mere delay caused by a dispute may make the whole question academic. For the transplantation of most bodily parts must be done swiftly, within minutes of death, to be successful.

To clear away these difficulties, a special committee has gone to work under the auspices of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws. It is

drawing up a model statute to be recommended for adoption by the various state legislatures.

The committee is seeking to insure, to every person willing to be a donor, that his wishes will be carried out. It is seeking to devise a modern mechanism for a new kind of gift—and to transplant it into the body of the law.

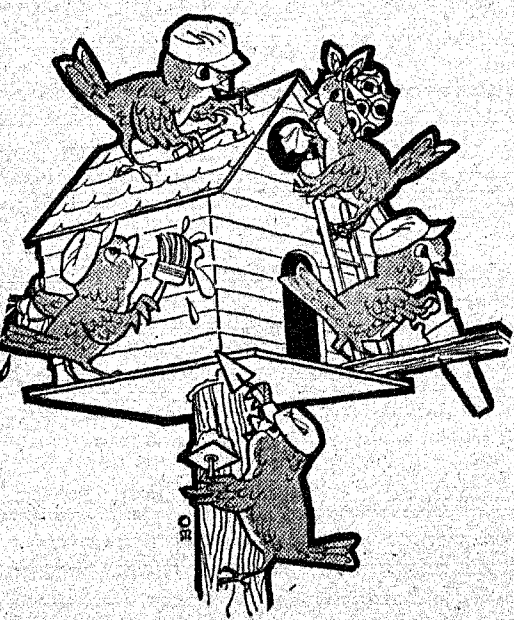

Food Budgeting For Easter

Food plays an important part in the observance of shopping, preparing and Easter. Higher food costs generally make planning, shopping, preparing and serving a festive meal a real challenge.

Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist suggests selecting foods that will make Easter meals real holiday features and still not break the bank that holds your food money.

The best way to do this, she says, is to use foods that are plentiful and low in price. Buy them wisely and prepare them in the most effective way.

Supplies of some vegetables are increasing these days with prices declining from winter levels, says the Texas A & M specialist.

In checking on protein values, remember that price per pound is only part of the answer. Cost per serving is the real guide. This is figured by dividing the price per pound by the number servings, says Mrs. Clyatt.

Usually boneless meat gives four servings a pound; meat with a small quantity of bone gives three servings; and bony cuts, such as spare ribs and short ribs, will probably serve one or possibly two.

In the beef department rib roasts and steaks, round steaks and ground beef are among the best values. As you shop the pork counter, consider shoulder roasts and steaks, loin-end roasts, canned hams and picnics.

The apples on the market are now coming from controlled atmosphere storage and prices are up a bit. These apples, generally, are excellent quality, and they need refrigeration to maintain this quality. Oranges, grapefruit, bananas, pineapples and avocados are among the reasonable fruit choices. Strawberries are more plentiful and prices are a little lower, Mrs. Clyatt says.

An increase in supplies of carrots has resulted in about normal prices after last winter's relatively high cost. Green cabbage has more attractive price tags. Potatoes, celery, head lettuce, turnips, green onions, radishes and dry onions are the more economical fresh vegetable offerings.

ALERT FOR SCREWORMS

With warmer weather, conditions are more favorable for an increase in screwworm fly activities. Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program remind stockmen they should continue to be alert for the pest. They point out that most of the sterile flies now being produced at Mission are being distributed in Mexico to halt buildups in that country.

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Your New Social Security

(By R. R. Tuley, Jr.,
Dist. Mgr.)

(Editor's note: This is the last of 11 articles giving the pertinent details of the new provisions in Social Security.)

Income received from the ministry will automatically be covered by social security under the new social security amendments.

Until the 1967 change in the law, a member of the clergy could be covered under social security under an individual, voluntary agreement; if he wished social security protection he signed a form stating that he wished his income from the ministry to be covered. He then paid a portion of his salary as his social security contribution on the basis of that of a self-employed person.

As of January 1, 1968, however the ministry is covered automatically on the same basis as that for other wage earners and self-employed persons, unless the clergyman has objections based on conscience or religious principle.

As under the old law, a clergyman covered by this provision reports his income and makes his tax contributions as if he were self-employed, even though he may be working as an employee. He will pay his first social security taxes on income from 1968.

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Plan Tasty Nutritious Lunches



When the children arrive home for lunch, be sure that the meal you've planned is not only tasty but also nutritious. A well-balanced menu, centered around the four food groups, is important for proper growth and development.

The wise homemaker serves cream soups often for she knows that they make a valuable contribution to daily nutrient requirements. All the protein, vitamins and minerals provided by milk as a beverage are also provided by milk used as an ingredient in recipes. Recipes for cream soups, custards, puddings, and cream sauces for vegetables use liberal amounts of milk and should be served frequently.

This lunch menu includes creamy onion soup, vegetable and cottage cheese salad, crackers or bread sticks, an apple for dessert, and milk as a beverage.

Creamy Onion Soup

4 cups thinly sliced onion
1/4 cup butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 quart milk
Sauté onion in butter until tender and golden. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Add milk and cook, stirring constantly, until sauce is thickened. Add a small amount of hot mixture to egg yolks, beating constantly. Return yolk mixture to hot mixture and add Worcestershire sauce. Heat thoroughly. Serve in hot soup bowls. Sprinkle with Parmesan or Cheddar cheese. Make: 6-1/2 cups soup, enough for 6 to 8 servings.

Austin, Texas — President Lyndon B. Johnson's decision to step aside is turning the May 4 Democratic precinct conventions from the previous label or "dull" to a new one of "hotly contested."

Gov. John Connally, who had been slated to be the Texas delegation chairman in support of President Johnson, with little objection from anyone, now has a fight on his hands.

Connally's forces launched a favorite son candidacy for Connally at a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Senator Ralph Yarborough objected, and appeared close to a decision to challenge Connally in the county conventions.

At first, the Connally candidacy seemed to be leaning toward Vice President Hubert Humphrey, but Connally wiped that out by saying he would not be a stand-in for anyone.

By contrast, Republican conventions on May 4 seem more peacefully inclined. The state Republican organization is united behind Senator John Tower's favorite son candidacy. However, a challenge may be posed by a group trying to win delegates for Gov. Ronald Reagan of California.

County conventions on May 11 and state conventions on June 11 will follow, but the grass-roots decisions will be made in the more than 5,000 precincts in Texas on May 4. "ONE-MAN, ONE VOTE"

EXTENDED LOCALLY
The U. S. Supreme Court predictably has extended the one-man-one-vote theory to local governments.

Like legislative bodies, the Court said, wherever city, county or other governmental units elect representatives from single-member districts, the districts must be substantially equal.

The ruling was on a case brought by Midland Mayor Hank Avery to force Midland County Commissioners Court to reapportion. Dissenting opinion warned of "avalanche of reapportionment cas-

es."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has predicted the ruling will not disturb local elections already in progress this year, and indicated he feels the problems of unequal representation will be worked out by Texas subdivisions without multiple court suits.

Prior studies have demonstrated, however, that the vast bulk of county commissioners' precincts would be affected by the new ruling. To assume that all will voluntarily correct deficiencies pointed up by the high court appears to be expecting too much of local officials, many of whom will have jobs at stake.

COURTS SPEAK
The Texas Supreme Court reversed an Alice case in which a woman claimed doctors and a hospital were liable for assault and battery damages for operating on her without adequate consent.

In other recent actions, the state's highest court:

- Held that the legislature had authority to remove requirement of an election before major counties can make special, higher-level tax assessments on property in hospital districts to support medical school teaching hospitals.

- Shook up lower court rulings in a case involving royalties on an oil and gas lease covering 1,500 acres in Zapata County.

- Refused to review the case in which a man received \$1,000 damage award after a Beilville surgeon left a sponge inside him after an operation.

- Agreed with an intermediate court that Coca Cola company was not responsible for a woman's cutting her finger on a chipped coke bottle.

NEW TAX BILL FORECAST

The Texas Research League, which has made detailed studies of state government problems, has come up with a new estimate that the 1968 tax bill must be in the \$123-\$130,000,000 range.

TRL noted that the comptroller's estimate of revenue available for the next fiscal year has increased \$93,000,000 since last April.

Sources indicate the league's estimate is close to that of Governor Connally's own budget recommendation, aides indicate.

TORNADO SEASON NEARS

The Texas Department of Public Safety warns that the April 15 deadline for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker for your car is Monday.

The Texas Highway Commission has approved a new 10.6 mile, \$6,300,000 link of Interstate Highway 10 which extends from 1.4 miles west of Boracho Station to 6 mile west of Kent and a 9.1 mile controlled access highway serving Dallas - Fort Worth regional airport area.

Mrs. John Connally has inaugurated the East Texas Forest Trail—a 780-mile loop passing through four national forests and past the state's only Indian reservation—as the second of ten Travel Trails named by Governor Connally in an effort to promote tourism in Texas.

Texas business activity increased substantially during February, paced by an increase over January of six per cent in retail sales, reports the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

The State Board of Insurance has approved an amendment to the general liability insurance policies of all city and other local governments

With the tornado season approaching, department of Public Safety has prepared a circular of tornado safety rules. In general, DPS advises; seek safety in a strongly reinforced building; preferably in a basement; stay away from windows; if out doors when the twister hits, lie flat in the nearest depression, ditch or ravine.

Last year Texas led the nation with all time record of 232 reported twisters.

SPECIAL ELECTIONS CALLED

Governor Connally has set special legislative elections for May 14 in Harris County, Dallas County and Brooks, Cameron, Kenedy and Willacy counties.

Houston voters will pick a successor to Rep. Glenn Vickery who resigned. Brooks, Cameron, Kenedy and Willacy county voters will replace Rep. Bill Rapp of Raymondville who resigned to accept an appointment as Willacy County judge. Dallas voters must choose a successor to the late Rep. John Field.

LAW ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM PLANNED

Texas Research League has agreed to conduct and finance a study for a law enforcement and criminal justice program designed for 10-county Dallas-Fort Worth region of North East Texas.

North Texas Council of Governments is among 12 regional agencies in the nation which received a request from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and Department of Justice to undertake a pilot program designed for comprehensive law enforcement planning.

One of first studies in the U. S., it is expected to serve as a model for other areas. Design will show what a law enforcement plan should include, how it should be prepared and what it will cost.

SHORT SNORTS

Coral snake anti-venom is now available at the State Health Department lab here and labs in Houston, San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

State Comptroller reports that cigarette tax revenues for March were \$710,879 below 1967 level.

Attorney General Martin has held that the Texas State Board for Registration for Professional Engineers may pay travel expenses and office equipment bills of its investigator.

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Low Postal Rates Outlined For Servicemen In Illustrated Pamphlet

An illustrated pamphlet—Mail for Servicemen—outlining the expanded program for airmailing letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through the Santa Anna Post Office, Postmaster John C. Gregg, announced today.

Gregg said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airmailing more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them."

The eight page pamphlet illustrates three services for airmailing parcels at rates the average family can afford. The speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personal messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Vietnam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address

military mail.
A family sending a 10-lb. package from Santa Anna to Vietnam, for example, pays only \$2.90 on a package marked "POL", while the air parcel rate for the same package is \$7.23, Postmaster Gregg said.

On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail Service, which provides surface transportation to the port of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to a European military post from Santa Anna costs only \$1.30. On packages weighing under 2 lbs. air parcel is often the patron's best buy for through airlift service, the pamphlet suggests.

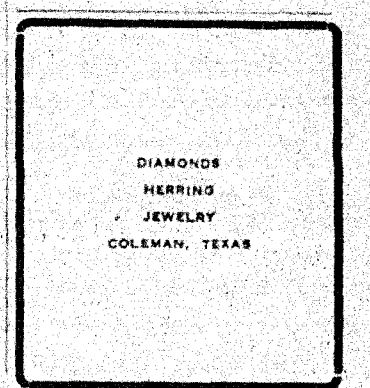

FHA Helps Support Farm Families In Co.

A total of \$765,330 in loan funds has been used in Callahan, Coleman and Runnels Counties to support family farms since the Farmers Home Administration was expanded six years ago, John H. Curry local supervisor for the rural credit agency said. Approximately \$166,120.00 was advanced in 1967.

Currently 106 farmers in the three county unit are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration.

The supply of Farmers Home Administration Credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures re-

commended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income.

"These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and go to the city. They have helped young farmers get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after droughts, hail storms and other natural disasters that brought about the need for emergency loans in the unit Mr. Curry noted. FHA loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms.

The incomes of farmers using Farmers Home Administration credit in Callahan, Coleman and Runnels counties in 1967 totaled approximately \$795,000.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to

obtain adequate credit from other sources. The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.

The headquarters unit office is located in Room 601, Coleman County State Bank Building, Coleman, Texas.


