DRAFT CALL UP

State draft boards must furnish 2,378 men in April and, for the first time in two go into the U.S. Marine

The figure compares with the quota of 1,947 for the Army in March and is the largest monthly call for draft boards since October, 1966. when Texas' share was 2,845.

Local boards will send 8,500 men to the armed forces examining and entrance stations in April for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in preparation to fill future quotas. March total was 7,200.

April induction and preinduction quotas were mailed to local boards by state Selective Service headquarters in mid-March. National quota for April is 48,000, of which the Army will get 44,-000 and the Marines 4,000. Draftees are in 19-25 age bracket.
