Coleman's 31 Annual Rodeo Is Underway

Coleman's 31st annual Rodeo is now underway and will continue through July 13th. Activities of the rodeo will get underway each afternoon at 5:30 p.m. with a downtown parade. The parade will be 2 miles long with the Sheriff's posse appearing in it and the Grand Entry Thursday. Friday will be Float Day at the parade plus honoring all past presidents and queens. The rodeo will begin each evening at 8:30 p.m. with Texas' most colorful Grand Entry each night. Tickets for the event will be \$1.50 for adults and 50c for children. The show will feature the five main events of a rodeo plus many more added attractions for your viewing pleasure. The rodeo is sponsored by the Coleman

Rodeo Association and will be produced by Butler and sons of Elk City, Oklahoma.

There will be plenty of fun and excitement for the whole family throughout the rodeo. Everyone is invited to attend the rodeo and see the parade each day.

The Coleman rodeo is well known as one of the top attractions in the nation. It is approved by the Rodeo Cowboys Association, the IRA and the GRA.

A rodeo dance will also be held each night immediately after the Rodeo at the National Guard Armory near the rodeo grounds. Hadley Barrett and his 6 piece Western Band, all the way from Los Platte, Nebraska, will furnish the music.

Members who received electric service from the Coleman County Electric Cooperative in 1958 will be receiving more than \$169,672.00 in patronage refunds sometime during the month of July.

The amount each member will receive represents about 29 per cent of each dollar spent for electricity by that member during 1958.

Patronage refunds that are returned to the Cooperative members simply represents any money taken in over the actual cost of delivering electric power to the members for that given year.

This is the ninth consecutive year for Coleman County Electric Cooperative members to receive refund checks. We are proud that members are receiving dependable electric service at prices below previous years.

During the month of May E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares sales in Texas totaled \$15,517,872 - - 10.5 per cent higher than a year ago. January-May sales totaled \$78,225,927 for an increase of 11 per cent over the same month during 1967.

Editorial

The following address was delivered at the Oak Cliff Lions Club at a regular noon meeting on Wednesday, June 12, 1968 by the outgoing president, David R. Braden. The Oak Cliff Lions Club, with its 435 members, is the second largest Lions Club in the United States.

Last week as we met to have our Installation Party—a man assumed a station in a kitchen corridor in L. A.—Later that evening he shot and killed a United States candidate for the Presidency of this nation.

The next day, as I contemplated this tragic and horrible event, it occurred to me that while spending a pleasant and amusing evening, I had done little then (or in this year for that matter) that you could wrap some serious thought around—I have left that to the guest speakers at this rostrum.

Blackie Sherrod, of the Dallas Times Herald, pointed out in his column of Monday evening that it is time for all those who have a podium to use it; be it a service club, or a sign on the back of a city bus. For two more weeks—this is my soap box, and today I shall use it in a serious vein!

Lest I be remembered only as a clown, I would like to remind you today of the motto of Lions International: "Liberty - Intelligence - Our Nations Safety." It is in that regard that I make this statement. I make it that someone might speak for the Common Man of this nation...

Who leads a common life, Earns a common salary, Has a common ambition, A common dream, And pays common taxes.

I speak to you as the forum of common men everywhere—and as a representative.

All America has been told this past week—over and over again—that we are a sick society.

Gentlemen, I propose to you that I am sick—maybe you are sick too.

I am sick to death of being told I am sick: by government officials who will not enforce the law...

By politicians who dance to the tune of minority groups. By those in the pulpit and on the college lecture platform who use their office to project the socialistic creed of radicals...

I am sick of being told I am sick: by idealistic aggressive news reporters and evaluators (of whatever media), who have the audacity to tell me I should believe whatever they believe—knowing I have no vehicle to publically voice my disagreement.

I am sick of being told I

am Sick: by floppish entertainers draped in Nehru jackets, feminine necklaces, and a cloak of pseudo intellectualism.

I am sick of cynical attitudes toward patriotism and our American institutions...

I am sick of sacrificing the cream of American manhood in political wars we are not fighting to win...

I am sick of the decline in integrity and personal honor in this nation...

I am sick of the permissive attitude, laxity, and tolerance to pressure groups and the criminal element that is bringing this nation to its knees in lawlessness...

I am sick of seeing law enforcement agencies and the laws of this nation emasculated by a supreme court and administrators who make their personal creeds the law of the land...

I am sick of dirty, unwashed, foul mouthed—whether you call them hippies, beatniks, or pseudo poor people...

I am sick of not being able to take my family to a movie because it is loaded with extraneous offensive matter whose only purpose is to shock...

I am sick of seeing the same phrases in the popular literature of the day that I see scrawled on the walls of the public toilets...

I am sick of so called educators and leaders too weak kneed themselves to understand the value of discipline in the character of man...

I am sick of a congress which legislates out of emotionalism rather than reason, thereby taking away the rights of all...

I am sick of being told I am sick with violence because of assassinations by mentally deranged men, fed on a steady diet of violence and perversion by the nations periodicals, press, television and movies—all condoned—even aided—by courts which permit license in the name of freedom...

I am sick of riots, of marches, and those who force themselves and their ideologies down by throat without qualification...

I am sick of those who say I owe them everything, because of the sins of my forefathers, when I have looked down both ends of a machine gun barrel to defend them and their right to be here...

Take note gentlemen in high places—you will not see me in the streets with a placard or a gun—you will hear the thunder of the common man at the polling place—casting a vote for...

Break for Veterans?

Three men apply for a single government job. One is a war veteran, the other two are not. Should the first man get the job just because he is a veteran?

To some degree, veterans have been getting this kind of break ever since Civil War days. The motive, of course, is to give them an extra reward for their service to the nation.

Still, they get this reward at the expense of non-veter-

ans who might legitimately complain of discrimination. For the non-veterans are, in effect, penalized for no way their fault.

To reconcile these conflicting considerations, the courts have worked out some practical guidelines.

In the first place, if a civil service law shows flagrant favoritism for veterans, it will probably be held unconstitutional. Thus, a court voided a law that allowed a veteran to get on police force without taking any examinations. Pointing out that a veteran so hired might be totally unfit for the job, the court said:

"Public offices are created for the common good, and not the profit, honor, or private interest of any one man or class of men."

On the other hand, a court upheld a law that gave a more modest advantage to veterans seeking to be firemen. Here a veteran was given the edge only if he had shown, by competitive examinations, that he was just as qualified as other applicants. The court said it was fair to assume that his experience

in the service might well make him a better fireman.

Likewise, the law may — and often does — given reasonable advantages to veterans in the matter of firing. For instance, the federal civil service law gives them extra procedural safeguards in case of discharge.

In one case a veteran employed at a federal shipyard was fired on charges that he had gotten fresh with certain young women at a party.

But he won reinstatement when the management failed to come up with sufficient details of his alleged misconduct. The court said he had not been given the consideration to which, as a veteran, he was entitled.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

There are still a few people around who feel a real sense of pride in the achievements of our country. Certainly we have a lot more accomplishments to be proud of than all of our critics put together have. County's Social Security Benefits Reach New High

The 13 per cent increase in Social Security monthly benefits that was effective for February 1968 brought the total for the fifteen county Abilene district to a record high of \$2,970,094 paid to the 40,524 beneficiaries for that month, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager.

Coleman county accounted for 2543 persons and \$177,629. Of that total, 1440 were retirees, paid \$113,911; their 434 wives and dependent husbands, \$17,566; 151 disabled persons and their dependents, \$11,215; 179 children of retired or deceased parents, \$9,929. and 339 widows, dependent widowers, dependent parents and younger widows with entitled children in their care, \$25,008.

The slightly more than 24 million beneficiaries in the nation topped the \$2 billion mark in monthly benefits for the first time.

"Although about 2-3 of those receiving social security checks are past age 62," Tuley stated, "most of the changes made by the 1967 amendments were of greater value to the younger people."

He cited the reduction in credits needed for disability benefits for those disabled before age 31 (as low as 1 1/2 years of social security coverage if disabled before age 24), and the change that benefits children of deceased, disabled, or retired mothers by no longer requiring 1 1/2 years of coverage during the three years just before death, disability, or retirement.

Representatives of the Abilene district office visit county regularly, on the schedule posted in all post offices hereabouts. Tuley suggests that anyone who believes the 1967 amendments might have made him eligible for benefits should see the social security representative on his next visit.

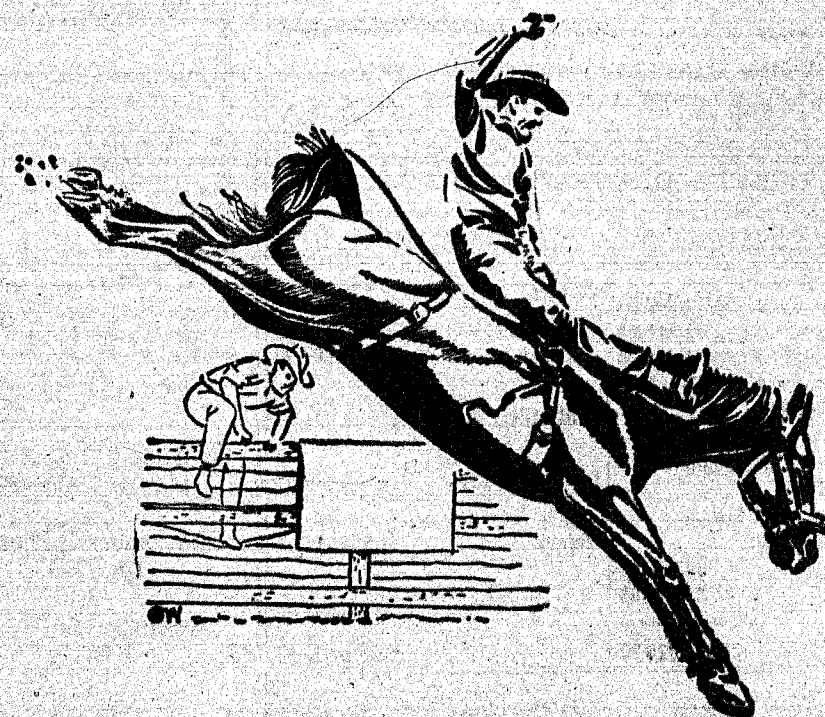



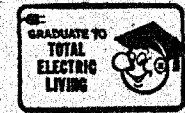
