Turner House Recorded Texas Historic Landmark

The historic Fred W. Turner House in Santa Anna, Coleman County, has been named a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, significant to the history of this community and state, and worthy of preservation, today announced Charles Woodburn of Amarillo, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

As a result of meeting the TSHSC requirements for this high official designation, the Texas Historical Building Medallion with interpretive plate giving a capsule history of the structure will be affixed to the structure.

Dedication of the marker will be announced by Mrs. Maurine Burroughs of Novice, chairman of the Coleman County Historical Survey Committee.

A certificate signed by Governor John Connally, Charles Woodburn, and Mrs. Burroughs will be presented at the dedication.

The inscription on the marker reads:

THE TURNER HOUSE
Built 1886 by an Attorney from Mississippi.
Colonial Architecture.
House was Enlarged from 8 to 12 rooms after 1903 purchase by Fred W. Turner, Rancher and Oilman.
This was Gathering Place for Area Social and Business Leaders.

Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, 1968.
The aluminum markers with Swedish steel effect are handsome and require practically no maintenance. More than 3,300 Official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since 1964 when the Texas State Historical Survey Committee initiated its 5-year RAMPS Program. This program is designed to record.

Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey the history of Texas.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the "Guide to Official Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tours, and to acquaint the people of Coleman County with their own unique historical past.

Brother of Local Women Dies Wednesday

Joseph Hugh Wilburn, 86, died Wednesday, July 24, at a hospital in Seagraves, following a long illness.

Services were held Friday in the First Baptist Church in Seagraves with his pastor, the Rev. Gordon Smith, officiating. Burial was in the Seagraves Cemetery.

Mr. Wilburn was born on March 20, 1882, in Caldwell County, Ky., and moved to Brownwood with his parents in 1890. He was a photographer and owned a studio in Ballinger, then worked in Dallas before moving to Seagraves for health reasons, some 20 years ago.

Survivors are his wife of Seagraves; one daughter, Mrs. Christine Henry of Irving; one son, Stephen Wilburn of Denver City; two nephews, A. G. John C. Gregg Confirmed As Postmaster

John C. Gregg received a telegram from Senator Ralph W. Yarborough on Tuesday morning, stating that he had been confirmed by the U. S. Senate as the postmaster at Santa Anna, Texas. The confirmation by the Senate was accomplished as of July 19, 1968.

Gregg has been serving the local post office as acting postmaster since April 10, 1964, when he was appointed by Cong. O. C. Fisher, following the death of postmaster, Lee Strother.

An open competitive examination was held for postmaster appointment and Mr. Gregg made the highest grade of the nine who took the examination, a grade of 97.5. At that time he was recommended for appointment by Cong. Fisher. After Coleman County was transferred from the 21st Congressional District to the 17th District, Cong. Omar Burleson recommended that Gregg be appointed. With the approval of President Lyndon B. Johnson, the appointment was completed on Friday, July 19, 1968.

Gregg has lived in Santa Anna since June, 1920, when the family moved here from Rising Star, where he was born. His father owned and operated the Rising Star newspaper before purchasing the Santa Anna News.

After serving 4½ years in military service during World War II, Gregg became editor and manager of the Santa Anna News in Feb., 1946 and continued in this capacity until his appointment as acting postmaster. During the war he served in the Air Force with three years being spent in the Southwest Pacific. He was a radio operator on a C-47 type aircraft and most of his time was spent dropping supplies to front line troops throughout the Pacific. During the course of the three years he was decorated Three different times with the Distinguished Flying Cross, along with a number of other decorations.

Mr. and Mrs. Gregg have three children. The oldest daughter, Mrs. Darlene Pirello is a Registered Nurse in a hospital in Pittsburgh, Penn. Their other daughter, Mrs. Jaunell Stiles, a Medical Technician, lives in Burleson, Texas where she is expecting the Gregg's second grandchild within a week or so. Their only son, John Wayford, is serving with the military forces in Germany, where he has been for the past 18 months and is expected to be for another year.

Gregg has served as President of the Santa Anna Lions Club and on the Board of Directors several times. He has a 22 year perfect attendance record with the Lions Club. He has served as vice-president of the Community Chamber of Commerce and in various other civic capacities.

At the present time Mr. Gregg is on the Board of Directors of the Lions Club, President of the Community Improvement Club and Vice-Chairman of the Coleman County Postmasters Association.

Change In Saturday Mail Service

Postmaster John C. Gregg, announces instruction have been received here that limitations will be placed on Saturday mail service. This is due to limitations imposed on personnel by Congress in Public Law 90-364. Effective on Saturday, July 27 and continuing until further notice, Saturday mail service will be as follows at the Santa Anna Post Office:

All Saturday window service will be discontinued except that a General Delivery or call window will be open for a one-hour period from 8:30 to 9:30 a. m. Purpose of the general delivery window will be deliver mail regularly addressed to general delivery patrons, hand out mail to firms whose mail is normally delivered at a call window, and to deliver "left notice" and "hold" mail which is normally and readily available to the window clerk and which requires no financial transactions.

No money transactions of any kind will be made. This means no postage stamps will be sold and no parcel post will be accepted. All mail will be put in local boxes in the same manner in which it has in the past. The rural and star routes will continue to operate the same as they have in the past. Mail will be dispatched to Rockwood, Whon and Trickham in the same manner as usual and these offices will observe the same hours they have for the past several years.

All postal patrons who plan to mail anything on Saturday are urged to make advanced preparation by getting your postage stamps before Saturday.

TAX BILL LAW

Now there's no way out of paying those new taxes approved by the Legislature in special session. Gov. John Connally has signed into law the bill which is designed to raise \$160.2 million for 1969 state operations. It's effective October 1, and here's what it does:

* Raises the general sales and auto tax rates from two to three per cent statewide. In cities which levy 1 per cent local option sales taxes the rate will be four per cent. (No change was made in exemptions.)

* Increases the corporation franchise tax rate (collectible May 1) from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of taxable capital, surplus and undivided profits. Portion of the franchise tax on corporate debt will be reduced from \$2.25 to \$2.00 in 1969 and phased out by 1973.

TOURIST RECORD IN MAKING

Tourist travel is expected to far surpass all previous records, according to State Highway Department's travel and information division soundings.

One highway department travel bureau on Interstate

Highway 10 near Orange reported "customers" for first half of 1968 more than doubled total for January-June of 1967. Ninety per cent of the visitors were on their way to the HemisFair in San Antonio.

All eight established bureaus run by the Highway Department reported big increases. Total services went up 14.2 per cent for the first half of this year compared with the same period in 1967. Travel and information division said its mail inquiries are up 27 per cent.

Last year Texas was visited by 20.6 million persons who spent \$1.2 billion. This was an eight per cent increase in visitors over 1966, and an 11 per cent jump in spending.

COURTS SPEAK

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has urged the U. S. Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Texas tidelands boundaries must be measured from 10.3 miles of shoreline as it existed in 1845 without regard to recessions.

The State Supreme Court reversed an \$862,000 verdict favoring foreign car dealers. They had sued the city of Houston for flood damage to autos, claiming inadequate drainage.

The high court set October 16 for review of the lower court orders directing a charter be granted to Mission Savings and Loan Association, San Antonio.

The court said National Surety Corporation has a valid judgment of \$18,237 against the Friendswood Independent School District, Galveston County, but cannot collect.

It ordered a new trial in a Hansford County landowner's suit against a professional wheatcutter whose truck started a fire in his field.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held that the State Board of Education could order a hearing on the appeal of a Lumberton school superintendent who was fired by a local board.

Third Court directed a new trial in a case involving disannexation of 550 acres of land from Temple.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

City cannot force on a landowner higher air control standards than those set by State Air Control Board, Attorney General Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

A Texan is qualified to vote in a local liquor election if he resides in the state a year, the county six months before election and is a resident of the city where the election is held.

The Dallas County Hospital District has no authority to build and operate a crime laboratory.

State Insurance Commissioner has authority to release a surety bond on an insurance company that is in receivership when all claims are satisfied and when the one-year statutory time limit is satisfied.

The Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners cannot vary fees set by State law.

Plaintiff could not recover for faulty workmanship, labor and materials and/or negligence under a surety bond required by the Water Well Drillers Act.

Dr. Bevington A. Reed, 52, was named to succeed Dr. Jack K. Williams as Texas Commissioner of Higher Education effective September 1. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named three senators to a new committee to study state park needs: Joe Christi of El Paso, Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Roy Harrington of Port Arthur, Charles Herring of Austin, Don Kennard of Fort Worth, Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi and Mur-

ray Watson, Jr., of Waco. State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell, Jr., designated Jim Campbell of Pampa as acting deputy state GOP chairman for the Panhandle and Northern Texas Region V, temporarily replacing B. V. Beard, Amarillo. O'Donnell appointed Mrs. Pierce P. Langford, Jr., of Wichita Falls Region V as deputy state vice-chairman.

OPERATION YOUTHLIFT

August has been declared by Governor Connally as Youth Month at HemisFair.

Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, heads a statewide committee to organize special youth excursions to the Fair. He is meeting with youth leaders in key cities of Texas to plan the August trips. Special, low-cost, package-plan excursions, including overnight accommodations in San Antonio, have been developed by HemisFair to tie in which the program.

Any youth group in Texas desiring to participate in "Operation Youthlift" should contact HemisFair Headquarters or the Speaker's office at the state capitol.

SHORT SNOOKS

New \$7 million bond issue has been sold to aid Texas college students needing tuition loans.

Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax

matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I just air-conditioned my house on my doctor's recommendation. Can I deduct

this as a medical expense for next year?

A—A part of the cost of the air-conditioning may be considered a medical expense if your doctor recommended it for the treatment of a specific condition or illness. You should obtain a statement from your doctor to this effect and keep it with your tax records.

If the air-conditioning has been recommended by your doctor, then you should calculate what its installation has added to the value of your home. The cost of the air-conditioning in excess of this increase may be added to your other medical expense.

Q—I was interviewed by a company that offered me a job. Must I include as income the money they gave me as reimbursement for my travel expenses to and from the interview?

A—No, generally, this does not have to be declared as income unless the money received exceeded your actual expenses in making the trip. In that case, the excess should be reported as income when you file your 1968 return.

Q—We gave away a lot of furniture, books and clothing when we moved this spring. Is there any deduction we can take on those items?

A—If you gave such items to a charitable organization, then you are allowed to deduct their fair market value at the time of the gift. Obtain a statement from the organization describing the items so that you will have a record of the donation for tax purposes.

Q—I just bought a truck for my dry cleaning business. Do I have to pay for highway use tax?

A—Whether a truck is taxable depends on its type and weight. Details are contained in Publication No. 349, "Federal Use Tax on Trucks, Truck - Tractors and Buses." Send a post card to your district office for a free copy.

Q—My daughter has a partial scholarship for college. Will she have to count this as income for tax purposes and will it affect our dependency exemption for her?

A—Income for scholarships is generally not taxable, and does not have to be included by parents in determining a student's total support. So unless your daughter's scholarship has some special feature it should not affect the tax situation of either of you.

Q—I had to pay a penalty

on my mortgage when I sold my house because it was paid off early. Is there any deduction for that?

A—The penalty for paying off a mortgage before the due date is considered an interest charge and should be included with your other interest payments. It is not a selling cost on your old house.

Q—I just paid the balance of my 1967 taxes and now you have sent me another bill for the same amount. What should I do?

A—Return the bill to the service center and indicate when and where you made the payment. This will stop the issuance of any further bills on your account while an effort is made to locate your payment. Within 30 days you should be notified by the service center that your payment either has been credited to your account or that we are unable to locate it. If the payment cannot be located you will be advised what to do next.

Q—I support my mother. Can I claim two exemptions for her since she just turned 65?

A—No. You are entitled to one exemption for your mother when she qualifies as your dependent. Her age does not give you an extra exemption. The extra exemption for age may be taken only on a taxpayer's own return when he or his wife is 65 or over.

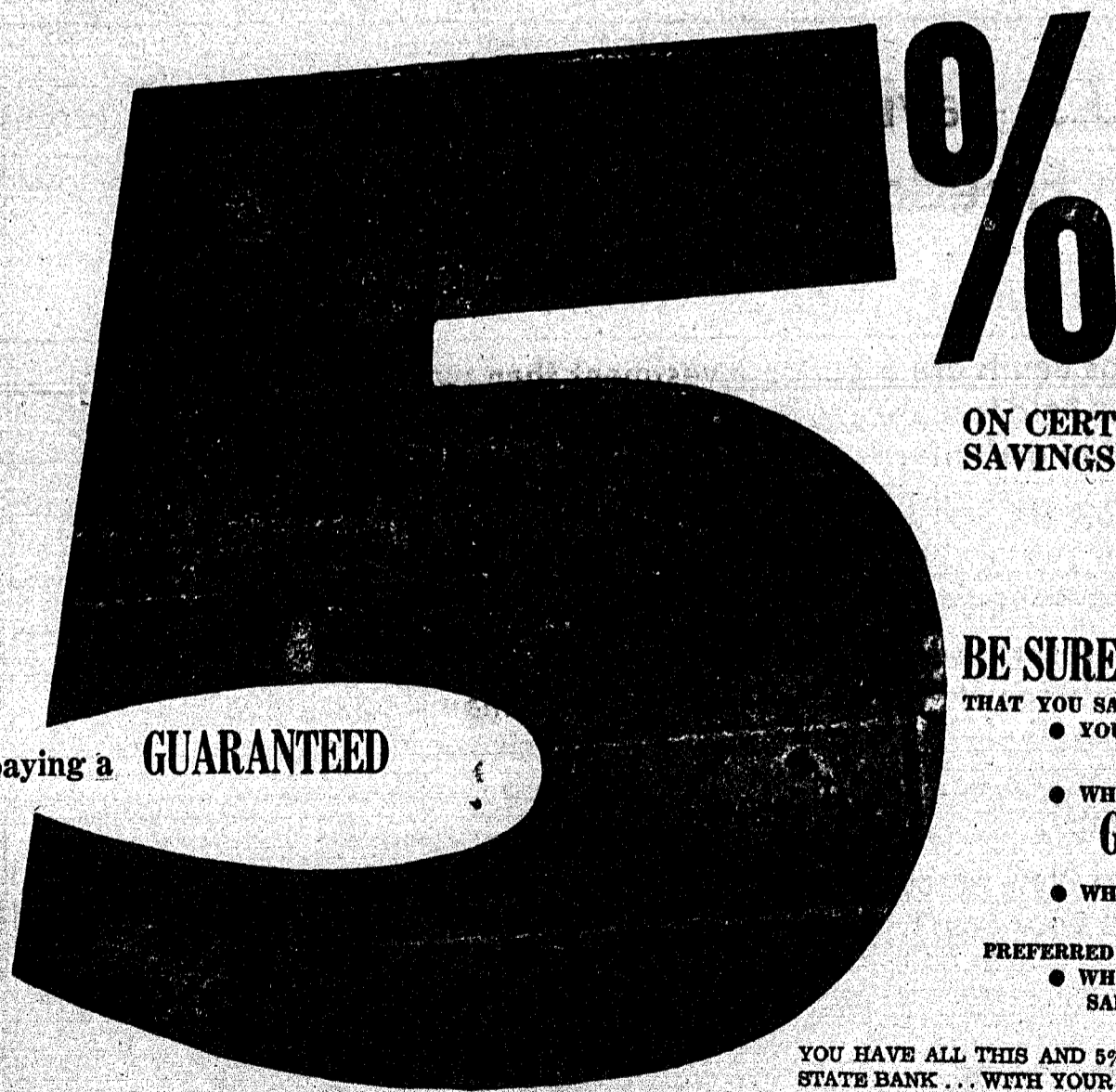




