Santa Anna High School will begin selling reserved seat tickets for the 1968 football season. 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Austin, Texas. — With the meetings with delegates to the Republican convention out of the way, Paul Eggers, of Wichita Falls got back to his campaign for governor of Texas. And his Democratic opponent, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, got started on a round of

the delegates to tell him how he should campaign to offset the growing Republican threat.

Democrats recall that in 1960, when then vice-president Richard M. Nixon was the Republican candidate for president, the unknown Republican candidate for governor, William M. Steger, got 609,808 votes without even making a campaign. This time Eggers has been campaigning for months. He has been picking up support from dissident Democrats like Senator Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo and, with Nixon on the top of the ticket again, he is considered a real threat.

Eggers has been making a series of regional bus tours, campaigning in as many as 30 towns in four days, in an effort to duplicate the Smith success with personal campaigning.

During the primary campaign, Smith visited 225 counties, some of which had never before seen a candidate for governor. This hard work showed up when he won the Democratic nomination easily.

**LEGISLATIVE CONFERENCE**

Texas House Speaker Ben Barnes will attend the National Legislative Conference in Miami, Fla., August 20-22.

Among the topics to be discussed by the state legislative leaders from all 50 states are bloc grants to states from the federal government, annual legislative sessions and others concerning the recent problems in state government.

Barnes is president-elect of the conference.

**AG OPINIONS**

Community Action Agencies handling poverty programs may not be under the direction of county commissioners courts nor may they be headed by persons designated by commissioners courts, according to an opinion by Attorney General Crawford C. Martin.

Opinion notes that under the Texas Constitution, commissioners courts shall deal

only with county business and concludes that poverty programs are not within the constitutional boundaries of commissioners court power.

Of the 55 CAAs in Texas, only five are handled through commissioners courts, so the effect of this ruling is not expected to be major.

In another opinion, Attorney General Martin ruled that the governor may authorize the spending of federal funds to build a residence for the superintendent of the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery.

Authorization does not constitute an increase in the appropriation but merely authorizes the expenditure of the funds already allocated by the legislature. Martin said the superintendent's house burned after lightning hit it on May 19.

Governor Connally approved spending \$25,000 in available federal funds to build the new residence.

**SECURITIES APPROVED/STOPPED**

State Securities Board received 22 applications for permits to sell \$8,939,110 in securities in Texas last week.

The Securities Commissioner William M. King said the applications included two

**HUMPHREY HEMISFAIR**

Vice - president Hubert Humphrey toured HemisFair Saturday as the guest of Governor Connally and a number of other state and local officials.

Humphrey was scheduled to tour the United States Pavilion, the Institute of Texas Cultures and the international sector of the World's Fair. At the U. S. Pavilion, the program included remarks by the vice-president, Connally and Cong. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio.

Humphrey was to meet with the heads of all international pavilions and to end his visit with a special Western Hemisphere solidarity program between the Mexican and Canadian pavilions.

**STUDENT LOANS**

Texas Opportunity Plan - a state program for making loans available to Texas College and university students has helped 20,121 students since the program's inception in September, 1966.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System reports that 42,000 loans totaling \$14,098,300 have been made, as of May 1, through 104 participating institutions.

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**"Fit The Crime"**

"To make the punishment fit the crime" may have been enough of a goal, a century ago, for the comic opera team of Gilbert and Sullivan. But not for modern criminologists. Today's goal, as the United States Supreme Court put it, is to make the punishment "fit the offender and not merely the crime."

Consider two robbers. One is a veteran safe cracker, wise the ways of the underworld. The other is a teenage purse snatcher, nervously trying to be tough.

Both offenders are guilty of the same crime: robbery. Yet there are obvious reasons for not treating them alike. They are different not only in the degree of their evil but also in the chance of saving them from a life of crime.

When the time comes to pronounce sentence, the judge naturally wants to take such differences into account. But he may not have any leeway. Very often a single, standard penalty is prescribed in advance by the legislature.

What happens then? There are these possibilities:

1. The judge may be forced to impose a sentence that he feels is unwise; or
2. He may get around the law—maybe by arbitrarily reducing the charge, maybe even by finding the offender not guilty at all.

In either case, as the unhappy result of a "prefabricated" sentence, justice is not done.

The problem was highlighted recently in a special report on sentencing, by an advisory committee of the American Bar Association.

The committee's report, a part of a massive ABA study of criminal justice, urged a speedy end to too rigid penalties frozen into law.

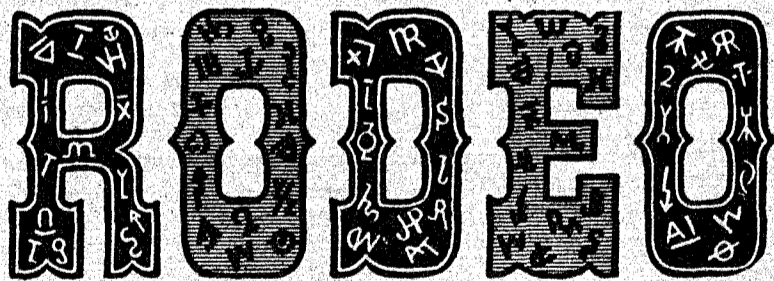
True, it is up to the legislature—as spokesman for the public—to set our basic standards for the punishment of wrongdoing.

But when it comes to applying those standards in a particular case, the committee said the judge should have plenty of options. He, after all, has to deal with an individual human being. Who better than the judge can make the punishment fit the man?

## TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

For various reasons thousands of taxpayers end up receiving a bill from Internal Revenue Service for taxes and interest they owe but have not paid. It is good business to pay your delinquent tax bill promptly. As a matter of fact it is better business to pay when you file your return or before you receive a bill from Internal Revenue. Unless the tax statement is erroneous, most taxpayers will gain by arranging for the money to pay their tax account. If, due to an error, Internal Revenue sends you a statement for taxes that you do not owe, you should take immediate action to get the error corrected. In any case, don't try the "let-them-wait-a-lit-

tle-longer game." The trained professionals follow a system—the end of this system is usually a levy on your bank account, a levy on your wages or seizure of your property for your delinquent tax account. The Revenue Officer is trained to be completely fair, but the tax law requires him to be very firm.

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

#### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

#### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

#### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of statewide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

#### NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied."

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution."

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two percent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 61, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipality, or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

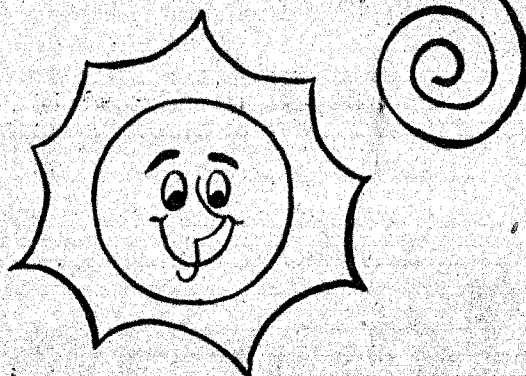

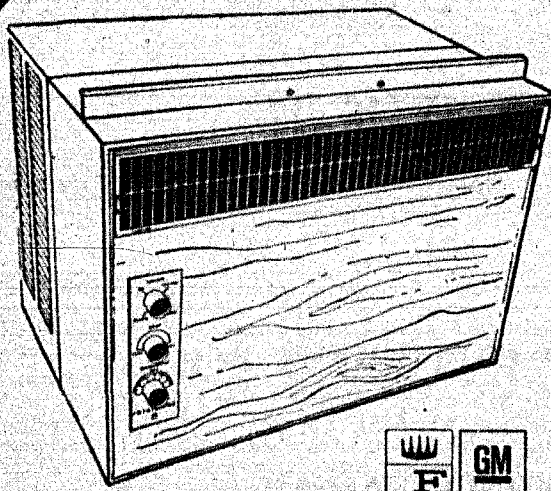

### Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax

**FLOOR COVERINGS  
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matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q**—I pay a girl \$5 to come on Wednesday afternoon to help me with the heavy housework. Do I have to pay social security for her?

**A**—If you have this help on a regular basis then you may have to file 942, Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees, and pay the Social Security tax due. This return is required if cash wages of \$50 or more are paid to a household employee in any one calendar quarter.

In your case, payment of

\$5 a week will add up to \$65 for the second calendar quarter. The tax rate is 4.4 per cent for the employer and 4.4 per cent for the employee. A check for the combined amount of \$5.72 should be sent with your return.

Returns covering the second quarter are due July 31. Further details are covered in IRS Publication No. 14, Circular H, Household Employer's Social Security Tax Guide. For a free copy send a post card to your district director.

**Q**—Are wedding gifts taxable?

**A**—The recipient of gifts is not subject to income or gift taxes. However, the giver may be liable for gift tax if gifts to one person in a single year exceed \$3,000.

**Q**—Is it true you could lose your tax deductions for a business trip overseas if you take a vacation at the same time?

**A**—Yes, there are situations where business deductions for overseas travel can be affected by the amount of time devoted to sightseeing and other non-business activities. Under certain circumstances, the cost of transportation including meals and lodging, to the place of the business meeting and back to the taxpayers home will not be allowed in full as a business deduction.

Rules for handling business deductions in these circumstances are explained in Publication No. 463, "Rules for Deducting Travel, Entertainment and Gift Expenses."

**Q**—A mistake in my social security number held up my

refund for weeks. Why is this number so important?

**A**—Because so many taxpayers have the same name, your social security number is the only positive identification of your account with IRS. Names change, too, as marital status changes.

Congress passed a law several years ago requiring individuals to use tax identification numbers. Social Security numbers were selected for this purpose because most taxpayers already had one.

This number should be placed on all individual tax returns filed, correspondence with IRS concerning returns, payments for tax liabilities and similar documents. The number should also be given to corporations and savings institutions to identify dividend and interest payments.

**Q**—We're going to a benefit dinner for a charitable organization. Won't this cost be deductible?

**A**—The cost of the tickets will be deductible to the extent it exceeds the value of the food and entertainment you receive. If the value of the meal and entertainment is not indicated on the tickets, the sponsors of the event should be able to tell you.

**Q**—When do I have to pay Social Security tax for my maid?

**A**—The quarterly payment for the months of April, May and June is due July 31. Use Form 942, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees," a self-mailer, to file and pay this tax.

This tax is due when cash wages of \$50 or more are paid to a household employee during a calendar quarter.

### TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

As a part of the Federal estate and gift tax law, Congress has provided a system for giving your money away without paying tax, or by paying less tax than the estate tax would be later. Briefly, the rules are: You can give each of your children, grandchildren, etc., a total of \$3,000 each year without paying any gift tax or being liable for estate tax later (unless you die within three years after the gift).

Out of community property, you and your spouse can give \$3,000 each or \$6,000 to each child, grandchild or other beneficiary. By filing a gift tax return, Form 709, with the Internal Revenue Service you can give \$30,000 tax free out of your estate. Of course, in community property this would be doubled to \$60,000 tax free from both spouses. This must also be more than three years before date of death. So, if you and your wife have three children who are all married, and you have nine grandchildren, you can give your 15 heirs \$6,000 each, tax free, or \$90,000 a year. By filing a form 709 with Internal Revenue you can use your \$60,000 exemption (two 30,000 life time exemptions), you can pass out \$150,000 of your estate the first year and \$90,000 a year thereafter, tax free, provided you live for three years after the gift. If you are making an estate plan, it is probably advisable to consult an experienced Federal estate and gift tax consultant.

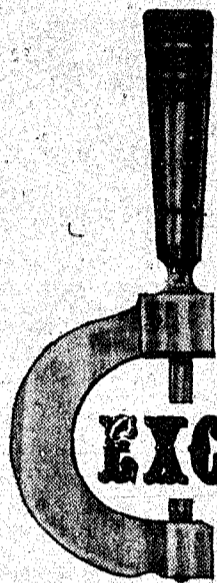

SPORTS AFIELD

There are salt water anglers who specialize in one particular species of fish. It may be tarpon. It may be marlin. It may be tuna, or striped bass. But a great southern anglers specialize in snook. This should not be surprising, for snook fishing is the closest thing salt water has to fresh-water bass fishing. And fresh water bass fishing is about the most popular fishing there is.

Snook are taken on everything from cane poles to fly-rods, but one method — plug casting — stands out above the rest. The lure to use is a surface plug. Jugs will probably catch as many fish, but are not as exciting to use.

A plug may be cast accurately with either a casting or a spinning rod — the accuracy depending more upon the angler's skill than on the nature of his equipment. Use whichever is more comfortable for you, because accuracy is important. Snook often lie under mangrove banks and cannot be stirred to action unless a lure is neatly placed right under their with them. You can expect your share of hang-ups in the mangroves. In fact, if you don't hang up once in a while, you're not sneaking your lure in as close as you should.

Fairly light tackle can be used for this type of snook fishing, but your rod should have enough backbone to let you properly work a surface plug and stick a snook. Because of the many underwater obstructions in snook country and the fish's habit of heading for them, you need a line of about 12-lb. test. Many anglers recommend a wire leader at the

end of a mono leader, since the snook has a razor-sharp gill plate that can easily slice through monofilament of any test. Look out for that gill plate when you boat your snook!

Probably the most surefire daytime tactic for snook is trolling. Certainly this is true when the fish are proving hard to find. Plugs, jugs and spoons that go deep all work at times.

Fly tackle also has its place in the snook angler's arsenal, notes Tom Paugh, Salt-Water Fishing Editor of Sports Afield Magazine. At times it seems as if nothing can stir the snook into striking as well as a three-inch stream-cast to the right spot and given the proper action.

And of course, many anglers — mostly shore fishermen — prefer to fish with natural baits. But they must be experts to fish productively. They must know which bridge, dock, beach or bulkhead will be the most productive at what tide. Much of the bait fishing is done at night with cane poles — ideal tackle around certain bridges and docks. Live shrimp and live baitfish such as mullet and pilchards are excellent baits, but in various areas many others are used. Check right in the locality where you're fishing for the best advice.

Bids To Open On Sea Lab

Austin—Bids on a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department marine laboratory to be built at Palacios will open at 2:00 p. m. July 11, according to Terry Leary, marine fisheries coordinator for the Department.

Already under construction are 21 ponds ranging from one-quarter to four acres in size to be used in research at the laboratory.

The facilities to be bid on include a three bedroom residence for the biologists in charge of the facility and a 3,461 square foot laboratory building which will serve as headquarters for Department biologists servicing the Matagorda Bay area.

Leary says research will be done on food fish, shell fish, oysters, and crabs. "We hope to obtain basic data on effects of ecological changes on these species," he said.

According to Leary, the ponds will provide an artificially controlled habitat where biologist can observe results of changes and competition. Aquaculture, the art of farming the sea for food, will be the subject of some of the research in Texas to be conducted at the new laboratory.

Leary said that the Department has looked for 15 years for a site suitable for the research. Located near Well Point in Matagorda County, the 40-

acre site offers a clean water bay, high ground, clay-type soil, fresh water, an access road, and deep water in Matagorda Bay so the site can be reached by boat.
