## Screw Worm Case Confirmed On Local Ranch

A confirmed case of screw worms has been reported in our community, and the State Eradication department will begin dropping the sterile flies in our community right away.

A baby calf on the Turner Ranch on Home Creek was found to have screw worms after a sample was sent to the Mission Laboratory. Roland Williams, the ranch manager, reporter to the News, suggesting local livestock owners check their livestock carefully since the confirmed case is in our area. This is the first known outbreak in the Santa Anna area in many years.

The sterile flies will be dropped in the area of the Turner Ranch and neighboring territory.

## Civil Defense Course To Be Given Here

## Dr. Henner Takes Mission In Viet Nam

Dr. Charles M. Henner left Santa Anna last Thursday enroute to Viet Nam for a two month mission with the state department. Dr. Henner will be with 15 other doctors from the U. S. for the next 60 days practicing in the local hospitals in South Viet Nam, treating the people there. The program is sponsored by the American Medical Association and the U. S. Department of State and sends each month 16 American doctors for the two month period.

There are only 1,200 Viet Namese doctors to treat 16 million people, and three-fourths of the medical men are in the army, leaving a very small number to take care of the natural illnesses plus the victims of the war. The hospitals there are often only huts or tin sheds, according to Dr. Henner's reports, and the patients are crowded onto straw mats. Dr. Henner will be classified as a general surgeon, and will go from hospital to hospital where he is needed the most.

The doctors taking part in this mercy mission are given only their transportation to Viet Nam, plus a small allowance to pay for laundry, taxi fare, and incidentals. Dr. Henner left Brownwood by plane, flying to Chicago, and on to Tokyo enroute to Viet Nam. He and his family spent several months last spring in Port of Spain, Trinidad, with a medical mission for the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

**Outdoors In Texas**

Black bass fishing is not expensive.

Sure you can make any participating sport costly. A golfer with the most expensive clubs, a velvety leather golf bag, a golf cart and pockets full of super-duper golf balls can run up a big bill at the sporting goods store. And an even bigger bill on the inks if he's inclined to wager.

Likewise with the angler who has to have diamond-studded reels and rods with golden guides and all the fancy-pantsy gadgets that the fisherman can buy.

But, listen while I tell you of the least expensive sport you can imagine. It's black-bass fishing with artificial worms.

Not live worms—they're a buck a can. Just plain old plastic worms. You can buy 'em for a dime apiece at most bargain counters and sometimes "two-fer." But even at 10-times the price they are still the most economical bait you can use.

And look what little you need to go with them! One weedless hook will last a long, long time. Cost for hooks . . . about a dime apiece. Then you'll need a sliding sinker (another dime), or you can use the clamp-ons that run a third as much.

Besides your rod and reel, that's all you need — to have at it. Then if you lose a lure it's not a \$1.50 popping plug but a ten cent plastic worm. And just think how many fish you caught on that artificial worm before you lost it in the brush or a lunker gobbled it and ran.

Doggone, man, there's just nothin' that will beat plastic worm fishing! Besides, it's the most productive way.

Takes a little patience, but not much. Shucks, you came out to relax, didn't ya? Then take it easy. That's the way to latch onto bass when you are fishing with the artificial worm.

Another thing, man, you can cast right into the middle of a lilly pond, at the base of a weeping willow tree, or into the darndest mess of weeds you've ever seen — and that ole worm-and-weedless hook comes a

slithering back, scratching bottom all the way, bumping logs and bouncing off rocks just like it was made to last forever.

Fact of the matter is — you sometimes get tired of looking at the ole gnawed-on worm and slap on a new one just for beauty's sake.

They're easy to put on — just like a live worm only they're not slimy. And if you are careful you can use the old wiggler again and again by cutting it shorter and shorter.

Now, how can you beat that? It's the best type of black bass fishing and as the ole peddler always says — "The best for less." To which we might add—the most productive, too.

If you haven't tried plastic worm fishing—call the ace angler in your town (the guy who brings in the biggest bass)—and ask him how to rig up your gear. You can bet your bottom dollar he knows.

**TAX MAN SAM SEZ:**

If your spouse is so cantankerous that you can't live with him (or her) the Texas community property law may cause you an income tax problem: IRS must consider the income of each spouse as community income up to the date of divorce. Even if you haven't seen them or spoken to them all year, before you file separate returns you have to take the income of both spouses and split the community income, with each filing on his or her half. If you itemize your deductions, these may have to be split too. Don't blame the tax folks—they didn't get you into the community with your problem spouse. The tax folks may be sympathetic, it is either a joint return, or each spouse filing on their half of the community income.

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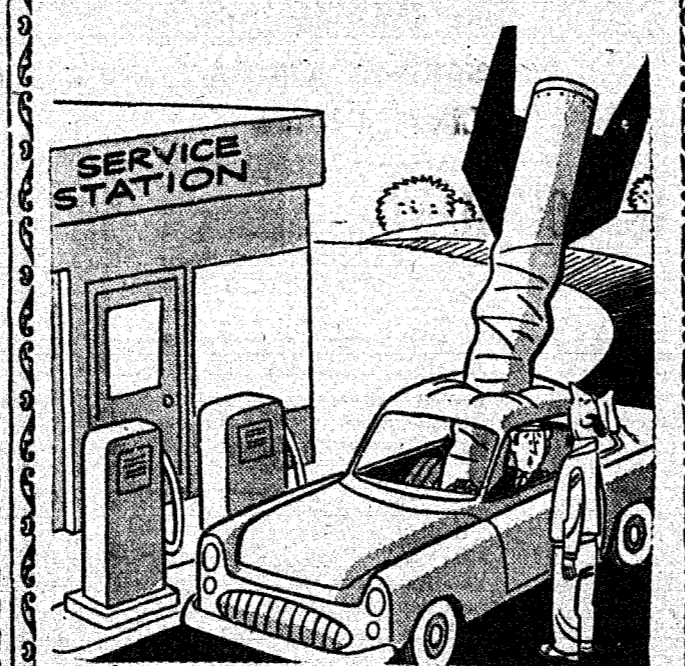

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Slow Motion Divorce

Not long ago a man filed suit for divorce on the ground that his wife had committed adultery—20 years earlier. But his case was dismissed because of too much procrastination. The court, noting the difficulties of finding out what really happened that long ago commented:

"A husband cannot wait to make his charges until the years dim the proofs to the contrary." Like most lawsuits, a divorce suit too long delayed may be barred automatically by a state's statute of limitations. But even if there is no automatic bar, courts are usually skeptical of divorce suits in which the complaining spouse has postponed action for an excessive period of time.

One reason, mentioned above, is the problem of evidence—of dredging facts out of a distant past. Another reason is the feeling that a grievance, if acted upon so slowly, could not have been too serious in the first place.

Thus a woman failed to convince the court that two blows by her husband, inflicted 40 years before, had ruined her marriage.

"There must be some limit to judicial credulity," said the judge. "We think it has been reached here."

Nevertheless, there may well be a reason for delay. For example, a man who put off a divorce suit for a number of years, after learning of his wife's infidelity, gave an excuse that satisfied the court; he wanted to spare his young children from scandal as long as he could.

In another case a husband was held justified in waiting gallantly, before suing for divorce, while his wife recovered from a severe illness.

Perhaps the best reason for delay is that the wronged spouse continues to have hope that the marriage may yet be preserved.

Thus, a court found no fault with a man who waited seven years—in recurring hope of a reconciliation—before finally seeking a divorce on grounds of marital cruelty. The court felt it would be unfair to blame him for wanting what the law itself encourages: the saving of the marriage.

## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—Isn't the person who helps you prepare a tax return responsible for its accuracy? Some of the things I put down on the suggestion of a tax expert were disallowed and I got billed for additional tax.

A—The taxpayer is legally responsible for all the information on his return even when someone else helped him prepare it. Your experience shows the value of using reputable and qualified advisors when tax help is needed. It also demonstrates the need to check every item before the return is filed.

Q—Do you need a new social security number if you get married?

A—No, there is no need to obtain a new number. However, please notify the Social Security Administration of a change in your name so they can correct their records.

A number of tax refunds were delayed last year because the taxpayer's name and social security number listed on the tax return did not match the name and number in Social Security Administration files.

Q—Do you have to pay social security tax for house-

hold help when you pay \$50 a quarter but divide it between two people?

A—You are liable for the tax only when you pay one person \$50 or more cash wages in a calendar quarter.

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MENTS YOU NEED A REALITY WITH ONE OF OUR LOW COST PROPERTY

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Austin, Texas — Drinking drivers run a new risk of being nabbed — through a tell tale scientific breath analysis device going into use in Texas.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, Department of Public Safety Director, announced that 90 new "breathalyzers" have been purchased by the DPS and 450 highway patrolmen trained to operate them. Device will test a suspect's breath to determine the percentage of alcohol in the bloodstream. Instruments, simple to operate and read, will be placed in 80 of the state's most-populous counties, at fixed locations and used under strictly-controlled scientific conditions.

Suspects who consent to the test will blow into a tube and the percentage of alcohol will be registered on indicators. About 15 minutes' waiting time is allowed before testing begins and actual test takes only five minutes. Experts report a direct relationship between alcohol content in blood and breath. Drinking, according to DPS statistics, figures in 40 to 50 per cent of Texas' traffic deaths — perhaps more than 1,800 of last year's 3,367 highway fatalities. Over the nation, use of alcohol leads to annual traffic death toll of 25,000 and 800,000 vehicle accidents — the largest single factor in fatal crashes.

A driver with 0.15 per cent blood alcohol content by weight is 25 times more likely to be involved in a wreck than a non-drinking driver. The average person achieves that danger point after consuming five ounces of 100 proof alcohol an hour without eating, DPS chemists figure. Consumption leading to intoxication, of course, varies with weight, time between the drinks and amount of food eaten.

Tests will "clear" drivers suspected of being drunk who are actually driving erratically due to illness or other reasons.

"It is hoped the breathalyzer project will hit hard at the problem and help reduce traffic death rate in Texas," Spier said.

**COURTS SPEAK**

Tragedies, race horses and wild elephants provided grist for the State Supreme Court's mill as it ground out more than 130 cases following a summer recess. High court decided that

A Houston widow whose husband was killed by mistake while entering the wrong house cannot collect accidental death benefits.

Damage suit filed by a widow following the death of her husband in an auto wreck can be maintained although it did not meet the filing deadline.

Damage award payable to the estate of a Bowie County boy run over by a car should be upheld.

Employee of a Waco department store is entitled to \$50,000 damages due to an escalator accident.

Rio Grande Valley circus owner can collect damages from an animal dealer who delivered him a wild female elephant instead of a tame one as ordered.

The race horse, Benedicte, who won \$90,000, was not covered by a \$5,000 Lloyds of London insurance policy when he died.

A Harris County mother who went to India to study Yoga should not regain custody of her two sons from their grandparents who took them in after a 1963 divorce.

A lower court verdict ordering Pinehurst to pay a water company \$29,000 under a contract should be reversed.

A Henderson County real estate man's claim that he was denied proper commission on the sale of a ranch for a Boy Scout camp is entitled to review.

City of Roma's claim to a share of revenues from the border toll bridge operated by Star County should be retired.

**BLUE-LAW TEST**

The State Supreme Court has agreed to hear an ap-

peal from local officials stymied in their attempts to enforce the state's newest and most far-reaching Blue Law. Article 286a of the Penal Code prohibits the sale of certain listed items—covering just about everything — on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays, which requires retailers to choose between the two days.

However, Gibson's Discount Center of Midland go around it by leasing its store and stock to another corporation.

Midland County 142nd District Court agreed with Gibson's that the Blue Law violates the state and national constitutions, and the local officials appealed. The case is set for hearing before the high court on November 6.

**SALES TAX GOES UP**

Texas started shelling out another penny for state sales taxes on October 2. That made it three per cent statewide — and four per cent in those cities which levy local option sales taxes.

Extra one per cent for the state was voted by the Legislature in special session last June. Session also approved a one-per-cent jump in car sales tax and a 50 per cent hike in the franchise tax. Revenue estimates are about \$175 million in new state revenue during the next 11 months. Legislature in 1969 may have to raise \$300 million or more in additional money.

**APPOINTMENTS**

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed the five public members to the Governor's Committee on Physical Fitness, which was created by the Legislature in June to study the problem and make recommendations.

Members are: Tom Stohlhandske, San Antonio attorney and former All-American football player at UT; Mrs. Joe Long of Austin, holder of a doctorate in physical education; Dr. Stanley Burnham, physical education professor at UT-Austin; Dr. Kenneth Cooper, U. S. Air Force Medical Corps major at San Antonio; and Dr. Jay Stanford, professor of internal medicine at the UT Southwestern Medical School at Dallas.

**BILINGUAL EDUCATION**

Texas Education Agency is utilizing the experience of six visiting teachers from Mexico to improve the bilingual educational program it administers.

The teachers, all from Nevo Leon, will spend the current school year in Texas teaching Spanish to already Spanish speaking children in the pre-school and elementary grades.

"This program," a TEA official said, "is an attempt to enhance our bilingual teaching and to involve ourselves in international programs. Also, we want to see how well Mexican national teachers can work in our public schools."

**HOSPITAL PLAN OPEN TO STUDY**

New 1969 state plan for the construction and modernization of hospitals and related facilities now is available for public review at State Department of Health office. Plan is the basic document which the State Board of Health uses to make its re-

commendations for federal Hill-Burton grants.

Sixty-nine applicants are applying for \$28,825,466 under the federal matching fund program for hospital aid next year.

**RIOT LOSS PLAN REVIEWED**

Plan of insurance companies to spread riot losses got State Board of Insurance review but was sent back for redrafting following new federal rules.

It must be approved by October 29 to qualify companies operating in Texas for federal reinsurance under new housing act. Plan will have to be acceptable to U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

**SHORT SNOOTZ**

Odessa Attorney W. O. Shafer is new president of the Texas Association of Defense Counsel. Jack Hebdon of San Antonio is president-elect and Max N. Osborn of Midland secretary-treasurer.

Marvin Griffin will remain on the Texas ballot as "stand in" vice-presidential candidate of the American Party, although, George Wallace now has selected Gen. Curtis LeMay as his running mate. Texas' increasing screw-worm problem has resulted

in the release of 298,966,000 sterile flies over the state in August to fight the pest.

Turner M. Keith has succeeded R. O. Smith as executive director of Wholesale Beer Distributors of Texas.

W. Grady Swift will head a tick eradication program in South Texas brought about by discovery of fever ticks on livestock on three ranches in Dimmit County.

The U. S. Post Office Department has advised the Texas Aeronautics Commission that Texas now has 11 air-taxi mail routes out of 120 in operation all over the nation.

Securities registered for public sale in Texas during the fiscal year ended August 31, 1968, passed the billion-dollar mark for the first time, State Securities Board reports.

# SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

The jig is up — way up — among the top salt-water lures. If such a thing exists as a universal lure for salt-water fishing, this is it. With the cooperation of the fish involved, you can make catches on the flats, in the bays, on the reefs and in the deep sea—all on jigs. Of course, the word "jig" covers a lot of territory, as, loosely defined, it refers to a vast family of lures. There are jigs for jugging and casting and trolling. There are jigs weighing six ounces and more. There are jigs of many colors, shapes and designs. And there are as many ways to fish with jigs as there are jigs to fish with. All can add new dimensions to your fishing fun and more filets and fish steaks to your freezer.

Jigs come in two basic types: the casting jig and the trolling jig. In its unadorned state, the casting jig is the simplest form of fishing lure: a slug of metal molded about the shank of a bare hook. The trolling jig differs in that the hook shank that the metal is not molded on the hook shank but is hollow, so that it can be threaded on a wire leader to which a hook has been attached. One example of this lure is the Japanese feather, famed for its effectiveness in offshore trolling. Trolling lures also come in various weights and sizes and on different types of built-in leader, both nylon and wire. However, they are all used for trolling and are generally meant to simulate a swimming bait-fish.

For most trolling jobs, especially for the larger species, rigged baits are preferred to feathers. Casting is yet another story. A buck-tail jig of the Upperman type tipped with a piece of shrimp or other bait is a supremely effective lure for many species. It should be used with as light a leader as circumstances allow.

Unlike plugs, jigs have no built-in action. How the jig behaves under water is determined entirely by the angler's retrieve. Unfortunately, no set rule exists that will

guarantee fish. Some species, such as the jack crevalle, like a fast retrieve. Others, such as the bonefish prefer hardly any motion at all. There is plenty of room here for experimentation.

Tie your jig to your line or leader with a knot that will hold it in a loose, rather than a knot, such as the clinch, that will snug up tight. This advises Tom Paugh, Salt-Water Fishing editor Sports Afield Magazine, will give your lure much more freedom of movement and almost certainly bring you more fish.

One final word, about quality. Your favorite tackle shop will probably carry jigs in several grades. The cheaper ones will not hold up as well as the more expensive brand-name varieties. If you are going to fish where snags abound, or use light leaders for sharp-toothed species, it may pay you to buy the expensive lures. Otherwise, use the quality jigs and rinse them in fresh water when you get home that night. They'll last quite a while.

## BOBWHITE AND BLUE QUAIL POPULATIONS GOOD

San Angelo — Wildlife biologists of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have been hesitant to make other than casual estimates of the bobwhite and scaled quail crop in West Texas, but there is no doubt about it now—the quail crop is tops this year.

Birds have hatched early and late, and wildlife personnel and sportsmen are reporting large numbers of birds throughout most of West Texas.

Wildlife Supervisor Jack Parsons asserts that although there have been periodic high populations in some spots over the past several years, the 1968 crop, region-wide, appears to be as good or better than any time during the past nine years.

## TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

In a few more days millions of our young Americans will give up their summer jobs—or play—and head back to school—or college. Those students who have summer earnings will want to file an income tax return next January 1 or before April 15, to get a refund. If income tax was withheld they need to keep their Form W-2. (There employer usually gives them a W-2 shortly after the end of their employment.) Those making less than \$600 are not required by law to file, but they won't get a refund of their income tax withheld unless they do file. Social security taxes are not refunded. Each year quite a few students lose \$40 or \$50 simply because they lose their W-2. They don't want to face the tongue lashing their ex-boss would give them if they went and asked for another W-2. Most students soon find that income tax will be an important part of their life from now on, and that they need to be careful to keep their records.
