28 Housing Units Approved

City Council Meet In Regular Session

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session on Thursday night, Nov. 7. Various issues of business were attended to by the city leaders.

Minutes of the October meeting were read and approved.

The Council approved a change in rates for garbage pick-up for the business district, voting to charge 25c per stop on any and every stop made in the business district. Each merchant will designate the number of times they wish to have the city truck stop at their place. The residential fee will remain the same, with tree limbs, brush, and other large trash picked up free of charge as time permits.

Twenty-eight new housing projects were approved. The proposed plans call for eight family units to be constructed on the property adjacent west to the old West Texas Utility building on South Santa Fe Street, and 20 single units to be built using the old hotel building, and on the location of the former Burlap Bag Co. and Queen Theater.

The City Council appointed Jake McCreary to replace W. H. (Bill) Thate on the Housing Authority Board.

The City will entertain the 18th Annual Pecan Valley Water Superintendents' meeting on Thursday, Nov. 21. The meeting in Santa Anna will be for municipal water superintendents from throughout the area.

The city fathers voted to donate \$5.00 per city employee to the Community Chest.

The city will give a banquet of appreciation for members of the Santa Anna Vol-

unteer Fire Department on December 14.

It was included in the minutes of the Council that the Fire Department may not use the two newest fire trucks on grass fires outside

the city limits. The big tank truck, meant for rural use, will be available for the out-of-town calls with grass fires.

Two city employees were granted pay raises of \$15.00 a month.

Junior Basketball Teams To Open Season Monday, Nov. 18

The Santa Anna Junior High School Basketball teams will open their season next Monday night, Nov. 18, with games at the local gym. The girls and boys teams will have games with the Blanket Junior High teams, beginning at 6:30 p. m.

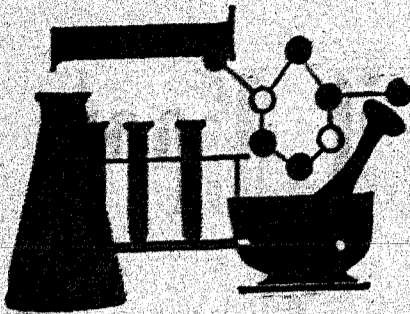

Local Teachers Hear American Heritage Program

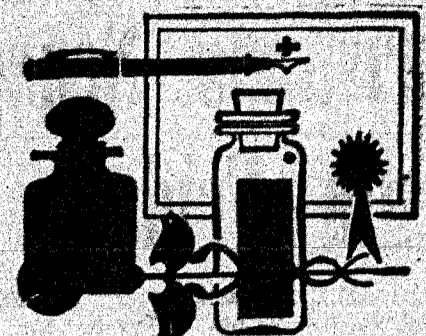

Austin, Texas — General election day was a rosy one for statewide Democratic contenders.

Not only did Texas endorse liberal presidential candidate Hubert Humphrey, but also all state wide Democratic standard bearers. No incumbent congressmen lost their jobs and the partisan lineup in the state legislature remained just the way it is.

Preston Smith of Lubbock won the gubernatorial race with about 57 per cent of the votes over his opponent and first-time candidate GOPer Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Ben Barnes, 30, of DeLeon will become youngest lieutenant governor in history by virtue of his overwhelming triumph over Republican DeCluit of Waco. Barnes was the top statewide vote-getter on the ballot.

All incumbent statewide officials seeking re-election won handsily.

In congressional races, three Republicans seeking new terms had no great trouble, but none of their colleagues seeking to unseat incumbent Democrats was successful. Congressional lineup remains 20 Democrats to three Republicans.

Eight Republican state House members were elected — four incumbents, four newcomers. Three incumbent GOPers were defeated. Two

GOP state senators were elected. Linup remains 142 Democrats to eight Republicans in the House, 29 Democrats to two GOPs, in the Senate.

Boasting that no other state can compare with Texas "regarding its support of loyalty to or victory for the Democratic party," former State Democratic Committee Chairman Will D. Davis observed:

"Texas is the most populous state to have a Democratic governor and only one of 10 largest to have solid statewide Democratic administration."

"Texas was the only one in the southern and southwestern regions to give Humphrey plurality; and only Texas, Washington and Hawaii west of the Mississippi voted for the Democratic presidential nominee."

MOST AMENDMENTS WERE DEFEATED

Voters showed they are in an economy frame of mind in their decisions on 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

They voted Nov. 5 to cut out the state property tax, but they refused to go along with raising the state's public welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million a year or to increase legislator's salaries from \$4,800 to \$8,400 annually.

Approved were changes in state employees' pension system, university fund investment liberalization, removal of the \$504 a year ceiling on contributions to teacher pensions, wiping out the property tax and clarification of a legislator's eligibility to run for other office by virtue of the termination date of his elective term.

Texas turned thumbs on tax exemptions for warehouse - stored property, El

Paso local governmental consolidations, Dallas road bonds, tax aid for Texarkana tobacco merchants, state contract changes, tax benefits for anti-pollution equipment purchasers and industrial bond issues.

NEW JOBS ANNOUNCED

Governor - elect Preston Smith announced his first staff selection, James P. Oliver, formerly of Caldwell, to serve as executive budget director after the new administration takes over in January. Oliver currently serves as assistant director of the Legislative Budget Board.

Walter N. Corrigan of San Antonio is new chairman of Texas Research League. C. I. Wall of Amarillo is vice-chairman, and Grogan Lord of Georgetown was renamed as secretary - treasurer.

C. C. Miller of Dallas is the chairman of University Interscholastic League Legislative Council and B. F. McCollum of Port Neches is vice-chairman.

Glenn Biggs, formerly of Abilene and one-time-executive assistant to House Speaker Barries, has been appointed president of National Western Life Insurance Co.

HILL-BURTON FUND APPROVED

Forty-two applicants received allocations of \$15,198,504 in federal Hill - Burton hospital construction, and modernization funds through State Board of Health.

Biggest allocations of \$1 million each went to hospitals in Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, Bonham, Irving and Fort Worth. Memorial Hospital of Uvalde received two grants totalling \$865,000. Atlanta City Hospital received \$900,000; Brownfield's Terry Hospital District \$850,000; Hotel Dieu at El Paso \$885,500; Johnson City Hospital \$390,000; Community Hospital of Brazosport - in Freeport \$242,090; Ballinger Memorial Hospital \$300,000; Highland General of Pampa \$321,119; St. Josephs of El Paso \$594,313; Seton of Austin \$375,000; Denison Memorial \$210,000; Newton County Memorial \$320,350; and Morriside Manor (home for aged), San Antonio \$700,000.

Smaller amounts went to facilities in Waco, Lone Star, Jacksonville, Floresville, El Paso, Hempstead, Robert Lee, Coleman, Sterling City, Midland, Greenville, Corpus Christi, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth.

Hill - Burton funds pay up to half of the cost of the construction - modernization work.

ATTACK REDIRECTED

Texas Animal Health Commission has changed its attack on hog cholera in Texas by de-emphasizing the cure which has turned out to be a cause of the disease.

Commission has been depending on the modified live-virus vaccine to combat the disease. But statistics show that, in 1967, 31 per cent of the hog cholera cases were traced back to the use of the MLV.

So, the Commission approved a new requirement that all hogs leaving a market for destinations other than the slaughter be innoculated with inactive serum. Then, if the owner wants to use the live virus, he may.

Secondly, the Commission amended its regulation that all hogs entering the state must have been treated with the modified live-virus vaccine. New requirement will be the use of the inactive serum alone.

TEXAS GETS RECREATION FUNDS

Texas is due to get \$1.7 million of \$45.7 million in funds for acquisition and development of outdoor recreation facilities approved by Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, U. S. Department of Interior.

Allocations are made largely on basis of population, federal resources and programs, and out-of-state visitor use. States must match the grants 50-50.

BLUE LAW SUIT

Texas Supreme Court has heard the first arguments for and against Penal Code Article 286a, which prohibits the sale of certain listed items — covering just about everything — on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays.

Suit is the State vs. Gibson's Discount Center of Midland, which — the state contends — tried to get around the law by staying open the legal six days then "leasing" its facilities and stocks to another company — created and owned by Gibson's — for the seventh day.

At the local level, a district court judge upheld Gibson's move by saying that the

"Blue Law" is unconstitutional, because the items listed in the statute are vague and indefinite.

In its arguments before the court, Gibson's concentrated on allegations that the state's appeal — directly to the Supreme Court from the district court — was improper and should be refused.

The high court will rule on the jurisdiction question before it gets into the substance of the case.

LOAN BONDS SOLD

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System sold \$12 million in student loan bonds to Harris Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago at 3.8673 interest.

Money provides assistance to needy students. So far, 29,480 have benefitted from it.

Board also approved fine arts programs at nine schools and administrative reorganization of arts programs at the University of Texas at Arlington and West Texas State. Construction of a \$1.5 million physical education complex at San Angelo State College got authorization, as did the plan for participation in federal aid to campus building.

On December 3, the board will make key decisions on dental education, medical education and North Texas higher education needs.

COTTON GIN RIDER DUMPED

A controversial appropriations bill rider twice vetoed by Gov. John Connally was stricken from a budget draft on motion of Lt. Gov.-elect Ben Barnes.

Barnes got some opposition from House Speaker-designate Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham and Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah, but Gov.-elect Preston Smith held his motion carried on voice vote.

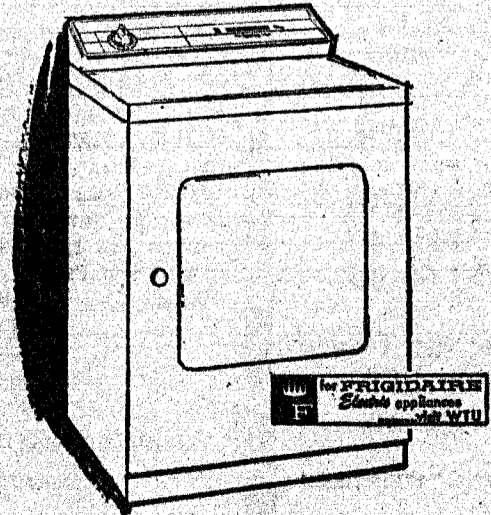

Outdoors In Texas

Shortly after nightfall Lake O' the Pines comes to life. You can see evidence of it everywhere. First, the flickering flame of a lighted gasoline lantern, then the brilliant and steady glow. White lights seem to pop up like fireflies, everywhere.

Alongside these lanterns are crappie fishermen, or in Northeast Texas lingo, the "white perch" anglers. They get out in the cool of night to drop their live minnows down alongside a tree or next to a submerged clump of brush. Each of those tight-line holders hopes that those broad, "white fish" . . . attracted by the lantern light . . . soon will give that tell-tale yank on the line.

This isn't a scene familiar only to Northeast Texas. It is repeated almost every night—spring, summer and fall—on lakes throughout the Lone Star State. It happens everywhere you find those ubiquitous crappie. And that's almost everywhere!

Crappies are basically lake fish. You'll find a few in the deep, placid pools of rivers, but mostly they favor the man-made reservoirs. Soon after a new lake fills up, crappie start showing up on angler's strings. This is true more and more as time goes by.

The unfortunate thing about crappies is they have the ability to over-populate the waters in which they live by their sheer productive potential," says Marion Toole, director of Inland Fisheries for the State Parks and Wildlife Commission. "The first crappies that are planted in a pond or lake are capable of rapid growth, but as subsequent spawns occur the growth rate of the young of the year becomes slower and finally a stunted crappie population is the end result."

There's some magic about this fish that's difficult to describe. It isn't a very sporting fish, not really. It bites in a series of light tap-taps, and when hooked it battles deep in tight figure eights, surrendering after only a brief fling of energy. Perhaps the basic motivation behind its inherent popularity is that it is an epicure's delight on the dinner platter. Many fishermen claim the crappie has the best flavor of any fish, bar none. It is a kind of sweet, succulent meat. Best way to cook one, they say, is to lop off the head, gut it and fry whole, a rich golden brown.

Two species of crappie are found in Texas—the white and black crappie. Offhand, it is almost impossible to tell them apart. A large male of the white species might be almost entirely black. Only sure-fire identification is to count the spines in the dorsal fin. If it has five or six spines, you've got yourself a white crappie; seven or eight and it belongs to the black family.

Actually, most fishermen could care less whether it is white or black. All they like to do is catch them . . . and the more the merrier. Fortunately for anglers, crappie have a way of cooperating quite nicely. Another good thing about the crappie is that they are school fish and

where you catch one you'll likely take several.

Any kind of rod and reel can be used for crappie fishing, and if the water is shallow enough, an ordinary cane-pole will suffice. Tie about a No. 1 thin-shanked hook on the end of your line, add a clinch-on sinker about 8 inches up and you're in business.

Crappie prefer some kind of cover. Almost always you'll find them around submerged brush. Some people even "bait" crappie holes by tying together large clumps of green brush and anchoring the brush underwater in a likely spot.

One of the best times to catch crappies is in the spring, when they migrate into the shallows to feed. This is one time of year when they readily hit artificial baits. Bass fishermen often take several while plugging along shorelines of lakes.

Probably the best lure is the tiny white Maribou-hair jig. All you must do is cast the jig, allow it to sink deep and bring it back slowly, simply reeling in at the same speed all the time. Some people put a cork bobber about two feet above the jig and cast this around brush in the shallows, popping the cork lightly to make the jig jump up and down.

Favorite natural food of the crappie is the minnow. Ninety nine out of every 100 crappie caught are taken on this popular bait. A small minnow about two inches

long is best. Hook it through the lips or just behind the dorsal fin to make it stay alive and wiggling, to entice a wily old crappie into biting. Sometimes a crappie will carve a minnow off the hook without the fisherman ever knowing it. Large crappie seem to have this knack. What they do is approach from below and sort of lift up on the minnow. This way there is no tell-tale tug to betray the bite.

One of the best crappie fishermen I've ever known uses a porcupine quill bobber. His rig is set so the minnow is near the bottom, where crappie generally hang out. The slender bobber rides upright on the water. When an uplifting crappie tries to steal the minnow, the bobber tilts slightly and the fisherman drives the hook home.

As the old axiom goes, there is more than one way to skin a cat.

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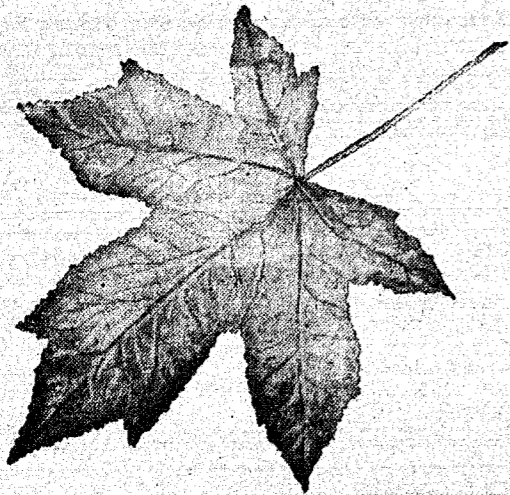
