## Watering Schedule Necessary Due to Low Pressure in City

Due to heavy water usage in Santa Anna, there has been a drastic reduction in water pressure to many parts of the town. Santa Anna City officials have asked the cooperation of residents in the town, and are requesting a schedule for outside watering that should relieve the situation during the summer months.

People living south of the railroad tracks are asked to confine outside watering to Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week; those on the north side

of the railroad are to water yards and gardens on Tuesday, Thursday or Saturday. No outside watering is to be done on Sunday.

Despite rumors that the water storage tank is not full and that a water shortage exists, City officials state that the system is operating at capacity and no water shortage exists. The City water system was built many years ago when less outside watering and usage occurred and when there were fewer homes in the community. The old system is not adequate during the times of peak usage and cooperation of residents is necessary.

## Seventh Day Adventist Church Welcomes New Pastor This Week

Last Saturday morning the new pastor for the Seventh-day Adventist church gave his first sermon.

Elder A. L. Swanson came to the Santa Anna-Coleman church from pastoring churches in the Las Cruces, New Mexico area where he pastored churches covering an area of 20,000 square miles.

Swanson served the Adventist church for 14 years in the Texico Conference, covering the western part of Texas and New Mexico. He was also principal of two academies in that field.

During World War II Elder Swanson worked for the government in Civil service and later joined the military occupational forces serving in France, Germany and Austria.

Elder and Mrs. Swanson are now located in the John Lovereidge house on A. Avenue, and are adjusting readily to the green hills and vegetation of the

local area instead of the illimitable landscapes and sandstorms of the desert where they have been so long.

Mrs. Swanson graduated from the Florida Hospital School of Nursing and has served the church in Vellore, India, and Zambia, Africa. She worked under the supervision of Dr. Ray Foster, an orthopedic surgeon. Dr. Foster does reconstructive surgery in many leprosariums in Central Africa and is director of the Trans-African Rehabilitation and Research Service of the Seventh-day Adventists.

The Swanson's son Lee is with his parents here until the start of the school term at Keene. He was valedictorian of his graduating class in Sandia Academy, located in Corrales, New Mexico. He is listed in Who's Who Among High School Students of America. He will begin his premed course at Keene on a scholarship granted to him.

Depression of the 30's Left Heritage of Mingled Memories

The old house with the side room, the barns, the sheds and the cow pens are long gone from the old home place. I found an old snuff bottle or two and some red rock from the top of the cistern about where I think our house sat. The hill over to the east was closer than I remembered. I hollered a couple of times and it echoed back just like it did when I

was a country boy during the great depression of the early thirties.

They were hard years, but many of the memories are happy ones. Mmemories of things like snow ice cream, the smell of shoe polish and lye soap on Sunday morning, town boys spending the night and sleeping on beds in the yard, smoking cedar bark, doing without nice things and not knowing the difference.

About all the real excitement we had in those days was when a catfelin the cistern or a candle fly got in the lamp globe.

We had 18 cats, and daddy milked four old half jersey cows to feed them. I never saw any white buffalo, but the hawks and skunks ate most of our chickens, and in 1931 about all we lived on was okra, rotten ended watermelons, cottontail rabbits, and clabber.

Mama wore tennis shoes and underwear made out of flour sacks. Once she was crawling through a barbed wire fence and

tore her under pants right where it said "Light Crust Flour."

If there was any underarm deodorant on the market we didn't know about it.

And we had no air conditioners. If we got galled we would slap a hand full of starch where it would do the most good and forgot it.

In 1933 we all took the itch. Every night we woul apply a liberal amount of sulphur and grease to our bodies, slip on a suit of long handle underwer, and crawl in bed. Scratching kind of broke up the monotony and gave us young folk something to giggle about.

Daddy never did catch the itch, and mama siad it was because he dipped so much snuff.

When we went to town we would cut off the motor and coast from the big hill to the forks of the road to save gas. Once we were in town an hour before we noticed the dead chicken on the running board of the car. We forgot to kick it off on the way.

The only way you could tell a rich man from a poor man was that the rich man had two cars standing on blocks instead of one.

The outdoor rest rooms we had were not very relaxing or comfortable, and not places for deep thinking or long range planning. Usually I was too busy trying to beat a wasp or centipede to death with a Sears Roebuck catalog while fighting a cold updraft or 120 degree heat.

On winter nights we huddled around a red hot wood heater, roasting in the front and freezing in the rear. Daddy read Zane Grey books to us by a coal oil lamp.

I can remember like it was yesterday when daddy was out of money for Christmas gifts on Christmas Eve. He went out in the yard fired the shotgun and came back in the house and told us Santa Clause committed suicide.

The chickens roosted in a circle around the top rim of our drinking water barrel, and my job every night before going to bed

was to go out and turn them all around to where they were facing in.

Yes, I remember the depression.

I can't forget the bad things. Like people not having new clothes very often; like some folks not having enough food or enough medical care, or enough money to hold things together.

But I remember good things, too. Like people coming over to visit on the porch at night without our wondering what they wanted. Like a stranger sopping on the road to help you fix a flat. Like people just pulling together.

The great drpression, as bad as it was, had a little good in it. I'm glad I was here then, and I'm glad I'm here now. I just hope I don't catch the itch again.
