Postal Service Offers Reward For Information

The U. S. Postal Service is offering a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who shot three U. S. Mail Boxes with a shot gun either Saturday or Sunday, September 11 or 12. Postmaster John C. Gregg said the boxes are located about 10 miles northeast of Santa Anna on Rural Route One.

The boxes were apparently shot with a shot gun from the front of the boxes. Mr. Gregg also said state and Federal laws were violated by the person involved.

It is a violation of state law to discharge any firearms of this nature from any public roadway. By the same token it is a violation of Federal Law for the willful destruction of U. S. Mail boxes.

Anyone having information which might lead to an arrest in this matter is requested to contact Postmaster John C. Gregg at the Santa Anna Post Office. All information received will be in strict confidence.

Mountaineers Defeat Hawley; Meet R-Star Saturday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineers had their first victory of the season Friday night when they won 20-14 over the Hawley Bearcats. The SAHS team defeated the Class A squad at Mountaineer stadium.

The Mountaineers were led by quarterback Jody Brusenhan in an outstanding passing attack that brought three touchdowns for the team during the first half. Five of seven passes were completed for an impressive 149 yards. Alex DeLeon scored the first TD on a five yard run in the opening quarter.

Brusenhan hit David Chaffin with a scoring pass, then connected with Salvador Salazar for a 50-yard completion. A pass to Terry Day for 55 yards set up the DeLeon TD. Only one PAT was completed for the final score.

Hawley got on the scoreboard in the third period on a two-yard play, then got their final score on

the last play of the game and added two points on the conversion.

Santa Anna had 14 first downs to 12 for the Bearcats; Santa Anna's rushing yardage totaled 173 to 136 for Hawley. Norris Lewis was top rusher with 67 yards on nine carries. Salazar had 55 yards in 13 carries.

The Mountaineers had only two fumbles and no pass interceptions during the evening after being hampered by turnovers in earlier games.

Tim Benge and Melvin Harmon were given "Head Hunter" awards for their outstanding offensive game. Joe Dean Early and David Chaffin also received their first "Hunter" decals in the Hawley game. Already on the list was Freddy Fellers who had 16 tackles during the game.

The Mountaineers will travel to Rising Star Saturday night for the Wildcat Homecoming game at 7:30 p.m. The Rising Star team tied the Cross Plains team 6-6 last week and has won two of three other games this season.

Major Damage Done Monday By Wind, Hail at Rockwood

Driving into Rockwood Tuesday morning it looked like winter. The trees are stripped of the leaves and large ones are uprooted and limbs broken off.

The Monday night storm seemed to come from the west, with large hail; one person said they saw hailstones as large as your hand and hail was still drifted up in places. Windows were blown out, antennas were down; telephone and electric men were working in Rockwood.

It was thought the Walter Yancy home, northeast of town suffered the most damage. They just took a spade and shoveled a path through the house and said the house is now just a shell. The C. H. Wise and Bill Bryan homes east of Rockwood were in much the same shape. Water was standing on the rugs and drapes ruined. The Rehm hog farm southeast of town lost all buildings and equipment.

Fire Prevention Week Scheduled

County Judge W. W. Pate Skelton has proclaimed the week of October 3-9, 1976 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Coleman County.

The Coleman County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county, are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire prevention week is always the Sunday through Saturday period in which falls October 3, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 persons and destroyed 17,450 buildings at a cost of \$168 million.

In his proclamation, Judge Skelton quoted the National Fire Protection Association fire losses as: annually, 12,000 people die; another 300,000 seriously hurt; 1,000,000 buildings burn; and total dollar losses due to fire each year

exceeds the \$5.1 billion mark.

NFPA, national sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, has a catchy new theme on their posters and brochures: "LEARN NOT TO BURN." The theme of new materials is showing people what to do and what not to do.

Victor Cardinal, President of the Coleman County Farm Bureau, said that Farm Bureau has several programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The county Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, sponsors the attendance of local volunteer firemen to the annual Texas Firemen's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 1,400 firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past twelve years.

Attending from Coleman County this summer was Joe Watson of Coleman Volunteer Fire Department.

The state and local Farm Bureau also pay \$75 to fire departments for fighting rural fires on Farm Bureau insured

property.

In addition to these programs, county Farm Bureau sponsor a graphic 45-minute fire prevention demonstration. Some 1,700 fire safety programs have been presented in 200 different counties, before schools, civic clubs and other groups by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department staff during the past fifteen years.

School, civic clubs and other organizations planning fire or safety education programs for the year may schedule these programs by contacting the Coleman County Farm Bureau at 114 Concho, Coleman, Phone 625-2361.

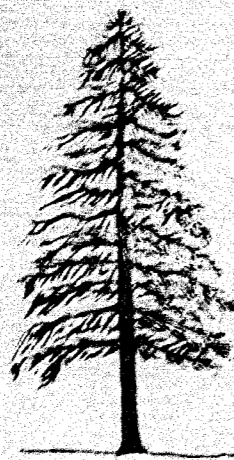

Workshop Slated For Tailoring

Tailoring workshops for Santa Anna homemakers and all other homemakers interested will be held 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., Thursday, October 7, 14 and 21, in the Mountain City Center of the Santa Anna Housing Authority. All experienced seamstresses are invited to attend.

The easiest, best and-or quickest methods will be demonstrated to include traditional as well as contemporary methods. These will include some hand tailoring techniques, faster machine methods and the use of fusibles. County Extension Agents (Home Economics) Bessie Parker and Roxie Ann Rodgers will conduct the workshops. Time will be allowed for participants to make all samples demonstrated for future reference. Small scale patterns, step-by-step instructions for each sample on a separate page and paper to mount samples will be provided from your registration fee of \$2.00. These will go together to make individual notebooks of samples of tailoring techniques for future reference for each participant.

The list of fabrics and supplies needed for the workshop by participants is as follows: 1-3 to 1/2 yard tailoring fabric (wool or wool-like), 1-3 yard knit for tailoring, 1-3 yard lining fabric, 1-3 yard canvas interfacing, 1 package seam tape, 1 package tape (1/4" wide), 1 short zipper, pins, thread, hand needle, scissors, sewing machine and extension cord. Fabric scraps from home are acceptable in fact advisable, to keep the cost down. Samples do not need to match or coordinate. You may also bring steam irons and ironing boards, seam rolls (or a suitable substitute).

It will be necessary to limit enrollment. Those wishing to participate should call the County Extension Office telephone number 625-4519 or go by and register. The office is located on the Southeast corner upstairs in the courthouse. Those in Santa Anna should call Mrs. W. C. Jameson at City Cleaners, telephone number 348-3851 or go by and register there.
