COUNTY FAIR SATURDAY

The Ninth Annual Coleman County Fair will be held Saturday, September 25, at Coleman Rodeo Grounds in south Coleman. The Fair will officially open at 9 a.m. with activity booths, food booths

and entertainment starting at 10 o'clock.

Bands and entertainers will be featured at the Fair, and the largest number of booths ever reserved will have displays of

merchants, organizations and individuals.

The food booths will be in a large tent, manned by several county organizations and each featuring different food. Rides for children will be available during the day.

Among activities planned will be a boxing tournament starting at 2:20 p.m. a youth horse show at 4 p.m. and a tractor pull Saturday and Sunday afternoons. A square dance will be held at the National Guard Armory Saturday night.

Tickets into the fair grounds will be \$1.50 and 50 cents, and allow admission to all the activities. The women's building will house exhibits and crafts and open at 12 noon following the judging.

Fair officials have announced the grounds will be open each afternoon this week for construction and decorations of booths and again at 7:30 a.m. Saturday to receive exhibits.

Attendance has been good each year, and participation is expected to be greater than ever for the Bicentennial event.

Collection of Stories, Pictures In New Book By Gladys N. Hunter

A new book, "Discord, Texas, on Camp Creek and Other Stories", by Mrs. John C. (Gladys Nevins) Hunter has just been published by Anchor Publishing Co., of San Angelo and is now available here.

The stories relate the history of the rich area between the Colorado River and the Santa Anna Mountains, from the time of the big ranches to the present day. Gladys Nevins Hunter lived just off the bank of the Colorado River for many years and long ago started collecting and writing about families, communities, cemeteries and other points of historical interest. She is a veteran correspondent for area newspapers and her feature stories have created wide interest.

Mrs. Hunter's research and travel have taken her many miles and many months. That the little settlement of Camp Creek Colony became known as Discord and the post office bore that name before it was changed to Rockwood, has stimulated her study of that community's past and add to her collection the stories of the entire area.

After living on the ranch with her husband many years, Mrs. Hunter maintained her home there awhile after his death, then moved to Santa Anna in 1967 to continue her vocation as homemaker, club woman, civic worker and writer.

The attractive red book is a rich source of genealogical and pioneer studies and a source of information for others in years to come.

Eagles Defeat Mountaineers; Hawley to Play Here Friday

The Santa Anna Mountaineers took another loss Friday night in non-conference play when the Goldthwaite Eagles ended the game with a 21-8 victory. The loss was to another Class A opponent, but brought the first score of the season for the home team. The victory was the second of the season for the eagles.

Goldthwaite led 14-0 at halftime and the third quarter was scoreless. The final Eagle score came on an interception of a Mountaineer pass.

Santa Anna scored in the final quarter with Salvador Salazar plunging one yard for the TD. Jody Brusenhan added two points to the score in the conversion.

The Mountaineers had 10 first downs to the Eagles' 11 and outdistanced their opponents in rushing yardage. Santa Anna led

in fumbles and passed intercepted.

In the second half the Mountaineers had 140 yards rushing to 28 for the Eagles. Coach Anthony Strother cited the fumbles and interceptions as the cause of the defeat but was pleased with the general defensive efforts of the team.

Mike Pape and Paul Martin were added to the season's list of "Head Hunters." Given additional defensive awards were Alex DeLeon, Salvador Salazar, Freddie Fellers, Jodie Brusenhan and Norris Lewis.

Salazar had a total of 127 yards rushing in the game; Alex DeLeon and Norris Lewis rushed for 45 and 35 respectively.

The Mountaineers will host the Hawley High School team in an 8 p.m. game Friday night, the third home game in a row for the local team. Hawley, a Class A team won over Santa Anna 7-0 last year and is expected to have good size and speed this season.

The Speaker Reports

AUSTIN—I recently toured the state prison at Huntsville as guest of Texas Department of Corrections Director, Jim Estelle. I picked up a number of ideas from the people who run our prisons while on the visit.

These men who work daily in close contact with the prisoners have drawn some conclusions of their own as to how we should best deal with the criminals in this state.

I welcomed this chance to gain firsthand knowledge of how these professionals felt about the spread of crime and the incarceration of individuals who are convicted of perpetrating crimes.

I want to pass along these thoughts as they were given to me. Some are contrary to opinions I and others have held. I do not endorse, nor do I dispute any of the ideas. I offer them as they were offered to me—as something to think about.

1. The general feeling of the wardens is that long prison sentences will not deter crime.

2. Removing "good time" removes an inmate's incen-

tive and makes him very hard to control.

3. A large proportion of inmates in the Department of Corrections were on probation before coming to prison. If the probation system were strengthened many of those people would not later go to prison.

4. Juries should be informed of "good time" laws when sentencing. The public resents not knowing about the "good time" more than they resent the law itself.

5. When sentencing, juries should also be allowed to read the pre-sentencing report, just as the judge is allowed to read it.

6. Many persons who commit crimes of passion will never commit such a crime again.

7. If mandatory sentences were prescribed for certain crimes, juries would probably not be as prone to let young persons off simply because of the length of sentence.

9. We need laws to back up a work release program for purposes of making restitution.

10. Discretionary powers given to judges often lead to unreasonable sentences. An example might be a 25 year sentence for smoking marijuana and a five year sentence for murder.

These are interesting proposals, and we need thinking of this type if we are to halt the rising crime rate and do something about the ever increasing population of our prisons.

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Far East Work Studied by SDA

Doors to American missionary work are closing fast around the world, reports C. Wayne Barker, one of the superintendents of the Sabbath School in the Seventh-day Adventist church. But no where are they closing faster than in the Far East.

A high school in the Philippines is to be relocated and expanded to serve a growing number of believers, and rough jungle airstrips will be built to allow pastors and doctors to serve wider areas.

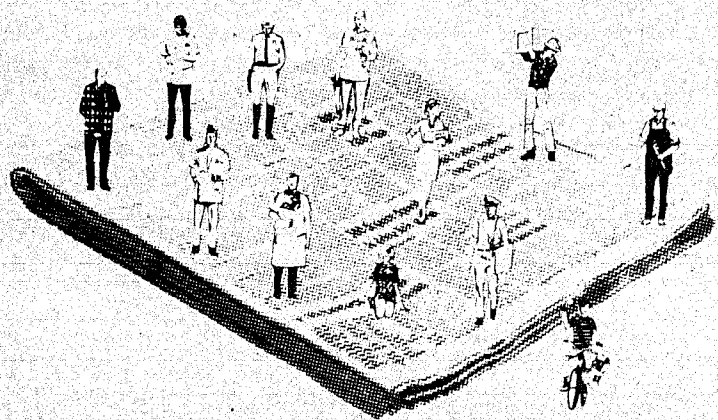
